SECRET SERVICE, LOS ANGELES, ADVISED SEPTEMBER LAST THOME INVESTIGATED FOR WRITING LETTER TO PRESIDENT JOHNSON STATING HE WAS "IN GRAVE DANGER", AND OPPOSING WAR IN VIETNAM. THOME INCARCERATED TWICE CAMARILLO STATE HOSPITAL AS SCHIZOPHRENIC PARANOID. THOME ARRESTED MARCH, NINETEEN SIXTY SIX FOR THREATENING NEIGHBOR WITH GUN AND IN JUNE SIXTY SEVEN FOR DRUNK DRIVING. WHEN HE HAD UNLOADED SHOTGUN IN CAR.

The three rifles, which were delivered to identification Division on 4/8/68, together with the Remington Model 700.243 caliber rifle, the rifle box, nine boxes of ammunition, and a set of rings and bases for a Redfield scope are being returned under suparate cover to the Birmingham Division.

It should be noted that two latent (ingerprints and one latent palm print were developed on the Browning rifle. serial = #3700Z5, and three latent fingerprints were developed on one of the boxes of ammunition. These latent prints remain unidentified. Photographs and negatives of these latent prints were prepared and are available for comparison purposes.

two white men, not further identified, who claimed they planned to assassinate KING on this occasion and wanted to retain attorney HORTON to defend them. Reverend BARFIELD stated that attorney HORTON died 6/9/67 in Grenada, Mississippi (allegedly committed suicide).

He described former attorney HORTON as an alcoholic, having very little law practice but believed the attorney to have actually been approached by the above two unidentified man.

Reverend BARFIELD further advised that he has no additional information concerning the above incident.

being presented to these marches by those individuals with strong segregation beliefs. STARNS stated that he himself is a liberal in his view towards Negroes and that he did not participate in any of the activities that took place in Denham Springs in the Summer of 1967. He stated, however, that he did frequently converse with individuals whom he considered to be members of the Ku Klux Klan, these persons having been individuals that he grew up with in Denham Springs.

STARNS stated that at no time during this period did any information come to his attention that there were businessmen in Denham Springs, La., or in Baton Rouge, La., who were taking up a collection to obtain money to have MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR., assassinated. STARNS does not recall of having heard the name of KING even mentioned during the Summer of 1967, nor does he recall any information which would indicate there was a plot to kill any particular Negro or any individual of any race for that matter.

STARNS is against violence and if any information such as a plot to kill anyone had come to his attention, he would promptly notify an appropriate law enforcement agency.

During the Fall of 1967, STARNS recalls that an individual subsequently known to him as ROBERT STRADER appeared at the Earnest C. Donnell Construction Company in Denham Springs making claims to EARNEST DONNELL that he could obtain considerable financing from a SHAPIRO family in Miami, Fla. DONNELL became interested in STRADER's proposition and ordered STARNS to accompany STRADER to Miami, Fla., which he did and at which time he and STRADER met with a Mr. and Mrs. SHAPIRO. It developed, however, that STRADER did not previously know the SHAPIRO family and further that STRADER actually had no contacts or was not in a position to obtain financing for the Donnell Construction Company.

It was during the trip to Miami, Fla., that STARNS realized that STRADER had an apparent mental problem.

STARNS recalled that while staying in motels in Fla, STRADER at times became most irrational and envisioned that he was being followed by Federal Agents.

After the Florida trip, STRADER continued to hang around the Donnell Company in Denham Springs, La., at which time STRADER's wife was also present, In STARNS' opinion, STRADER's wife is also an irrational person.

On one occasion, STRADER who was doing some work for the Donnell Company, took STARNS' personally owned vehicle with the permission of STARNS on a business trip. STRADER's wife accompanied STRADER on this trip and they did not return as scheduled. The vehicle was subsequently located in Mississippi in an abandoned position. Also at this same time, STARNS and EARNEST DONNELL discovered that STRADER had stolen some property from the company, such as a portable electric typewritler, a brief case full of valuable engineering fittings, a telephone credit card and other miscellaneous items. Also taken from the STARNS vehicle was a .38 Police Special Revolver which was a sentimental keepsake which had been given to STARNS by his father.

