SUBJECT: Radio Messages for Stokely Carmichael
During the April 1968 Riots in Washington, D. C.

1. During the civil disorders of 6 and 7 April 1968 in Washington, D. C. following the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., an employee of this Agency heard on his car radio messages directed to Stokely Carmichael. The employee does not remember the station of which the program was broadcast; however, he identified it as a local "rock and roll" station which was located in the 1400-1600 range on the AM dial.
2. An acquaintance of this employee also mentioned hearing during this period messages such as "Stokely Carmichael, please call your headquarters"; regular radio programs were interrupted to broadcast these messages.

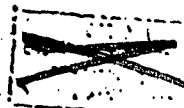

MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

22 April 1968

SUBJECT:

Radio messages for Stokely Carmichael during
the riots in Washington D.C.

1. During the civil disorders of April 6-7, following the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., this writer heard on his car radio messages intended for Stokely Carmichael. Another acquaintance of mine also mentioned hearing such messages which would interrupt the program in progress to say, "Stokely Carmichael, please call your headquarters (or some similar message)." The exact station is unknown to me, except that it was in the 1400-1600 range on the AM dial and was a local rock-and-roll station.
