The Postal Inspector at Los Angeles has made available a letter and photograph Ray mailed to Patricia K. Anderson, Los Angeles, 2/17/68. The letter was written as a result of Anderson's inclusion in a list called "The Local Swinger" which is compiled by a correspondence club. Anderson is being located for interview. The letter is set out below.

"Dear Miss:

"I am answering your listing in The Local Swinger since I think I share most of your interest, with emphasis on French cult. and swing sessions. I have just returned from Mexico after five yrs. and the few females I have met don't go for the swing parties and it takes two to swing. The same routine gets boring, don't you think. Will close until I hear from you.

"3-11 - 170 lb. 36 yrs.

Eric S. Galt"

Owners of "The Local Swinger" recalled Eric Galt had sent one dollar for a list of swingers and subsequently submitted five letters for transmittal to persons identified on the list by symbol number. No record is maintained that would identify the persons the subject wrote but additional investigation is being conducted in this regard.

Both Charles Stein and Rita Stein have stated the above photograph is the best likeness of the subject they have seen. Identifying numbers on the back of this Polaroid print indicate the film was manufactured in August, 1967.

Gene Turner, Los Angeles "Free Press," an avant-garde newspaper, made available the following advertisement placed by Eric S. Galt by mail on 1/30/68 and printed 2/8/68:

"Single male cauc. 36 yrs. 5-11 - 170 lb, digs Fr. cult. desire's discreet meeting with passionate married female for mutual enjoyment, and/or female for swing sessions apt. furn. will ex. photo.

"Write

Eric S. 406-So. 2nd. Alhambra, 91802."

The address used in the above advertisement is that of a mail forwarding service subscribed to by Ray. The owner of this service has previously advised no mail was ever received for the subject.

John Larry Ray, subject's brother, St. Louis, has been reinterviewed and appeared cooperative. He believes the subject started using narcotics in the Army and said he has not seemed right since. He again denied any knowledge of the subject subsequent to his escape.

Albert Pepper, brother-in-law of the subject, married Ray's sister, Carol, while Ray was in Missouri State Penitentiary. He denies ever meeting Ray or having any knowledge of his whereabouts. Pepper stated he had run off a "Life" magazine reporter with a club.

John Gawron, who previously advised he had taught Ray burglary, advised that on three occasions while Ray was in Missouri State Penitentiary, Ray contacted him through Carol to purchase a case of cold inhalants, probably benzedrine. The inhalants were picked up each time by an unidentified prison guard who received \$100 for each trip. Gawron also alleged Ray operated a loan racket in prison.

The Los Angeles Police Department furnished the Los Angeles Office a letter dated 5/1/68 which was addressed to the Editor in Chief of the "Los Angeles Times." The letter is typed single spaced and signed James Ray. The writer stated he has been in the Los Angeles area but was departing as of the time he mailed the letter, 5/1/68. He alleged he is sick over having slain King, but states he killed him for \$3,000. He additionally states that he is disgusted with articles which have been appearing in the press concerning him, particularly derogatory comments made about him by Warden Harold Swensen of the Missouri State Penitentiary and Cathy Norton, a dance instructor who was quoted as saying that "Ray was clumsy." In the letter he alleges that while he is remorseful over having slain King he will not go back to prison again and will kill himself before doing so. The letter does not indicate where Ray stayed in Los Angeles or what other cities he may have been in since the assassination.

The letter was flown to the Bureau and examined last night by the Laboratory and the Identification Division. Significant differences indicate the James Ray signature probably was not made by James Earl Ray, however, a definite opinion was precluded by limited questioned handwriting. No latent fingerprints were developed on the specimens.

Chicago has advised that various news media converged on Sportsman's Country Club to interview Jerry Ray, brother of James Earl Ray, and as a result Jerry left his employment. He has contacted the Chicago Office, stating he plans to visit other relatives in Missouri for three or four days and will probably return to his employment thereafter when news media interest has abated.

**JERRY O'LEARY AND
"THE READER'S DIGEST"
MARTIN LUTHER KING INVESTIGATION**

Jerry O'Leary, a very friendly and reliable contact of the Bureau with "The Evening Star," has advised that he has been contacted by "The Reader's Digest" on the possibility of writing a story regarding the Martin Luther King case for the July, 1968, issue of "The Reader's Digest." O'Leary has been the author of two outstanding articles on the Director.

O'Leary said that the officials of "The Reader's Digest" still remember very vividly that it was an article in the November, 1960, issue of their magazine which led to the apprehension of Joseph Corbett, Jr. --the kidnap-murderer of Adolph Coors III. We, of course, cooperated with "The Reader's Digest" in the preparation of that article; and "The Reader's Digest" has told O'Leary that they are hopeful a similarly effective article concerning the fugitive in the King case can be published.