The theft of these items was reported to law enforcement agencies but DONNELL subsequently decided not to press charges. The revolver has never been recovered by STARNS and he does not presently know its whereabouts.

STARNS heard from some unrecalled source several months ago that STRADER either was or is presently confined to a mental institution. He has not seen STRADER since late Fall of 1967.

STRADER was a braggart by nature, frequently announced his animosity towards Negroes but was never known to STARNS to have specifically mentioned MARTIN LUTHER KING or any other particular Negro. STRADER frequently bragged that he had contacts with the underworld but never specifically mentioned anyone by name.

STARNS concluded that he is at a loss to explain why it is alleged that he possessed information concerning

a plot to raise money to kill MARTIN KING. He stated that he wanted to cooperate fully with the FBI, which agency he admires considerably and that if any further recollection concerning the Summer of 1967 in Denham Springs came to him, he would promptly advise the New Orleans Office.

STARNS described STRADER as a white male, 6'2" tall, 36 years of age and possessing blond wavy hair. During the Summer of 1967, STARNS personally owned a 1967 Oldsmobile, white over black, bearing Texas license KLX or KLW 491.

New Orleans indices contained no identifiable information in the name of RAYMOND HENRY STARNS or ROBERT HOOD STRADER.

JOHNSON said that THOME remained at the cafe, working as a dishwasher until March 30, 1968, at which time JOHNSON said he had to let THOME go because he was "bothering" the JOHNSON said he considered THOME to be a religious agitator and fanatic. JOHNSON said THOME stated "Buddhism is the true religion". JOHNSON said THOME spoke on and of many subjects and topics. JOHNSON said further THOME told him he was in complete sympathy with MARTIN LUTHER KING and "felt he was following the right path". JOHNSON said THOME called all Negroes "brother". JOHNSON said further that THOME told him one time that if he could vote that he would vote for GEORGE WALLACE for president. JOHNSON said further that THOME wanted to "overthoow the government" because he felt "the people were being lied to and cheated" and said "we are not getting our fair share". JOHNSON said he considered THOME to be "mentally unbalanced" and a person who drank very heavily while he was employed by him.

JOHNSON advised that to his knowledge THOME had no associates, friends or relatives in this area. JOHNSON said prior to his first employment in February, 1968, that he did not know or had never seen THOME. JOHNSON said further that while THOME was employed this last time that he made three long-distance calls, which two calls were made on 3/25 and 26/68, to Dallas, Texas, and a call on 3/29/68, to an unrecalled place. JOHNSON said THOME had paid for the call but that the calling numbers were not known to him, JOHNSON, at this time as he had not misplaced his telephone bill.

JOHNSON stated that THOME was arrested one time during his stay with him and that was by the Sheriff's Office at Mineral Wells, Texas. JOHNSON said THOME left this Saturday about noon on March 31, 1968, hitchhiking and that he has had no contact or heard from THOME since that time.

JOHNSON said during the period of time THOME was here, that he received no telephone calls nor visitors.

JOHNSON said he had no other background information concerning this individual whatsoever, and knows no person who would have information as to his whereabouts.

AT MINERAL WELLS, TEXAS:

On May 12, 1968, GILBERT SOMMERFELD, Sheriff, Palo Pinto County, advised that under Mineral Wells PD #14622 that HAROLD JAMES THOME was arrested by him at 12:25 AM on March 28, 1968, near the river bridge west of Mineral Wells. Sheriff SOMMERFLED said this arrest occurred after a cab driver reported to him a passenger stated he was going to jump in the river after being taken to the/Fiver bridge. He said he took THOME to the Mineral Wells Jail and booked him for investigation. Sheriff SOMMERFELD stated that he released THOME the following morning without charges as he felt this person had a mental distubbance. Sheriff SOMMERFELD said that THOME had no weapons on him at the time of his arrest but that he was carrying a briefcase full of religious literature and verses.

