

The following additional pertinent information is being furnished relative to captioned case. The material set forth herein is based on preliminary information and complete details will be incorporated in reports of results of investigation.

There have been reports in the press indicating that subject's brother, John Larry Ray, is planning to travel to England to visit James Earl Ray. Press accounts have indicated he intended to apply for a passport on June 17, 1968.

Prior investigation has indicated John Larry Ray visited James Earl Ray while the subject was in prison, on at least nine occasions, the last of which was April 22, 1967, the day before the subject escaped from the Missouri State Penitentiary in Jefferson City. Missouri. John Larry Ray sent his brother money while in prison. He denies any knowledge of James Earl Ray's escape or knowledge of his whereabouts following his escape. By way of background on John Larry Ray, records of our Identification Division on John Larry Ray, FBI number 368 725 A, indicate he received a sentence of two to five years for second degree burglary on January 24, 1950, and served time in the Indiana State Reformatory, Pendleton, Indiana. He also served time in the Illinois State Penitentiary at Menard, Illinois, for larceny of a motor vehicle being received there on June 2, 1953, and later discharged on February 1, 1960.0

The above information is being made available to appropriate British authorities in the event John Larry Ray attempts to visit the JUN 18 1968 subject.

U. S. DEST OF JUSTIES ! Carol Repper, the sister of John Larry Ray and the subject, has advised that John Larry Ray does not have funds to make the trip, that she does not intend to furnish his funds and she doubts if he will make the trip to London.

Mr. Robert Johnson, Deputy Director, Passport Office, U. S. Department of State, advised that about 5:00 p. m. on June 14, 1968, the Passport Office in Washington, D. C., had been contacted by one Mr. Arthur Hanes, Sr., from Birmingham, Alabama. Mr. Hanes advised the Passport Office that he was an attorney and was going to London to represent Ray and wanted a passport for himself and his son whom he also described as an attorney. Mr. Johnson advised that he instructed his duty officer to inform Mr. Hanes that the Passport Office in New York would handle his request for a passport on Monday, June 17, 1968, since the Passport Office does not consent to issuing a passport to anyone on Sunday.

Mr. Johnson advised that Mr. Hanes, Sr., had stated his name as Mr. Arthur Hanes, Sr., that he was born in Alabama and that he is an attorney in Birmingham, Alabama.

Mr. Hanes, Sr. said his son is Arthur Hanes, Jr., born in Texas, also an attorney in Birmingham, Alabama. According to the information furnished by the Passport Office, Mr. Hanes, Sr. was reportedly contacted by an unidentified British attorney on June 14, 1968, relative to representing James Earl Ray. Mr. Hanes, Sr. then reportedly claimed he had contacted "a Mr. Pollak" in the U. S. Department of Justice.

For your information, Arthur Jackson Hanes, Jr., born at Birmingham, Alabama, represented defendants in the case involving the murder on March 25, 1965, of Viola Liuzzo, the woman from Michigan, who was in Alabama in connection with civil rights activities.

The attached memorandum is being furnished to Assistant Attorney General Stephen J. Pollak of the Civil Rights Division with a copy to Assistant Attorney General Fred M. Vinson, Jr., of the Criminal Division. The material contained in the attached memorandum has been taken from cablegrams and teletypes, and Pollak and Vinson are being informed that the material is based on preliminary information and complete details will be incorporated in reports setting forth results of investigation.

The Department is being advised of background on John Larry Ray, bject's brother, in light of the press reports indicating that he may be planning to go to England to visit James Earl Ray. The background information includes his arrest record and the fact that he visited James Earl Ray on nine occasions when the subject was in prison in this country, the last visit being on the day before James Earl Ray escaped in April, 1967, from Missouri State Penitentiary. The Department is being advised that British authorities are being furnished pertinent data on John Larry Ray.