According to O'Leary, "The Reader's Digest" feels that the search for James Earl Ray contains many of the same elements as did the search for Joseph Corbett, Jr. --in that both cases involve a "loner" who used fictitious names and backgrounds to conceal true identity. With a multimillion circulation in the United States, Canada, Mexico and other countries, "The Reader's Digest" feels it may be able to stage a repeat of the success which followed its 1960 article on the Coors case.

If James Ray is still at large when the July, 1968, issue of "The Reader's Digest" goes to press, the magazine would like to publish an article setting forth brief facts of the King case and extensive data regarding Ray's background and character which might prove helpful in turning him up. If Ray is apprehended prior to mid-June, 1968, when the July issue of "The Reader's Digest" is printed, the magazine would, of course, change its approach to the article.

SAC Wesley Grapp of the Los Angeles Office has telephonically furnished the following information.

The Los Angeles Police Department has just furnished to the Los Angeles Office a letter dated 5/1/68 postmarked in Los Angeles and addressed and mailed to the Editor in Chief of the "Los Angeles Times" newspaper in Los Angeles, California. The letter is typed single spaced and purportedly signed by James Ray.

In the letter the writer states that he has been in the Los Angeles area but was departing Los Angeles as of the time he mailed the letter. He alleges that he is sick over having slain King but states he killed him for \$3,000. He additionally states that he is disgusted with articles which have been appearing in the press concerning him, particularly derogatory comments made about him by Warden Harold Swensen of the Missouri State Penitentiary and Cathy Norton, a dance instructor who was quoted as saying that "Ray was clumsy." In the letter he alleges that while he is remorseful over having slain King he will not go back to prison again and will kill himself before doing so. The letter does not indicate where Ray stayed in Los Angeles or what other cities he may have been in since the assassination.

SAC Grapp stated that while it is not known whether the letter is legitimate or a crank letter, it is being forwarded to the Bureau immediately by commercial aircraft for appropriate Laboratory examination to determine if, in fact, it was written by Ray.

In connection with the Martin Luther King case, there has been some speculation that James Earl Ray concocted the alias of Eric Starvo Galt by combining the names of characters from Ian Fleming books and from the book "Atlas Shrugged" by Ayn Rand. This speculation is based upon the fact that in Ian Fleming's series of James Bond books, an individual named Ernst Stavro Blofeld is one of the most formidable adversaries who confronts James Bond. Ernst Stavro Blofeld, for example, appears in "Thunderball," "On Her Majesty's Secret Service," and elsewhere in the James Bond series. It will be noted, however, that there is a significant difference between Eric Starvo Galt and Ernst Stavro Blofeld.

Ayn Rand's book "Atlas Shrugged" was published in 1957 and is more than 1,100 pages long. The book begins on page 1 with the question, "Who is John Galt?" (Galt is characterized in this book as a

social "drop-out"--a person who has withdrawn from society because he resents the "leeches" who habitually take from, but do not contribute to, the body politic.) It is interesting to note that a person named Eric Starnes also is mentioned in "Atlas Shrugged." On 321 of this book, a chief of police in Louisiana is quoted as stating as follows about the Starnes family:

"There's all sorts of human beings to see in the world, there's murderers and criminal maniacs--but, somehow, I think these Starnes persons are what decent people shouldn't have to see. They're a bad sort.... Yes, they're still here in town--two of them, that is. The third one is dead. Suicide. That was four years ago. Its an ugly story. He was the youngest of the three, Eric Starnes. He was one of those chronic young men who go around whining about their sensitive feelings, when they're well past forty...."

The name Eric Starnes--appearing in a book which starts off with the question "Who is John Galt?"--could prompt some persons to say that James Earl Ray concocted the name Eric Starvo Galt after reading Ayn Rand's "Atlas Shrugged", and that this alias has nothing to do with any of the characters in Ian Fleming's books. Furthermore, these persons could say similarities do exist between James Earl Ray's family and the family of Eric Starnes as described on page 321 of "Atlas Shrugged." Confronted with the above-cited quotation from "Atlas Shrugged," some of these same persons undoubtedly would insist that FBI fugitive James Earl Ray (like Eric Starnes) has committed suicide. (On the other hand, significant differences can be pointed out between Eric Starnes and James Ray. For example, Eric Starnes is described as the youngest of the Starnes; whereas, James Earl Ray was the oldest child in his family.