Sheriff SOMMERFELD said that THOME told him thathe did not know any person in this area, except his employer at the River Ranch Cafe, and had no relatives in the area. THOME said that he was from California. Sheriff SOMMERFELD described THOME as follows:

1. Reference is made to the report concerning the above subject made by telephone to Mr. S.J. Papich at 0930 on 17 April 1968. Following is a full account of the investigation made in this case:

Calif

A. On 16 April 1968 a United States National Maritime Union official in Yokohama reported that one Gerald Lee Richards, who bore a general physical resemblance to the description given of the suspected assassin of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. had arrived in Japan about 15 April 1968 and requested a position aboard any ship going anywhere. Richards became agitated when asked for a contact address in Japan and refused to divulge his Japanese residence. National Maritime Union official described Richards as 5° 10" tall, 155 pounds, with brown hair, a receding hairline on both sides, and a not very prominent scar two and one-half inches long traversing the center forehead, his most outstanding characteristic being a disconcerting, idiotic grin resembling a constant grimace. According to Richards documents and statements, he was born applied for seaman's papers in San Pedro, California, 16 June 1964 and registered there as a United States National Maritime Union member on 21 February 1968 but never shipped out His Social Security Number is his United

- B. A subsequent check with the Japanese National Police Agency confirmed the biographic data supplied by the National Maritime Union official. A ward check indicated that Richards originally resided in Japan from 1963 to 1964 and married TAKAYAMA Michiko in 1963. Both Richards and his wife left Japan for the United States in 1964. Richards returned alone to Japan about 15 April 1968. His wife's address in the United States is listed as 160 Hosoi (phonetic) Street, Carpenteria, California, 93013.
- C. A photograph of Richards obtained from the Japanese police was shown to the National Maritime Union official and identified by him as the individual in subparagraph 1A above who had applied for a seaman's berth. The photograph of Richards bears no apparent resemblance to photographs of suspected assassin James Earl Ray provided by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.
- 2. The above information has been given to the Legal Attache of the United States Embassy in Tokyo.

On April 30, 1968, WYATT STANLEY, North 6118 Cook, Spokane, Washington, was drinking in Casey's Gay 90's, 457 Northtown Shopping Center, Spokane, and engaged in a conversation and had a few drinks with an individual who identified himself as BILL LEE. During the conversation, the matter of racial problems came up, and LEE indicated he was from the South and subsequently said he would pay STANLEY \$10,000 to kill RAP BROWN or STOKELY CARMICHAEL. He mentioned the Ku Klux Klan and the Minutemen and said "We" will furnish couriers or planes for carrying this out and any kind of gun wanted. LEE then remarked the mark has been put on RAP BROWN, STOKELY CARMICHAEL, and ROBERT KENNEDY. He then gave STANLEY a business card from Follett Music Company, West 1131 First Avenue, Spokane, and on the back wrote the name "BILL LEE" then "yes ---," "no---," and "where---." LEE said he could be called at that place and STANLEY was simply to answer yes or no and to indicate where he could be contacted. STANLEY said LEE had been drinking but did not appear to be intoxicated.

ROBERT FOLLETT, Follett Music Company, Spokane, stated LEE was employed by him as a salesman on March 23, 1968, and was employed by him in Spokane, Washington, or the immediate vicinity on April 4, 1968. FOLLETT also stated that LEE is a "blowhard" and that he recalls that when Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR., was killed, LEE had remarked he had been offered \$5,000 to do this job four or five years ago.

It was determined that LEE had been employed by radio station KSPO, Spokane, prior to the time he was employed by Follett Music Company.

He served in the Navy from 1948 to 1952, received an Honorable Discharge, and they were married in Norfolk, Virginia, in February, 1953.

After marriage, they went to Atlanta, Georgia, where he was employed by the Credit Department at W. T. Graham Company. They went to Albany, Georgia, in 1954 where he worked for a loan company and subsequently transferred to Montgomery, Alabama, stayed in Montgomery until about 1959 where he changed employment to Sears Roebuck and Company. They went to Leesburg, Florida, in 1959, where he was Credit Manager for the Sears and Roebuck Store, then he quit Sears and Roebuck Company and went to Los Angeles. California, in March, 1960.

