MEX 24, who has handled other aspects of this investigation, has been instructed to attempt to determine, on his next road trip to Puerto Vallarta, whether any information is available to this police unit which would establish whether GALT was involved in traffic in marijuana during the time he spent there.

The Bureau and Office of Origin will be promptly advised of any concrete results obtained during this inquiry.

DETAILS:

This is the case involving the murder of Martin Luther King, Jr.

William Bradford Huie has written the third in a series of articles for "Look" magazine. Huie previously advised us that he entered into a contract with James Earl Ray to write the true account of Ray's activities and background concerning the assassination of King. Huie has been provided with notes from Ray through Ray's first attorney, Arthur J. Hanes.

The first article appeared in the 11-12-68, issue and the second article appeared in the issue of 11-26-68. In this third article, which is dated 4-15-69, (circulated 4-1-69), Huie claims that as a result of notes received from Ray and his extensive investigation and retracing of Ray's travels, he has definitely concluded that Ray alone is the murderer of King.

Huie points out in this current article that a number of questionable items existed concerning Ray and the King murder, and he resolved these through his investigation. The items and his investigative results are as follows:

- Item Ray's ability to obtain a Canadian passport. Answer - It is relatively easy to obtain a Canadian passport and Ray is very capable of executing this matter.
- Item Ray's determination of the location of the motel in Memphis where King was staying.

Answer - It was public knowledge through television and newspaper reports that King stayed at the Lorraine Motel and his room number was publicized.

- Item The fatal rifle shot could have been fired only by a practiced, experienced, and expert marksman. Answer - Ray had Army training, he was in the Military Police, he had practiced with guns, and the shot was easy for him. A 12-year-old boy familiar with a .22 caliber weapon could have killed King from the same position.
- Item Ray is stupid and inept. Answer - During Ray's seven years in the Missouri State Penitentiary, he matured as a criminal. His escape on 4-23-67, from the Missouri State Penitentiary was well planned and well executed.

5. Item - Ray could not have supported himself and his travels between 4-23-67, (escaped from the Missouri State Penitentiary) and 6-8-68, (Ray apprehended in London, England) and, therefore, must have had financial assistance.

Answer - Ray obtained funds through robberies and other criminal activities.

- 6. Item Ray is not a "racist" or "nigger-hater" and, therefore, could have been motivated only by money.

 Answer Ray, while incarcerated, did not feel he could live in an Honor Farm Dormitory because it was integrated. Ray made bitter anti-Negro remarks while he was in Canada, Mexico, and California.
- 7. Item Ray was not a killer.

 Answer The superintendent at the Missouri State
 Hospital, who supervised the psychiatric examination of Ray, stated
 that Ray is capable of killing for gain, and he is capable of
 killing in the hope of relieving his anxieties and enhancing his
 self-respect.

Huie concludes his article by stating that James Earl Ray, the poor, contemptible little man, has killed a well-known figure.

Another comment in the current "Look" magazine is made by Percy Foreman, Ray's second attorney, and Mr. Foreman states "I don't believe there was any conspiracy. James Earl Ray wanted to win recognition. He hoped that by killing Martin Luther King he could make the rest of his futile, boring life exciting."

In this same issue of "Look" magazine, Arthur J. Hanes, Ray's first attorney, states that he feels Ray was helped and points out different items to support his theory.

1. Item - Ray had help in selecting the rooming house from which the fatal shot is alleged to have been fired, and no evidence exists that this house was entered by Ray until 3:15 p.m. on the day of the murder.

Facts - Ray was in Memphis on 4-3-68, (one day before the murder) and had sufficient time to choose the rooming house and it was public knowledge as to where King was staying and his assigned room number.

2. Item - According to a few witnesses, the shot was fired from the bushes which are 20 feet below the bathroom of the rooming house.

Facts - Interviews of witnesses and other individuals failed to corroborate any such statements.

3. Item - When Ray abandoned the Mustang, a search of the Mustang revealed that the clothing did not fit Ray and the car's ashtrays were filled with cigarette butts. According to Hanes. Ray does not smoke.

Facts - The clothing located in the Mustang was perfectly sized for Ray and our Laboratory matched certain threads from articles of clothing found in the car with items of evidence located at the scene of the killing. Our examination of the Mustang disclosed no cigarette butts or ashes.

4. Item - The state has no conclusive ballistic evidence. The .30-.06 bullet was recovered from King's body but no ballistic expert could say that the bullet was fired from the rifle purchased by Ray.