Attached are lists of the names which appear in 14 of the 18 Ian Fleming books. The other four Ian Fleming books ("Thrilling Cities," "Octopussy," "More Gilt-Edged Bonds" and "Chitty-Chitty-Bang-Bang") are not available in Washington book stores, including stores dealing in paperback books. If desired, we will ask the New York Office to attempt to run down copies of these four books in that city.

This is the case involving the murder of Martin Luther King, Jr.

SAC Wesley Grapp of the Los Angeles Office has telephonically furnished the following information.

The Los Angeles Police Department has just furnished to the Los Angeles Office a letter dated 5/1/68 postmarked in Los Angeles and addressed and mailed to the Editor in Chief of the "Los Angeles Times" newspaper in Los Angeles, California. The letter is typed single spaced and purportedly signed by James Ray.

In the letter the writer states that he has been in the Los Angeles area but was departing Los Angeles as of the time he mailed the letter. He alleges that he is sick over having slain King but states he killed him for \$3,000. He additionally states that he is disgusted with articles which have been appearing in the press concerning him, particularly derogatory comments made about him by Warden Harold Swensen of the Missouri State Penitentiary and Cathy Norton, a dance instructor who was quoted as saying that "Ray was clumsy." In the letter he alleges that while he is remorseful over having slain King he will not go back to prison again and will kill himself before doing so. The letter does not indicate where Ray stayed in Los Angeles or what other cities he may have been in since the assassination.

SAC Grapp stated that while it is not known whether the letter is legitimate or a crank letter, it is being forwarded to the Bureau immediately by commercial aircraft for appropriate Laboratory examination to determine if, in fact, it was written by Ray.

Dear Editor,

By the time that you get this letter I won't be in Los Angeles no longer. I am going to leave this city and go somewhere where no body is ever going to find me. There is no use for you to go to all the trouble of finding where I sent this or anything because since I killed the nigger leader and came out here I have not talked to any one and no body knows that I was ever here.

While I was in Los Angeles I went to see the movie In Cold Blood and I got all shook up and felt real bad because of the terrible crime that was done in Kansas a few years ago. I got real sick for myself too because I realized what I had done and that is why I am writing to you right now. I want you to put this in the papers or give it to the FBI because I want you to know how miserable I am. Did you know that the day after I killed King that I was so sick about what I had done that I actually threw up all over a hotel room? I am so sorry that I did it now and with my pictures all over the place I am sure that someday I still might get caught. I am afraid to look at anyone in the face anymore because I am afraid that they know who I am and they will tell the police. I will kill myself before I will get caught for I will never again spend any time in no damn prison. But the reason that I am writing you this letter now, is because that I have to let someone know how x I really feel about what I did.

First of all I want to tell you that the only reason I did it was for money. If you really want to know I was hired to do it for \$20,000 dollars which seemed like a hell of a lot of money. I always hated Martin King like a lot of people do but it was because he was a rebel rouser and because he tried to make a bunch of inferior people (the negroes) as good as every other American white person and even college professors have said that that is not true. Anyway, I only did it for the money. I hate a lot of people in the world like Cathy Norton who said I was clumsy in the newspapers, and some of the other son of a bitches who now want to put there two damn cents in every magazine saying what a rotten guy I am. But when they say it I promise myself that I will kill them to for saying those things about me. Why they didn't even know me, how can they say those things about me? The same goes for Harold Swensen. He never took the time of day to give a damn about me. But now they all think they are big shots in the papers and magazines. They all make me sick. They are all a bunch of phonies and if I ever get caught I can tell a few stories about some of those guys at the Missouri Penitentiary that would really shake some people up, just like I could tell you some things about the whites and niggers in those civil rights marches that you wouldn't believe. The whole thing is phoney. But I'm still sorry for what I have done for I once said to myself when I planned the job in Alton for which I got about two thousand dollars that I would never ever kill anybody. And now I killed a guy, and even though I hated him with all my heart and for what he stood for I would never do it again for even a million dollars. I am really sorry for what I have done. Somehow I hope it will be straightened around and I can pay some body back for what I did.

I just got all the rest of my \$20,000 dollars today and am leaving the place where I am at. But I am 100% positive that nobody could ever find me or recognize me in a million years. So if I have to leave something to my country and if you and everybody else in the world want to know my only thoughts about this whole thing all I can say is I am now sorry. I am really sorry that I did it at all. I could never kill again.

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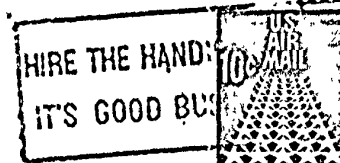
