TORNADO ALLEY—High winds and tornadoes struck several Mid-South areas last night, with widespread damage near Knoxville between Knoxville and Star City, and north of Crawfordville near the Vincent community in Arkansas. Another hit north of Memphis near Millington. Areas near Corinth also were hit.

Tornado Strikes Near Millington; At Least 30 Hurt

An estimated 30 to 40 persons were injured when a tornado struck near the Shady Lawn Trailer Court at 7900 Raleigh-Millington road, near the climax of a night in which violent weather left persons dead in Arkansas and Tennessee.

Two persons were reported dead at Atoka, Tenn., 35 miles northeast of Memphis. Late last night and seven were known dead after a earlier tornado which ripped through the Star City, Ark., area before disappearing around Hughes.

Eleven persons went to Crittenden Memorial Hospital in West Memphis, Ark., after deputies and Arkansas State Police freed them from the rubble of houses which were wrecked in Vincent, Ark., and four others were taken there after a house trailer was overturned at James Mill.

Shelby County Sheriff William W. Morris Jr. said he and his child were believed to be the only persons seriously injured when the tornado hit the southwest quadrant of the trailer park south of Millington where 200 to 300 trailers are usually parked.

He said the man was injured when he got a flying television. Most of the injured were taken to Navy Hospital in Millington. Residents in the trailer court said they had almost no warning of the storm which hit around 10 p.m.

Some were with in our back bedroom and we had just went to bed," he said. "I told my husband that I knew it was flying to us because I told him to go grab the baby. Just as we got to the room the trailer overturned. We had just a few minutes."

Robert Wheeler of the Millington Fire Department, who lives at the trailer park, stood beside his demolished trailer with a double-barreled shotgun and said he, his wife, daughter, three sons and a grand-daughter when the car was crushed under asphalt the trailer landed in bed with one of his sons. No one was injured.

Refugees from the park and about 10 persons who were separated from their families were housed in a trailer at Baker Community Center near the trailer park. Sheriff Morris said arrangements were made for lodging for all the park residents.

"We were lucky on injuries," he said. Four trailers were said to have been run out of the park after the storm.

Officials said they were totaling damage to at least 40 trailers, many turned over and ripped by high winds that accompanied the twister.

King Challenges LBJ Going To Hawaii Today To Consult On Peace Moves Set Stage For Red Meeting

But US Attorney Says Ban To Be Enforced, Even If Troops Needed

Attorneys representing Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. go before United States Dist. Judge Bailey Brown at 8:30 this morning to challenge a temporary restraining order against any march here.

Dr. King and other planning a Monday march in support of striking sanitation workers yesterday appeared headed toward a possible clash with the order—if it remains in force.

"We are not going to be stopped by force or injunction," said Dr. King. "We are going to be stopped by force or injunction."

But United States Atty. Thomas Robbins said the temporary order will be enforced even if it means calling in federal troops.

Dr. King's attorneys, Louis Lucas, Walter Bailey and Lucius Burch, talked behind closed doors with Judge Brown for about an hour yesterday. They are expected this morning to challenge the jurisdiction of the federal courts to stop the march.

Dr. King said granting of an injunction against the march would be a "big deal" of First Amendment privileges.

He stated on the basis of conscience we have had to break injunctions and if necessary we may do it (in Memphis). We'll cross that bridge when we come to it.

Mr. Robbins reacted quickly when asked about injunctions. "We are going to see that the court's order is enforced until it is either amended or dissolved," he said.

"Such action as is necessary to enforce and carry out the order will be taken," he pointed out that federal troops may be used to enforce the federal court order.

He said that when the Memphis School was desegregated in Little Rock.

"We are making sure that Dr. King and others are being protected," he said.

Within minutes after Judge Brown signed the restraining order, yesterday two United States marshals stood across the street from the Star City trailer court.

Dr. King and four other defendants named in the injunction, Hosea Williams, Rev. James Orange, Ralph D. Abernathy and Bernard Lee, sat in jail at the Lorraine Motel.

Dr. King said a sixth defendant, the Rev. James Bevel, was not of town but promised to notify marshals when the order expires.