The Passport Office, Department of State, Washington, D. C., has advised that they received a request for passport for himself and his son from Arthur Hanes, Sr., who claimed he desired the passport in connection with a request from Ray and his British lawyer that Hanes represent Ray in the United States. The Passport Office advised Hanes to check with the Passport Office in New York on Monday, June 17, 1968, they do not issue passports on Sunday. keC- 110

Hanes is a former Special Agent of the Bureau who entered on duty October 25, 1948, and resigned August 4, 1951, less than three years' service. Subsequent to his Bureau service he was mayor of Birmingham and represented Klansmen defendants in the case involving the murder of Viola Liuzzo, the Michigan woman who was shot and killed on March 25, 1965, near Selma, Alabama. We are informing the Department of the information from the Passport Office on Hanes' inquiry and that Hanes was a defense counsel in the Liuzzo case.

AFFIDAVIT

DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA) 881

ROBERT A. FRAZIER, being duly sworn, deposes and says:

- 1. I am 49 years old and I reside at 2705 Gaither Street, Hillcrest Heights, Maryland.
- 2. I obtained a Bachelor of Science Degree from the University of Idaho in 1960. I have been a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation since December 1942. I am Chief of the Firearms Unit of the Physics and Chemistry Section of the Federal Bureau of Investigation laboratories in Washington, D. C. I have been assigned to the Firearms Unit continuously since June 9, 1941. I received the specialized training program in firearms identification of approximately one year; duration from the Federal Bureau of Investigation when I was initially assigned to the Firearms Unit. Since being assigned to this unit I have made thousands of comparisons of bullets and cartridge cases with firearms for the purpose of determining whether a particular firearm fired a certain bullet or cartridge case. I have testified on numerous occasions in federal and state courts, as well as in military courts martial, as a firearms identification expert witness.
- 3. On April 5, 1968, at the Federal Bureau of Investigation Laboratory, I received certain items of evidence from Special Agent Fitzpatrick, who had brought

them by airplane from Memphis, Tennessee. These objects had been obtained in connection with the investigation of the shooting of Martin Luther King on the previous day.

- 4. Among the items of evidence I received was a 30.06 Springfield caliber Remington "Gamemaster" Slide-action rifle Model 760, Serial Number 461476, with Redfield telescopic sight, Serial Number A17350, with clip. I also received from Special Agent Fitzpatrick a .30 caliber metal-jacketed "soft-point" sporting type Remington-Peters bullet, a 30.06 Springfield Remington-Peters cartridge case, and Peters cartridge box, bearing manufacturers index number 3033 containing five 30.06 Springfield Remington-Peters cartridges and four 30.06 Springfield U. S. military cartridges containing full metal-jacketed bullets.
- 5. Because of distortion due to mutilation and insufficient marks of value, it was not possible to establish that the submitted bullet was fired from the submitted rifle. However, I determined that the .30-caliber metal-jacketed rifle bullet had been fired from a barrel rifled with six lands and grooves, right twist, and that the submitted rifle produces general rifling impressions on fired bullets having the physical characteristics of those on the submitted bullet. I also determined that the submitted bullet was a 150-grain soft point bullet identical to the bullets in the five cartridges contained in the submitted Peters cartridge box.

- 6. The 30.06 Springfield Remington-Peters cartridge case was identified by me as bearing an extractor mark made by the extractor of the submitted rifle. Based on physical characteristics, I determined that the submitted bullet and the submitted cartridge case could originally have been portions of the same cartridge, which would have been similar to the cartridges in the Peters cartridge box.
- 7. On April 6, 1968, I received a window sill from Special Agent Fitzpatrick. This sill was identified to me as having been removed from the bathroom of the room house at 422 1/2 Main Street in Memphis, Tennessee. I examined the surface of this window sill and found a recent indentation which bore microscopic impressions. Even though there were not sufficient microscopic impressions in the indentation for positive identification of the object which made it, these impressions on the dent have characteristics similar to those produced by the polishing marks on the side of the barrel of the submitted rifle near its muzzle.

