

### Ray Trial Scheduled For Nov. 12

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — James Earl Ray pleaded innocent today to a charge of assassinating Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. here April 4 and trial was set for Nov. 12.

Appearing publicly for the first time since his extradition hearings in London, England, Ray entered his plea through his lawyer, Arthur Hanes of Birmingham, Ala.

Security officers searched persons who entered the Shelby County Criminal Courtroom to witness Ray's arraignment.

Ray, wearing a checked blue sport coat and blue slacks, was led into the courtroom at 10:57 a.m., CDT, and the arraignment proceedings ended 12 minutes later. Ray was returned to his steel-lined, air-conditioned cell block in the county jail.

Hanes had both indictments

Hanes had both indictments read—one alleging murder in the first degree and the other charging Ray with carrying a dangerous weapon.

At the end of each reading, Hanes said: "My client wishes to enter a plea of innocent."

Ray remained silent throughout the arraignment. He was seated at the counsel table between Hanes and Hanes' son, Arthur Jr. Behind them sat Sheriff William N. Morris Jr. and two other officers.

Judge Preston Battle had told Hanes a plea did not have to be entered today and asked whether the defense wanted a recess. "We will enter a plea to the

indictment," Hanes responded.

Battle also asked if Hanes wanted a period of "a few days or a few weeks" to determine when he would be ready to try

the case.

## Ray Pleads Not Guilty to Murder; Trial Set for Nov. 12 in Memphis

MEMPHIS - James Earl Ray Monday pleaded not guilty to a charge that he murdered the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. last April 4.

His trial as set to begin Nov. 12. The date was picked to avoid the up-coming elections

Ray's plea was entered by his attorney, Arthur J. Hanes, who said that the defendant also pleaded not guilty to a charge of carrying a dangerous weapon.

Hanes said after the court sessions that he had entered a plea

of not guilty to speed the case. "This matter has got to be disposed of," he said.

Through Tunnel of Guards

Ray did not speak during the 13-minute arraignment. He sat motionless at a table beside Hanes after being brought to courtroom No. 3 from the Shelby County Jail through a tunnel of guards.

The courtroom used for the arraignment is directly below the armor-plated suite of cells Ray is occupying.

Other than newsmen and secu-

rity guards, there were only a half-dozen spectators in the courtroom. One spectator was Robert G. Jensen, the special agent in charge of the Federal Bureau of Investigation Office in Memphis. Much of the evidence against Ray was gathered under Jensen's direction.

Reporters were searched befor being allowed to enter the courtroom. They also were photographed and their voices recorded by a video tape machine. Many small objects, such as fin-

# Ray Enroute to U.S

LONDON (UPI)—American authorities took custody of James Earl Ray Thursday night. They put the accused assassin of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. aboard a plane bound for the United States but kept details of his journey secret.

The U.S. embassy announced Ray had started his journey back to the United States but declined to enlarge on the trip schedule. Other sources said the former Missouri convict was taken to an airfield near London shortly after midnight London

Earlier Thusrday British authorities completed legal steps allowing Ray's extradition to the United States.

Ray will go back to Memphis, Tenn., to stand trial for murder in the April 4 sniper slaying of the civil rights leader. Even Ray's American attorney, Arthur J. Hanes Sr. of Birmingham, Ala., did not know the schedule for Ray's return. He complained he was refused permission to fly back in the plane with Ray.

"I don't want this man grilled, cross-examined interrogated in the plane when I'm not there," Hanes said, adding he had told Ray to "keep his mouth shut" and "not even talk about the weather."

At Memphis, authorities prepared for Ray's arrival by imposing tight security around the concrete county building

complex. State troopers, deputy sheriffs and city policemen were placed on duty around the building. They were armed with pistols and night sticks.

British authorities also were secretive about the trip.

"There is nothing we can say at the moment," the press secretary for the British Home Office said.

The last legal hurdle to the extradition was cleared when the Home Secretary, James Callaghan, signed an order handed down July 2 by London's chief magistrate. The order dismissed British charges that Ray entered Britain with a revolver and phony passports.

Hanes charged he was being kept in the dark about Ray, and accused the U.S. Justice Department of making "A Yankee Stadium, P. T. Barnum Show' out of the extradition case.

A spokesman for the U.S. Air Force referred all queries to the U.S embassy.



