By airtel to the Bureau dated 5/17/65, in case "WHITE KNIGHTS OF KU KLUX KLAN OF MISSISSIPPI, RACIAL MATTER", the Bureau was advised of the attempted interview with SPARKS. Additionally, 9 copies of an FD 302 dated 5/17/65, was furnished to the Jackson Division. This showed the interview with SPARKS. At that time, it was the considered opinion of Agents that had worked cases involving SPARKS. his associates, and Agents who handled the former case involving former Top Ten Fugitive JOHN GIBSON DILLON, that information that SPARKS was hired to kill MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. and that he did kill DILLON was not accurate nor truthful information. It was pointed out that following DILLON's murder there was a massive amount of rumor, speculation and hearsay information circulated among the criminal element concerning the death of DILLON. It was this hearsay information that was probably being reported by Jackson's informant in all honesty.

The Bareau's attention is directed to the fact that HERMIT EUGENE WING, aka, ANTI-RACKETEERING, is the subject of a current pending file, Oklahoma City 92-588, Bureau file 92-9329. He is an Oklahoma ex-convict, Burglar, Armed Robber, who travels extensively throughout the United States. He was last interviewed by Bureau Agents, 3/5/68, where he was living at Bartlesville, Oklahoma. He was at that time employed at Jeanie's Lounge in Bartlesville.



CLEM MC GOWAN, Section Chief, Division 6, Civil Rights Section, Bureau, telephonically advised ASAC at 5:40 PM today that a systematic review of Bureau files is being made for all references to violence concerning MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. The review reflects the following three pieces of information from Jackson files which should be thoroughly checked out:

- IN 265-R (Prob) on 4/28/67 reported that L. C. BLALOCK, owner of Curly's Place, Winona, Miss., reported that one JULIO RAMCO, Jacksonville, Fla., would pay anyone \$100,000 cash to kill MARTIN LUTHER KING.
- An airtel 6/15/67 from the Bureau to Jackson referred to an alleged offer of \$100,000 by the White Knights of the Ku Klux Klan of Mississippi (WKKKKOM), Jackson, Miss., to anyone who would kill MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. MC GOWAN did not have a title for this airtel, stating that he was operating from notes handed to him by file review clerks. The information supposedly originated from one DONALD NISSEN, an inmate in jail in Texas.
- Jackson teletype 9/17/67 in the case entitled, "UNSUB; Alleged Plan To Kill MARTIN LUTHER KING, Grenada, Miss., RM", referred to the fact that Reverend EMMETT BARFIELD, Pastor, First Presbyterian Church, Grenada, claimed that two white residents of the parish planned to kill MARTIN LUTHER KING 9/19/66 (?) at Grenada.

MC GOWAN stated the above instances as well as any other threats to kill MARTIN LUTHER KING should be thoroughly explored for leads in this case. 157-9586-406

GEORGE JONES telephonically contacted the Jackson Office of the FBI on 4/20/67, and advised he knew the wife of JAMES EARL RAY.

JONES stated he recognized the name and the picture as it appeared in a newspaper. He said RAY had left his wife, whom JONES is acquainted with, about a month ago, and had taken several of her belongings. He believes the wife may know where RAY is presently located.

JONES would not divulge the wife's name, but said he would have her call the office.

JONES was reluctant to give his name and stated he did not want to get involved. He did mention he had cooperated with the FBI in the past.

A check of the Jackson indices reflected file JN 170-470 on a subject GEORGE JONES, who had been operated as an RI - PROB prior to discontinuing of the file 1/17/68. The file reflects JONES' home address to be 225 Oak, Jackson, which is the address where VIRGINIA RAY was later located.

Mrs. VIRGINIA RAY, home address 944 Inge Street, Jackson, Mississippi furnished the following information:

On the evening of September 5, 1967, in the early evening hours, VIRGINIA UMFRESS (RAY), was at her place of employment, the Rainbow Inn, Saltillo, Mississipi, talking to the bartender, LAWRENCE WEBB and a customer whom she met for the first time by the name of JAMES RAY.

