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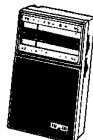

Gambling Talk Spices Debate

**House Adopts Ethics Code,
Hears Charge That Ring
Operates On Hill**

WASHINGTON, April 3. — (UPI) — The House adopted a code of ethics Wednesday after debate sparked by revelation that a gambling ring operates on Capitol Hill with daily payoffs in the thousands of dollars.

A 40 to 1 roll call vote approved the code. With Representative Peter F. W. (R-N.J.) objecting to the measure's disclosure provision, arguing it was unneeded and unclear, the Senate approved a code of ethics on March 22.

Representative John Kyl (R-Ariz.) said a quiet investigation over the past year shows "a very large number" of congressional employees involved in "illegal, well-organized" activity including numbers racket, sports pools and similar betting ventures.

"I have been closely involved with the investigation," Kyl told the House. "I am personally satisfied that no member of the House or any of its officials are involved in these activities."

Business Hopefuls Learn Profit Makes The Game Go

WASHINGTON, April 3. — (UPI) — The name of the game is profits, Leonard J. Small, director of Project Outreach, told 17 Negro businessmen and potential businessmen at LeMoyne College last night.

Mr. Small's comment came during the first of 12 weekly lectures in business management and operation which will be conducted at the college under the sponsorship of National Business League. Next week's lecture will be at 7 p.m. Wednesday.

He pointed up the need for a business approach in business. "You've got to learn to forget sentimentality in business and learn that this country is run on profit. If a man can't pay for something, except the necessities of life, of course, then he doesn't need it."

"Know what you want to do, know what it will take to do it, and what your chances of success are before going into business."

During the lecture series, Mr. Small said, businessmen who have been successful will talk to the students. In addition, small groups of businessmen attending the lectures will discuss their individual problems and share methods they have developed for solving them.

A poll of the 17 persons at last night's session showed the students range from sundry and grocery store owners to a real estate broker who is working out final arrangements for marketing his product — a plastic, disposable baby Communion set.

Mr. and Mrs. Aubrey Blayde, who operate a grocery at Woodstock and are working to get a Small Business Administration loan for a supermarket, were in the class.

"We came because we wanted to know more about how to handle credit," Mr. Blayde said. "And how to be better businessmen." R.I.C. Mrs. Blayde.

Coin Collection Girls Green Light

WASHINGTON, April 3. — (UPI) — The Senate Wednesday approved a \$5-million-dollar tax break for heirs of a drug company fortune who would also permit the Smithsonian

institution to acquire the famous Lilly gold coin collection.

Passed by voice vote and sent to the House was a relief bill sponsored by Indiana Democratic Senator Vance Miller and Birch Bayh.

Involved was the multi-million dollar estate of Tobias K. Lilly, founder of the Lilly pharmaceutical firm of Indianapolis.

When Lilly died in 1966, he left in his estate a collection of 5,125 gold coins. Their value would have been subject to federal estate tax.

But the Smithsonian indicated it was interested in getting the collection, a move which officials claimed would make their numismatic section second to none.

Under the bill, the coins would have been subject to the Smithsonian without charge. The measure, however, would permit the value of the coins to be credited against federal taxes on the Lilly estate.

Continuation of the move would benefit the government despite the resulting revenue loss.

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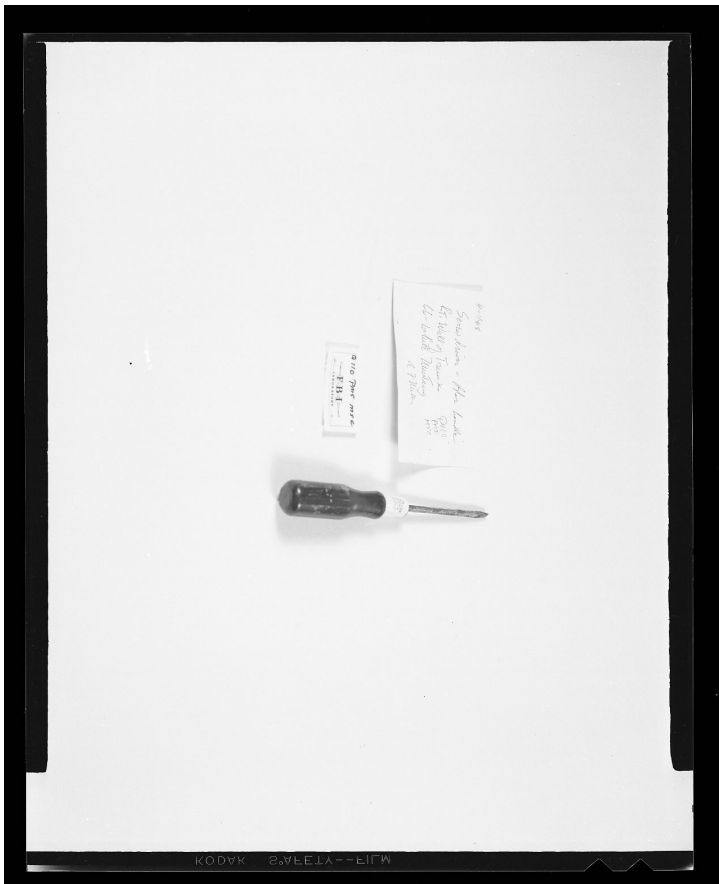