# Alleged assassin used

## double alias

### By JOSEPH HANAFIN and ROBERT TAYLOR

James Earl Ray, accused of assassinating Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., practised double deception during his month long hide-out in the Montreal area last year.

He registered in a Dorion motel as John L. Rayns on the night of July 17, 1967, but used the alias Eric S. Galt for the remainder of his local sojourn which ended on Aug. 18,

Ray claimed in a recently published story in Look magazine about his activities here that he used only the Galt name while in Canada.

He said he chose the name while passing the city of Galt, Ont., on his way to Montreal and used it during visits to St. Jovite and Ottawa.

The 40-year-old alleged killer, whose trial is scheduled in Memphis, Tenn., for the middle of November, arrived in Dorion just one day after he fled the United States where he was sought for escaping from the Missouri State Penitentiary.

The records of the Bourgarde Motel show that he

registered under the name of Rayns and listed his address as 507 Chestnut street, Winnetka, Ill. The address was that of a restaurant where Ray was employed for several weeks prior to his flight to Canada.

He was known to his employers as John L. Rayns, a name he often used after his jail break.

Although motel officials did not take his licence number, the desk clerk at the time noted he was driving a 1962 Plymouth.

The description of that car matches that of a vehicle purchased by Ray for \$200 in East St. Louis, Mo., just before he crossed into Canada at Windsor, Ont.

The man who owned the Bourgarde Hotel last year, Guy Richer, says he remembers nothing about his infamous client.

After his one night stay in Dorion, Ray reverted to the alias of Eric Stavo Galt.

At the Har-K Apartments, 2859 Notre Dame street east, where Ray signed a six month lease but stayed only until mid-August; and at the Gray Rocks Inn, a resort hotel in St. Jovite, 78 miles north of Montreal, he used the Galt name.

He also gave that name and his Notre Dame street address to a travel agency, located on Peel street, which arranged his reservation at Gray Rocks. The manager of the travel agency requested that their name not be published.

The man who made Ray's reservation and took a \$20 cash deposit from him was unable to recognize or recall anything about him. He added that Ray was probably in the office for about only 10 minutes

#### Waterfront haunt

At several other places that Ray is known to have frequented, the story is much the same.

He seems to have gone out

of his way to behave unobtrusively and apparently always fit into whatever background necessary.

Along the city's toughwaterfront between Place Royale and Place d'Youville where he spent much of his time in hopes of obtaining false identity papers, no one could

place the gaunt, stern-faced Ray.

The alleged killer claims that he spent several nights drinking in the Neptune Tavern, 121 Commissioners street west, and that he met a man named Raoul who offered him \$12,000 to complete a mysterious assignment in the United States.

J. M. Charron, owner of the Neptune for the past several years, said it would be almost impossible to disaprove Ray's claim.

Peering at a recent photograph of Ray, Mr. Charron commented, "It could be that he was here. Who is going to say otherwise?

"I might have seen him and maybe even talked to him but it has been a year and two months since he was here. It is very, very difficult to say from pictures. They can be deceiving. And maybe he was wearing a disguise.

"Perhaps if I saw him in person I could say for sure."

As for Raoul, Mr. Charron said that the description of the man supplied by Ray "could be almost any sailor who comes in here every night of the year."

"We get all sorts in here. And especially last year with Expo on . . . Oh Boy! We had Russians, Englishmen, Americans, Negroes, yellows, whites . . . everybody.

"No, I cannot say that I

"No, I cannot say that I recall anyone by the name of Raoul who hung out here." Employes at the Mariner's

House, 165 Place d'Youville, echoed Mr. Charron's words, as did waiters and barmen at Joe Beef's tavern, some 50 yards down the street.

"Who can tell for sure," a waiter at Joe Beef's men tioned. "We had so many people in here during Expo. We have so many in normal years but last year makes it even more impossible to figure."

Ray's chameleonic attributes served him well at the luxurious Gray Rock's resort where he stayed for a full week between July 31 and Aug. 5. Not a single employe remembered his face.

He spent so little time at the bar during the week that his liquor bill amounted to a penny-pinching \$8. He paid that, and the \$155 it cost for his single room with a bath, in cash. It was near the end of that week that he encountered the now famous lady civil servant from Ottawa.

Ray's romantic adventure with his civil servant girl friend who he had hoped would help get him a false Canadian passport, was probably the only close relationship he had in Montreal.

The connection between Ray and the lady whose identity still remains a secret was raised in the House of Commons this week but government officials pleaded ignorance to the existence of a romance and of the lady herself.