After several months of unemployment in Los Angeles, he went to work with the Westinghouse Corporation in the Wholesale Credit Department and thereafter started "job jumping." During the time they were in California, he worked painting automobiles for a milk company, at a hotdog stand, and was unemployed much of the time. He then went to work for Koret of California as a trainee and was transferred to the Spokane, Washington, territory in September, 1966.

After coming to Spokane, he stayed with Koret until about February, 1967, and had subsequently worked for Pitney-Bowes, the Washington Health Service, Radio Station KSPO, and most recently with Follett Music Company. She said he was employed there March 23, 1968, and is still employed.

Mrs. LEE said he had not been back to any portion of the South since leaving in 1960 to Los Angeles, California. She described him as a very prejudice person, stated that he drinks considerably, and had made many wild statements.

She said he came home a few weeks ago saying that he had heard that someone would pay \$5,000 to "knock off" CARMICHAEL. She said his talk, apparently the result of alcohol, has no credibility at all, and she believes she is in need of psychiatric care. She said they have five children; and while he apparently loves the children, he is completely irresponsible as far as supporting them is concerned.

Mrs. LEE concluded that she has never had reason to believe that her husband has any knowledge whatever concerning the death of Doctor KING and has no contact whatsoever with anyone back in Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippi, or Georgia.

On May 14, 1968, WILLIAM B. LEE was interviewed at his residence at West 117 Garland Avenue, Spokane, Washington. When he was honorably discharged from the United States Navy in 1952, he went to work for the W. T. Graham Company, subsequently married his wife, ELVA, in March, 1953, in Norfolk, Virginia, then went to Albany, Georgia, where he was employed by a finance company.

He was transferred by this company to Montgomery, Alabama, in 1954 and then changed to employment with Sears Roebuck and Company in Montgomery. He was transferred as a Credit Manager for Sears Roebuck and Company to their store in Leesburg, Florida, but subsequently left Leesburg in January, 1960, to go to Los Angeles, California. In Los Angeles, he was employed by Nixon Merchandising Company and then by Koret of California as a trainee. He said there were other short time employments in California; but after training with Koret, he was sent to Spokane, Washington, as a District Representative in September, 1966. He said that since this time, he has been with his family in Spokane. He left Koret of California in February, 1967, and since that time has been employed by Pitney-Bowes, Washington Health Service, KSPO Radio and is presently employed by Follett Music Company and has been since March 23, 1968.

LEE has not been back to visit in the South since he left there in 1960. He said he has a strong feeling of loyalty toward the South and the southern people, that he does not particularly hate the Negro race, but believes in a segregated society. He stated he believes that riots, lootings, and killings are not helping the United States; and should the South ever call on him to take a stand, he would do so immediately.

LEE stated that in about 1953, when he was living in Albany, Georgia, that his uncle, T. A. CLEMENTS, Route 2, Sylvester, Georgia, who died in 1964, had told him he would give him \$100 to shoot MARTIN LUTHER KING. He said that he did not know whether his deceased uncle was serious but that whether he was or not, he could never kill a man in cold blood.

LEE said that about three or four weeks ago, he was drinking in Casey's Restaurant in Spokane and that he was in a conversation with an unknown individual. He said he and this man were discussing racial problems, and this individual said he would pay \$5,000 to see STOKELY CARMICHAEL or RAP BROWN killed. He said ROBERT KENNEDY's name was not mentioned at this time, but he does recall that later something was said regarding ROBERT KENNEDY and his stand on racial issues. LEE denied that he had ever said anything to anyone about killing BROWN or CARMICHAEL and that he could not raise any money under any circumstance.

LEE advised he has not been in contact with any of his old associates in Georgia or Alabama and since coming to the West Coast in 1960, has not been further east than Montana. He says he knows nothing about the murder of MARTIN LUTHER KING other than what he has read in the newspapers or seen on television or head over the radio. He denied belonging to any hate group of any kind.