The city's petition for the injunction against the march is based generally on the idea that the mass march led by Dr. King last Thursday would be a riot and, therefore, the city has good reason to fear more civil disorder if another mass march is held.

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LBJ Going To Hawaii Today To Consult On Peace Moves Set Stage For Red Meeting

US Wary Of Bid To Talk Of Peace On Enemy Terms

WASHINGTON, April 3.—The administration is eager to talk to North Vietnam about Hanoi's latest peace proposals, but it is frankly suspicious that it is merely being invited to talk about ending the war on the enemy's terms.

The fear in official quarters here is that the Hanoi government has misjudged the recent political convulsion in the United States, and may be acting on the illusion that the departure of former Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara, the replacement of Gen. William Westmoreland, and the forthcoming retirement of President Johnson mean that the administration is prepared to accept Hanoi's four-point peace plan.

That, of course, the Johnson administration is not prepared to do, still regards the Hanoi proposals as an invitation to surrender, and a standing on Johnson's statement of last Sunday that "the United States will never accept a false solution to this long and protracted struggle and call it peace."

The main difference between Hanoi's latest proposal and its previous suggestions is that the North Vietnamese government has dropped its demand that bombing and other acts of war against North Vietnam be stopped before it will talk. Now it has agreed to talk first but only about acceptance of precisely the enemy's terms.

Nevertheless, the administration is following up the latest proposal in the hope that the preliminary talks will lead to a wider agenda, and hopefully, to some kind of arrangement to limit military activity on both sides while talks proceed.

The purpose of Johnson's trip to Hawaii Thursday night is supposed to be to review the strategic and diplomatic approach to the talks, even if the administration is not prepared to accept Hanoi's four-point peace plan.

It is also important to define with the greatest precision the instructions to be given to the envoys who will contact Hanoi's officials, and if possible to get agreement to the negotiating instructions from the South Vietnamese government, which has been increasingly uneasy about the trend of United States policy in Vietnam ever since the reassignment of Westmoreland.

So much has been said about the importance of starting talks any kind of talks, that this has come to be regarded as a sign of impending peace.

Officials here are not sure that, but they think serious negotiations—if these can be started after the preliminary phase—will be carried on for a long time while the fighting continues in the South.

HANOI OFFER OF TALKS ACCEPTED BY JOHNSON

WASHINGTON, April 3.—(UPI)—The United States and North Vietnam took a small step toward peace today when President Johnson accepted Hanoi's offer of talks.

The United States agreed to the "unconditional cessation of the United States bombing raids and all other acts of war against the Democratic Republic of Vietnam so that talks may start."

He announced the United States "will establish contact with the representatives of North Vietnam. Consultations with the government of South Vietnam and other allies are now taking place."

The President also said he would fly to Honolulu, Hawaii, late Thursday evening for a long meeting of conference with American officials from South Vietnam.

Johnson did not say how contact would be made with North Vietnam, or when or where.

Geneva, Switzerland, was considered a likely site. The President already has had his private negotiators in the event North Vietnam claim to respond to the cessation of the bombing raids by the United States.

There was no word from Moscow or any other world capital of the President's move. It was obvious that Johnson, after a full and hectic day of announcements, considered it unwise to be getting into a war with a major superpower.

President had a lengthy meeting with his top advisers and then went to a White House dinner before a battery of cameras.

He read a statement quoting from an official United States government spokesman that the English-language broadcast of the North Vietnamese government statement, The English version followed a West.

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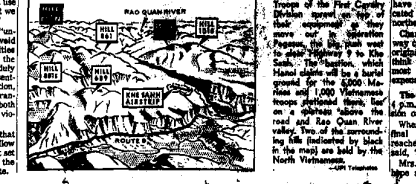

Dr. King urged people to leave work and school on Monday's strike. He is expected to speak again tonight during another meeting at Mason Temple.

Dr. Ralph Abernathy, one of Dr. King's aides, said it was a tribute to Dr. King's leadership that only a few persons read like fiction created in the March 28 march became a horrible reality.