- 2. My store was closed and unattended most of the day on April 4, 1968, and I returned to it shortly after 5:00 p.m.

- 1. I am 45 years old and I live at 12314 Georgia Avenue, Silver Spring, Maryland.
- 2. I am a Fingerprint Examiner in the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Washington, D.C. I have held this position since October 1941. I have attended schools and other training classes conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation to qualify me for my position. During the time I have been a Fingerprint Examiner, I have made millions of fingerprint comparisons for identification purposes. I have testified as a fingerprint expert witness in numerous cases in federal and state courts as well as in military courts-martial with regard to my findings based on comparisons of fingerprints.
- 3. On April 5, 1968, at approximately 5:15s.a., at the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Washington, I received certain objects of evidence from Special Agent Robert Fitzpatrick. These objects were identified to me as being part of the investigation into the shooting of Martin Luther King, Jr. in Memphis, Tennessee, on the previous day. Among the items delivered to me were a Remington Model 760 rifle, serial number 461475, with Redfield telescopic sight number A 17350, and a pair of 7 by 35 Bushnell binoculars, serial number DQ 408664. I examined each of these objects for latent fingerprints, and subsequently on April 5, 1968.

I developed one latent fingerprint on the rifle, one latent fingerprint on the telescopic sight, and one latent fingerprint on the binoculars. These were the only latent prints on these objects which contained sufficient ridge characteristic detail to be of value for identification purposes.

- A. On April 1), 1)58. I identified each of the afore-mentioned three latent prints as being the fingerprints of James Earl Ray. I made this determination by comparing the latent prints with a fingerprint card containing the known fingerprints of James Earl Ray, which were obtained by officials of the Los Angeles Police Department, Los Angeles. California, on October 11, 1989. The fingerprint card made by the los Angeles Police Department is contained in the official fingerprint files of the Pederal Bureau of Investigation in Washington, D.C. - I, Charles Quitzen Stephens, being duly sworn, depose and say:
- 1. I sm 46 years of ago and reside with my wife at 422 1/2 South Main Street, Memphis, Tennessee. We occupy two rooms, a living-bedroom and a kitchen, in the north wing of the second floor of a rooming house at that address and were living there on April 4, 1,68. Our apartment is number 6-B. The floor plan attached hereto and marked Exhibit I shows the relationship of the various rooms on my floor.
- 2. Mrs. Bessie Brewer is the resident manager of the rooming house. Around mid-afternoon on April 4, 1 68, I saw her and a man standing in the hallway at the entrance to room 5-B, which is located immediately west of my living-bedroom. The man was a stranger to me and I assumed he was a new guest looking at a room. I got a good look at the man from his left side.
- 3. Attached and identified as Exhibit II is
 FBI wanted Flyer 442-A. The photograph on the left,
 which is a profile view, is one which I identified on
 April 24, 1968 as looking very much like the man I
 saw looking at room 5-B on the afternoon of April 4,
 1968. I have re-examined the photograph today and
 reaffirm that identification.

- 4. My wife and I spent the rest of the afternoon in our apartment. I am a disabled war veteran who
 has been treated for tuberculosis and spend most of
 my time in my bedroom. My wife is also ill and was at
 that time a bed patient.
- 5. After seeing the strange man with Mrs. Brewer, I heard someone in room 5-B and assumed the man I had seen had rented the room next door. On several occasions on that afternoon I heard footsteps in room 5-B and also heard footsteps leaving room 5-B and going past my room and into the common bathroom at the east end of the hall. I was very much aware that when the person went from room 5-B to the bathroom, he remained in the bathroom for a considerable period of time.

 This was particularly noticeable because this is a common bathroom which must be used by a number of different tenants. I also recall specifically that on only one occasion did I hear the commode being flushed and I was therefore curious as to why this person was spending so much time in the bathroom.
- 6. During this period, Mr. Willis Anschutz, who occupies room 4-B, immediately west of room 5-B where the new tenant apparently was located, knocked on my door and inquired angrily as to who was staying in the bathroom so long.
- 7. At the end of the afternoon, sometime between 5:00 and 6:00 p.m. I was in the kitchen of our apartment, which is immediately adjacent to the common bathroom. At that time I heard a sound which I am certain was a shot. I am certain it came from the bathroom, from a point within just a few feet of where I was sitting.

