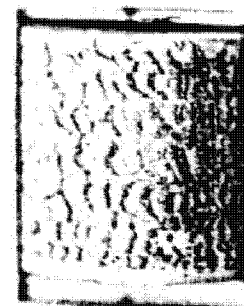
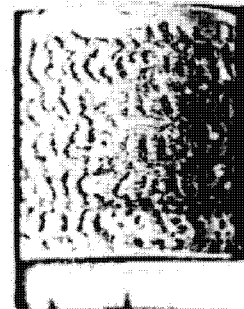

King's projected trip to Moscow

- A series of memos (blind) reflecting info
coming direct to CIA from informants
and presumably supplied info.
to the FBI through the liaison officer

- blind memo 9 June 65 gives a detail
analysis from a black source C
to all the top Negro leaders. It's son
obviously considers King to be a cap
of the Communists - more particularly
the Chinese Communists.

Excerpts from CIA Documents

64 documents destroyed in 1974. Dir. Colby said CIA had no business keeping files on American citizens.

Mail Intercept

1. Letter dtd 6/14/63 from 16 year old American Black girl, ~~attendant~~ attending sch in Moscow, to King in City jail, Birmingham. Expressed concern of racial injustice and offered help.
2. Letter from Trade Union (AU CCTU) forwarding copy of statement published by Union and expressing confidence in negro working people's struggle.
3. Three other letters of condolence to Mrs. King.
