Dear Admiral Turner:

As you are aware, H. Res. 222, as passed by the House of Representatives on February 2, 1977, authorized the Select Committee on Assassinations to investigate the deaths of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and President John F. Kennedy. The Committee's work is now drawing to an end. I write this letter to draw to your attention a matter that I recognize will inevitably come up in the future.

A great deal of material has been generated by your Agency in response to specific requests or concerns of the Select Committee. In addition, your Agency is in physical custody of a variety of materials originating from the Select Committee. It can be anticipated that your Agency will receive requests under the Freedom of Information Act for access to these materials. The purpose of this letter is to request specifically that this Congressional material and related information in a form connected to the Committee not be disclosed outside your Agency without the written concurrence of the House of Representatives.

SUBJECT: Costs Involved in Microfilming and Indexing
HSCA-Related Agency Documents

1. Re our telecon on the potential costs of preserving the Agency's HSCA-Related material in microform, the following are "ballpark" figures I was able to obtain:

a. For one cubic foot of records, it requires 8 man hours to prepare the records, refile them, and verify the microform product.¹ If the average grade of the microfiche is a GS 10, the cost involved in this process is approximately the cost of paper.² If the microfiche is a GS 12, the cost is approximately the cost of paper.² If the microfiche is a GS 14, the cost is approximately the cost of paper.² The cost is approximately the cost of paper.² (by we should go) more involved than with microfiche a would average out to be about the same as one cubic foot of records.³

b. Storage servicing costs for one cubic foot of records at the AARC averages to about \$5.70 per year and one cubic foot of microfilm equates to approximately 84 cubic feet of paper (one cubic foot of microfiche equals about 54 cubic feet of paper).