He said despite Dr. King's hours he has not yet decided to be president of the United States.

"But he is the man who tells of the first assault foot to move into Memphis in the 1960s."

In New York yesterday, Dr. King's company and others had changed the mass march from Friday to Monday night. The demonstration ranks could be swelled by those planning a nationwide "march on Memphis."

The announcement of the massive convergence on Memphis was made by Bayard Rustin, president of the A. Philip Randolph Institute and organizer of the 1964 march on Washington, and Victor G. Hays, executive director of District Council 37 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (the union representing the Memphis strikers).

The two men said more than 6,800 persons are expected to converge on Memphis from throughout the country.

And John De Lury, president of the (Montgomery, Ala.) Sanitation Workers Union, said a strike there, said members of his union plan a mass movement on Memphis by plane, train, bus and private car to join the march.

The number of strike and non-connected incidents continued to decline. The last battalion of the Tennessee National Guard—the last unit who was released from active duty here during the emergency had returned to their homes gradually over the last few days. Guard officials said they could be started again in a matter of hours.

The 300 Tennessee Highway Patrol troopers who had been here since Thursday also returned home yesterday.

Clark & Zeiner Will Build Civic Center Hotel

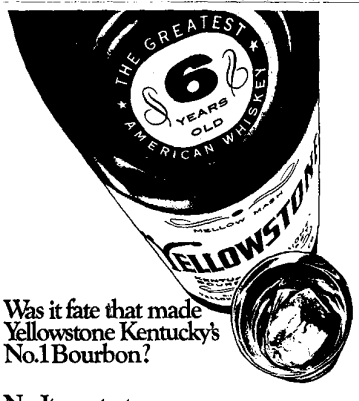

LBJ's Health Is Discounted As Factor In Withdrawing

President Johnson's health would have permitted him to become a candidate for another term of office, two of his physicians said yesterday.

Dr. James C. Cain of the Mayo Clinic of Rochester, Minn., said the President, who is 59, is in excellent condition.

His cardiologist, Dr. J. Willis Hurst of Emory University at Atlanta, said Mr. Johnson has "had no trouble at all" since his heart attack in 1965 and there is no reason to believe he would be in any danger during the next four years.

While health presumably was not involved in the shaping of the President's decision, the physicians indicated that had they been asked for a medical opinion, neither would have hesitated to give his approval.

Some speculation on reasons for the decision, other than those Mr. Johnson gave, has involved concern over whether he could withstand four years more of burden.

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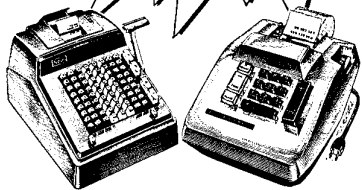

Senators Say Offer By Hanoi Is Encouraging

WASHINGTON, April 3.—Mid-South hawks and doves agreed Wednesday Hanoi's surprise offer to negotiate is encouraging, even though murky and unclear.

Senator John Stennis (D-Miss.), chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and a leading hawk, cautioned that "it is impossible to know now what is meant but certainly appears to be significant and encouraging."

Chairman J. W. Fulbright (D-Ark.) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and a leading dove, said the offer is "certainly very important."

"It is quite different from the outright rejection we have received on past occasions," Fulbright said he hoped there would be a cease-fire before any formal negotiations begin, but would not make this a precondition for talks.

Fulbright conceded he was wrong when he predicted in the Senate Tuesday that the new bombing restrictions imposed by President Johnson would prove of little consequence.

He said the offer is "at least in movement — movement away from dead center."

"We don't know whether this is a genuine overture or a propaganda move to counteract President Johnson's move which had world appeal. Nevertheless, we must assume that it is genuine and serious and explore it and exploit it if while it is the first over possible."

"The thing I have cautioned against is a repetition of the Panmunjom experience in Korea in which we lost more men than we gained."

 WASHINGTON, April 3. — (UPI) — The Senate Wednesday approved a 5.5-million-dot- per-bar tax break for heirs of a drug company fortune which would also permit the Smithso- nian Institution to acquire the famous Lilly gold coin col- lection.