- S. Immediately after hearing the shot, I beard some people located across the street, east of my building in the vicinity of the Lorraine Notel. screaming. After a few moments, I walked out of my kitchen, through the living-bedroom, and opened the door leading to the hallway. I saw a man running west down the hellway, away from me. This men was carrying a large bundle of some kind. I estimate that this bundle or package was at least 3 or 4 feet long and 6 to 8 inches thick. Although I saw the men and the bundle only momentarily, I had the impression that the bundle was wrapped in something, possible a newspaper. The man continued running to the end of the hallway. then turned left (south) and apparently thereafter ran down the stairway and on to the street, although I did not actually see him going down the stairway.
- 9. Although I did not see the face of the man running down the hell, since his back was toward me, from my observation of him I believe he was the same man I had earlier seen with Mrs. Brewer in front of room 5-8.

- I, Donald F. Wood, being duly sworn, depose and say:
- 1. I reside at 405 Lance Lane, Birmingham, Alabama, and am employed by my father, Robert E. Wood, Sr., at his store, Aeromarine Supply Company, 5701 Airport Highway, Birmingham, Alabama, as a salesman.
- 2. On Friday, March 29, 1968, in the early afternoon I observed Mr. U. L. Baker, also a salesman at the Aeromarine Supply Company, completing the sale of a rifle to an individual unknown to me. The purchaser had given his name as Harvey Lowmeyer. He purchased a Remington Model 700, caliber .243 Winchester with a Redfield scope mounted thereon, and 20 rounds of .243 ammunition.
- 3. Either later that afternoon or early the following morning (Saturday) someone identifying himself as Lowmeyer called on the telephone and stated that he had had a conversation with his brother and had decided that he wished to exchange the rifle he had purchased for a Remington Model 760, 30.06 caliber. I agreed to make this exchange at additional cost.
- 4. At approximately 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, March 30, 1968, the same individual returned to the store with the gun he had previously purchased. I told him that I would change the scope from the caliber .243 rifle to the


model 760, but that it would take me until approximately 3:00 in the afternoon.

This is the investigation into the assassination of Martin Luther King, Jr.

The "London Times" of 6/10/68, had a headline as follows: "U. So Department Chief Interviewed King Case Man" and in the article it is reported that during press conference. Vinson said he had seen Ray. It is noted in British usage the verb "to see" means to talk to. The "London Sun" of 6/10/68, has an article stating that Ray was removed from his cell and taken to an interview room where Vinson talked to him. It has been determined that Ray was not removed from his cell and Vinson did not talk to Ray but did see him momentarily through a slot in the cell door.

"London Daily Telegraph" of 6/10/68, contains an article by Ian Colvin which states Sneyd (Ray) telephoned several times, first calling on 6/4/68. Colvin had previously written about mercenary soldiers in Africa and Sneyd sought information as to how he could join his brother, a mercenary in Angola. Sneyd wanted to contact a British mercenary officer and Colvin offered to ask a major to call Sneyd who sounded overwrought and incoherent. The major declined to call Sneyd and when Sneyd later called the reporter on 6/6/68, Colvin gave him unspecified Brussels address through which he might contact Angola mercenaries. Scotland Yard is attempting to interview Colvin for full details and to determine the Brussels address reportedly furnished to Sneyd by Colvin.

Investigation has established that subject departed from London for Lisbon, Portugal, on 5/7/68. He remained in Lisbon for ten days and on 5/17/68, returned to London from Lisbon. Scotland Yard has an entire team of men working to establish subject's whereabouts during the period 5/17 to 6/8/68, the date of his arrest.