Local RCMP spokesmen also disclaimed any knowledge of her and refused comment as to whether they are investigating the matter.

Both the RCMP and the

Both the RCMP and the American FBI, however, have been scouring Ray's local hangouts since long before his arrest in England on June 8 of this year.

They asked for and received receipts, registration slips, and other material from Ray's lodgings and from the Tip Top Tailors shop, 488 St. Catherine street west, where he bought clothing and had a jacket altered.

Investigators also visited Ray's waterfront haunts but apparently had little success in discovering anyone who remembered him.

One thing which police overlooked was the night spent by Ray in the motel Bourgarde on Harwood boulevard in Dorion where he used the Rayns alias.

Mr. Richer told The Star that he was never contacted by anyone, police or journalists, about the subject until he received a visit from two Star reporters.

Operators of other Dorion motels, including Le Pavillon and the Miss Dorion said that they had been interrogated about the night of July 17, 1967.

# Government silent on Ray's girl-friend

Canadian Press

OTTAWA, Oct. 30 — Solicitor General George McIlraith says — he knows nothing of the case of an unnamed Canadian government employe reported to have been the girl-friend of James Earl Ray, accused of the assassination of Martin Luther King.

He also declined in the Commons to say whether an investigation was made to see whether the woman, or anyone else, helped Ray obtain a forged Canadin passport.

Mr. McIlraith faced a series of questions from Eldon Wolliams (PC-Calgary North), apparently linked to a Look magazine story saying Ray had visited a girl-friend in Ottawa after he escaped from penitenitary in Missouri, eight months before King's slaying last April.

The woman was described as a "cultivated, sensitive" woman with a responsible government

Mr. MIlraith started to say that he did not know the young lady and was drowned out by opposition laughter.

opposition laughter.
"You're slipping, George,"
called out Russell MacEwan
(PC-Central Nova).

Mr. Woolliams congratulated the minister on his "purity," and went on to ask whether he would report on the alleged forgery and make public documents that led up to its issuance.

#### Knew nothing

Mr. McIliain said he knew nothing of the case but would be glad to make inquiries. He added that it would not be proper for him to disclose details on any criminal case until investigation is completed.

But he refused to say, in answer to another question, whether an investigation is actually going on.

Ray was carrying a forged Canadian passport when arrested in London last June.

Mr. Woolliams, interviewed outside the Commons later, said "the government owes it to her" to investigate the allegation. The possible international implications also warranted an inquiry.

External Affairs Minister Sharp had talked during the election campaign about reviewing the whole issue of passports. "That department is really understaffed and needs assistance," Mr. Wooliams

Saying again that the passport documents should be tabled in the Commons, Mr. Woolliams asked: "Who actually signed the application for the passport?" (Indicate page, name of newspaper, city and state.)

William Bradford Huie has written a third article for "Look" nagazine. The article appears in the issue dated April 15, 1869, but this issue was circulated on April 1, 1889. A review of the article reveals that James Farl Ray allegedly registered at the Travelodge Motel, Five Points, Birmingham, Alabama, on March 29, 1868; at a motel near Florence, Alabama, on April 1, 1868; and at a motel near Corinth, Mississippi, on April 2, 1868. It is to be noted that Ray, using the name Sarvey Lowmyer, negotiated the purchase of a rifle at the Aeromarine Supply Company, Birmingham, Alabama, on March 29 and 50, 1868. On April 3, 1868, he was registered at the Rebel Motel in Memphis, Tennassee.

In an effort to establish whether or not Ray was in contact with any individuals immediately prior to the assassination, appropriate investigation should be conducted by the Eirmingham and Jackson Offices. It should be understood that there is to be no indication made whatsoever that the following investigation has any connection whatsoever with the case involving James Earl Ray.

Dirmingham and Jackson Cifices should make inquiries of the motels in or near the cities indicated above to determine the identities of individuals registered during the period March 29 to April 3, 1966. Efforts should be made to identify all individuals listed, as well as

obtaining descriptions and registrations for the automobiles of such persons. A review of such records might indicate whether any one individual might have accompanied Ray or been in contact with him during this period. Fertinent or questionable registration records should be obtained if possible for examination by the FBI Laboratory.

Memphis should insure that the Bureau is kept currently advised of pertinent developments in this case, particularly all aspects of court action since the death of Judge Battle on March 31, 1969.