After drinking one and one-half Budweiser beers, VIRGINIA UMFRESS said the next thing she can recall is coming out of the Court House at Jasper, Alabama, the next day around noontime with a marriage license in her hand. She said she married JAMES RAY but does not recall any other details of the trip from the Rainbow Inn in Saltillo, Mississippi, to the Court House at Jasper, Alabama. For this reason she believes she was drugged or something. She could not recall any conversation with RAY.

VIRGINIA UMFRESS RAY stated that on the trip back to Mississippi she recalled sleeping most of the way and no conversation. She described the vehicle that they were riding in as a 1967 Malibu, white in color with red uphdstery. She said the two front fenders had severe dents in them and RAY mentioned that he had hit a bridge. Upon returning to Mississippi they drove to Tupelo to the trailer which UMFRESS had been living in just South of Tupelo on Highway 45 South.

She advised that they arrived in Tupelo around 5:00 P. M., on September 6, 1967, and they stayed at her trailer for the night. The next morning around 10:00 A. M., on September 7, 1967, after much discussion they drove to

Jackson, Mississippi, to pick up VIRGINIA UMFRESS RAY's two year old son.

At this point, VIRGINIA UMFRESS RAY advised that her maiden name is VIRGINIA JACO and that in January, 1964, she married JOHNNY WAYNE UMFRESS who is employed as a carpenter with a company in Itawamba County, Mississippi. She divorced this man in 1966 and he still lives in Fulton, Mississippi.

JAMES RAY at first refused to drive to Jackson, Mississippi, however, she convinced him to come along with her. They left Tupelo, Mississippi, around 10:00 A. M., on September 7, 1967, and drove straight down to Jackson, Mississippi, arriving in the middle of the afternoon. They went directly to her grandparents, F. A. and VERA JACO, with whom her two year old son had been boarding at 225 Oak Street, Jackson.

VIRGINIA RAY said she went into her grandparents' house by herself while JAMES RAY, her new husband, made a gasoline purchase at the Sinclair Service Station across the street from her grandparents house. She said JAMES RAY used a Sinclair credit card in making all gasoline purchases.

At her grandparents home she introduced JAMES RAY to her cousin GEORGE JONES, his wife JOYCE JONES, and her aunt, MARIE JACO, as well as her grandparents. She explained that her grandparents home has separate apartments and that her cousin MARIE JACO, GEORGE and JOYCE JONES have separate apartments.

They remained overnight at the Oak Street address and between 6:00 and 7:00 A. M., when she got up, JAMES RAY said they were leaving for California. She said she refused to go and that RAY picked up GEORGE JONE's shotgun, pointed

it at her stomach and said he was going to kill her. At this point her cousin JCYCE JONES came into the room and stepped between them and told RAY that he would have to kill her first. JAMES RAY hesitated for a moment, turned and ran out of the house. He got in his car and drove away taking the shotgun with him. VIRGINIA RAY said she has not seen JAMES RAY since and has heard nothing about him or from him since that time.

A short while after this incident she realized that sometime during the night or early morning RAY had taken the marriage license out of her overnight bag which she had picked up the morning before at the trailer in Tupelo. He also took a bronze horse trophy from the mantle.

Upon seeing the photograph of JAMES EARL RAY in the Jackson newspapers on April 19, 1968, she immediately thought it strongly resembled JAMES RAY, her missing husband.

VIRGINIA RAY furnished the following information concerning the contents of the 1967 Malibu in the possession of JAMES RAY:

A large blue Samsonite type suitcase which appeared to be the largest size. She described it as a hard finish airplane type luggage.

A black cloth type bag with a zipper across the top and handles. The lining of the cloth bag appeared to be plaid. Inside the bag was a current Alabama license plate and a current Mississippi license plate. She then recalled that the Malibu had Tennessee tags on it all during the period she was with RAY. She said she recalled asking RAY why he had the extra license plates and he said he needed them in his business. He said his business was that of a musician and that he played a guitar.

He had numerous cosmetic type kits which only women would use. She was not able to further describe the cosmetics other than it struck her as odd that he would have these items.

