This is investigation into the murder of Martin Luther King, Jr.

Investigation to date has not developed any concrete evidence of Ray's being involved in a conspiracy. Likewise, no information has been developed pinpointing the exact source of funds available to the subject. In order to thoroughly resolve the question of a possible conspiracy, Memphis and Birmingham have been instructed to initiate a specialized recheck.

Since subject on 3/29/68, purchased a gun in Birmingham, Alabama, in the afternoon and returned to the store early the following morning to exchange the gun, there is a good possibility that he may have stayed in Birmingham that night. (It is noted that on 3/24/68, he had rented a room in Atlanta, Georgia, and was there again, that we know of, on  $3/31/68_{\bullet}$ )

In a communication dated June 18, 1968, Mr. Fred M. Vinson, Jr., Assistant Attorney General, Criminal Division, Department of Justice, attached a telegram from the U. S. Embassy in Lisbon, Portugal, to the Department of State concerning the possibility of news stories in this country alleging United States authorities knew of Ray's presence in Portugal but took no steps to have him apprehended because of the weakness of the Portugal-United States extradition treaty.

No record has been located of any such news report in the files of this Bureau. This Bureau has at all times vigorously pressed this case both domestically and in foreign areas, through close cooperation with appropriate foreign authorities, in order to bring about the immediate apprehension of the subject whenever and wherever he might be located. The telegram from the American Embassy in Lisbon which was attached to the memorandum clearly states that reporters were unable to obtain anything in Lisbon other than local color.

The following additional pertinent information is being furnished relative to captioned case. The material set forth herein is based on preliminary information and complete details will be incorporated in reports of results of investigation.

The Grapevine Tavern operated by the subject's brother, John Larry Ray in St. Louis, Missouri, has been closed since early last week, according to John Larry Ray, for the safety of his patrons after Negroes in three automobiles were reported to be observing the tavern. John Larry Ray has also advised he has been hiding from newspaper reporters. He further stated that the news report of his receipt of a telephone call from a friend in Canada is false and that he knows no one in Canada.

On the completion of the extradition hearings in London, the problem of safely returning subject James Earl May to the United States is of great concern. In view of this, I want to bring your attention to certain matters which will arise in connection with the subject's transportation. is transported by commercial airliner. All personnel on military aircraft can be screened. This would be impossible upon commercial aircraft. It would also be most difficult to control the departure crowds as well as the arrival crowds which would assemble in the United States as well as in London.

The escorting officers should be equipped with proper written authority to escort the prisoner to be presented to the British authorities. This authority should be in such form as is acceptable to the British in order to avoid any delays in obtaining custody of the prisoner at the time of extradition.

It is obvious that in order to insure that the subject will not in any way harm himself that the proper restraining devices must be employed. Such devices must necessarily be used to the degree necessary and according to the judgment of the transporting officers.

Upon arrival, arrangements should be made at the final destination for subject Ray to be given a thorough medical examination as proof of his safe delivery in good condition to local authorities.