LEE then remarked the mark has been put on RAP BROWN, STOKELY CARMICHAEL, and ROBERT KENNEDY. He then gave STANLEY a business card from Follett Music Company, West 1131 First Avenue, Spokane, and on the back wrote the name "BILL LEE" then "yes ---." "no---," and "where---." LEE said he could be called at that place and STANLEY was simply to answer yes or no and to indicate where he could be contacted. STANLEY said LEE had been drinking but did not appear to be intoxicated.

ROBERT FOLLETT, Follett Music Company, Spokane, stated LEE was employed by him as a salesman on March 23, 1968, and was employed by him in Spokane, Washington, or the immediate vicinity on April 4, 1968. FOLLETT also stated that LEE is a "blowhard" and that he recalls that when Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR., was killed, LEE had remarked he had been offered \$5,000 to do this job four or five years ago.

It was determined that LEE had been employed by radio station KSPO, Spokane, prior to the time he was employed by Follett Music Company.

She said he came home a few weeks ago saying that he had heard that someone would pay \$5,000 to "knock off" CARMICHAEL. She said his talk, apparently the result of alcohol, has no credibility at all, and she believes she is in need of psychiatric care. She said they have five children; and while he apparently loves the children, he is completely irresponsible as far as supporting them is concerned.

Mrs. LEE concluded that she has never had reason to believe that her husband has any knowledge whatever concerning the death of Doctor KING and has no contact whatsoever with anyone back in Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippi, or Georgia.

On May 14, 1968, WILLIAM B. LEE was interviewed at his residence at West 117 Garland Avenue, Spokane, Washington. When he was honorably discharged from the United States Navy in 1952, he went to work for the W. T. Graham Company, subsequently married his wife, ELVA, in March, 1953, in Norfolk, Virginia, then went to Albany, Georgia, where he was employed by a finance company.

He was transferred by this company to Montgomery. Alabama, in 1954 and then changed to employment with Sears Roebuck and Company in Montgomery. He was transferred as a Credit Manager for Sears Roebuck and Company to their store in Leesburg, Florida, but subsequently left Leesburg in January, 1960, to go to Los Angeles, California. In Los Angeles, he was employed by Nixon Merchandising Company and then by Koret of California as a trainee. He said there were other short time employments in California: but after training with Koret, he was sent to Spokane, Washington, as a District Representative in September, 1966. He said that since this time, he has been with his family in Spokane. He left Koret of California in February, 1967, and since that time has been employed by Pitney-Bowes, Washington Health Service, KSPO Radio and is presently employed by Follett Music Company and has been since March 23, 1968.

LEE has not been back to visit in the South since he left there in 1960. He said he has a strong feeling of loyalty toward the South and the southern people, that he does not particularly hate the Negro race, but believes in a segregated society. He stated he believes that riots, lootings, and killings are not helping the United States; and should the South ever call on him to take a stand, he would do so immediately.

LEE stated that in about 1953, when he was living in Albany, Georgia, that his uncle, T. A. CLEMENTS, Route 2, Sylvester, Georgia, who died in 1964, had told him he would give him \$100 to shoot MARTIN LUTHER KING. He said that he did not know whether his deceased uncle was serious but that whether he was or not, he could never kill a man in cold blood.

LEE said that about three or four weeks ago, he was drinking in Casey's Restaurant in Spokane and that he was in a conversation with an unknown individual. He said he and this man were discussing racial problems, and this individual said he would pay \$5,000 to see STOKELY CARMICHAEL or RAP BROWN killed. He said ROBERT KENNEDY's name was not mentioned at this time, but he does recall that later something was said regarding ROBERT KENNEDY and his stand on racial issues. LEE denied that he had ever said anything to anyone about killing BROWN or CARMICHAEL and that he could not raise any money under any circumstance.

LEE advised he has not been in contact with any of his old associates in Georgia or Alabama and since coming to the West Coast in 1960, has not been further east than Montana. He says he knows nothing about the murder of MARTIN LUTHER KING other than what he has read in the newspapers or seen on television or head over the radio. He denied belonging to any hate group of any kind.