In the trunk of the car he had the small bronze horse trophy and a pair of expensive looking lizard skin riding boots.

RAY claimed to have been associated with horse shows and won the trophy at a horse show.

VIRGINIA RAY furnished the following physical description of her husband:

Just prior to shaving his beard appeared to be medium to light in color.

Upon inquiry, Mrs. RAY said she noticed nothing peculiar about her husband's ears. She said his eyebrows were average and brown in color.

The most peculiar thing about him other than the tattoos, was the fact that he addressed everyone as "hoss". Numerous times while speaking he would use the word "hoss" to the person he happened to be speaking to.

The only thing she could recall about his facial expression was the color of his eyes, bluish gray, and the fact that his eyes frightened her more than anything else. She could not recall anything peculiar about his smile. She then added that she did not recall ever seeing him smile.

Mrs. RAY said that her grandparents, F. A. and VERA JACO, her cousin JOYCE and her husband GEORGE and her aunt MARIE JACO all saw JAMES RAY. She said they too feel there is a resemblance between the photograph of JAMES EARL RAY which appeared in the Jackson newspapers on April 19, 1968, and her husband. She said that the previous photograph which appeared in the Jackson newspapers prior to April 19, 1968, did not resemble her husband. It

was the photograph which appeared on April 19, 1968, which prompted her to call the Federal Bureau of Investigation. She said she has no information concerning the whereabouts of JAMES RAY since she last saw him on September 8, 1967.

Mrs. RAY then added that on the morning of September 8, 1967, after JAMES RAY hurriedly left her grandparents home her cousin JOYCE JONES and her husband GEORGE JONES drove her back to Tupelo, Mississippi, to her rented trailer home.

Upon arriving there shortly before 5:00 P. M., she noticed that the door of the trailer was ajar approximately three or four inches. She recalled that she had given the key to the trailer to her husband.

When she entered the trailer she noticed some items were missing. The first thing she noticed was that her portable record player and 50 or 60 albums, mostly country music were missing. She thought the record player was a True Tone portable model.

A portable radio, make unknown, described as one that played with batteries or plug-in type, was missing.

A Brownie Holiday Flash Camera was missing.

A Dominion Portable hair dryer was missing.

Several sweaters, three pairs of her shoes and six dresses just back from the cleaners were missing.

She said that a picture of her mother which she described as being in an elaborate frame was also missing and in addition, a picture album of the family was missing.

Her cousin GEORGE, age 18 years, started her automobile, a 1955 Buick, blue and white in color in that she could not get it started herself. Her cousin GEORGE, discovered that some foreign substance had been placed in the gas tank causing the fuel line to be clogged.

After GEORGE JONES got her car started she drove it back to Jackson following GEORGE and JOYCE in their car.

She said they arrived in Jackson around 9:00 or 10:00 P. M., that night, September 8, 1967. She remained at her grandparents house and lived there for a while.

In further describing JAMES RAY, Mrs. RAY said the first time she met him he was wearing plaid type trousers and a brown shirt. She said he was just an average dresser, nothing peculiar, seldom wore suits during the three days she knew him.

On 4/20/68, during the course of an interview with Mrs. VIRGINIA RAY at the Jackson FBI Office, a telephone call was placed to the Kansas City FBI Office. SAC KARL DISSLY, Kansas City, advised that there is no record of any scars on the back of each hand of subject JAMES EARL RAY. There is no record of any tattoos on JAMES EARL RAY.

SAC DISSLY advised that the Los Angeles Division has positively placed JAMES EARL RAY in Los Angeles, Calif., on 8/2/67 and on 8/12/67. He stated that Los Angeles can practically account for JAMES EARL RAY's presence in the Los Angeles area from September, 1967, up to the first of the year. In addition, the Los Angeles Office located a record of appointments with a psychiatrist in the Los Angeles area wherein JAMES EARL RAY, using his full name, had a series of appointments with this psychiatrist.

The telephone call to Kansas Citywas placed in an effort to obtain any information which would indicate that subject JAMES EARL RAY had any tattoos or large scars on the back of each hand.