Facts - The bullet recovered from the body of King was such that it is impossible to state that the bullet was fired from the rifle purchased by Ray; however, there were certain characteristics which would indicate that it was fired from this rifle. It was further determined that the casing found in the rifle was fired from the rifle purchased by Ray.

- 5. Item Within a few minutes after King was shot, there were mysterious radio reports concerning a Pontiac chasing a Mustang believed to have been occupied by the killer of King.

 Facts We completely checked this matter out and it was determined that the broadcast concerning a Pontiac chasing a Mustang was a fabrication, and no supporting evidence exists to verify the report.
- 6. Item There was no motive in killing King as Ray was doing all right as a fugitive.

Facts - This is conjecture on Mr. Hanes' part, and we have statements that Ray could possibly have committed the murder for personal recognition for status among inmates in prison.

Mr. Hanes concludes his article by stating that the FBI has done its usual masterful job in this matter.

Shelosed for the Bureau is one copy each of Savannah sartel to Memphis dated 4/8/69, and an FD-308 dated 4/8/69 which reflocts an interview on 4/3/69 with MOY RICHARD MAWIN, an inmate of the Georgia State Prison.

The Eureau will note that EWMIN has denied writing a lotter bearing his mame which indicated that he had driven a 1965 Mustang from Merphis, Tenn., to Atlanta, Ga., on $\ell/4/68$, the date that victim was killed. The subsequent interview with EdWIV on 4/3/69 indicates that EDWIN was in Chattanooga, Tenn., on 4/4/68, and ERVIN denies having any knowledge rogarding FIMG's murder.

He was unable to think of any insuate in the GSP who would write such a letter. He knows of no insuate in the GSP that dislikes him who would write a letter and send it out with his name on it.

He has engaged in convergation with other ignates regarding the Dr. MARTH LUTHER KING case, but he does not recall ever having mentioned a Magtang automobile in these convergations with other; however, he could have said semething about such a vehicle.

He recalled that a friend of his, JERRY BERMETT, had owned a 1965 Mustang, white, two door hardtop. BERMETT is employed at Coronet Carpet Company, Dalton, Georgia, but it is believed that he had traded the 1965 Mustang in on another car.

On the last Saturday in March, 1968, he had left Dalton, Georgia, with JERRY BERNETT, and MICHAEL BIALOCK, who lives near Dalton, Georgia. BIALOCK's home is located by going out the Chatsworth Highway about six miles, then turn off the highway onto a dirt road. BIALOCK is in the U.S. Army at the present time.

After leaving Dalton, Georgia, on the last Saturday of March, 1968, MENDETT, MALOCK and he drove in HENHETT's 1965 Mustang to Atlanta, Georgia, where they stayed about two hours. They then traveled back to Dalton, Georgia, where he, KEWIN, obtained his 1963 Lincoln Continental, light blue, and drove to Chattanooga, Tennessee, along with MENDETT and BLALOCK in BENNETT's 1965 Mustang. In Chattanooga, Tennessee, MENDETT, BLALOCK and ERWIN checked in at the Florida Hotel and stayed there for one night and a day.

He left his car, the Lincoln Continental, in Chattanooga, Tennessee, and drove with REMNETT and BIALOCK to Knorville, Tennessee, where they stayed for four or five hours. They then drove to Homphis, Tennessee, where they stayed for a couple of days. They left Memphis and drove back to Chattanooga and checked in at the Florida Hotel, Chattanooga. A Florida Hotel porter, TRASDALE ROCENVELT, a Negro male, about 65 to 66 years of age, tall and muscular build, knows him, ERWIN, well. Between 9 PM and 10 PM on April 4, 1968, TRASDALE ROCENVELT told him about the fact that Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING had been killed in Memphis, Tennessee.

The next day, April 5, 1968, in the early afternoon, he drove back to Dalton, Georgia, in his 1963 Lincoln Continental. About a half mile from Dalton, his 1963 Lincoln motor burned up and he had to have the car hauled into Dalton to his home.

He knows nothing about the murder of Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING.



On April 7, 1969, the attorneys for James Earl Ray filed an amended and supplemental motion for a new trial with the Clerk of the Court of Shelby County, Memphis, Tennessee. In this motion it is alleged that in establishing a conflict of interest between defendant (James Earl Ray) and his two prior attorneys (Arthur J. Hanes and Percy Foreman) the said prior attorneys actually represented William Bradford Huie (author) and their own financial interest and not James Earl Ray.

The motion states the defendant would have no story to sell and no movie or publishing rights to convey if he were allowed to take the witness stand, since such action on his part would allow all of the facts to become a matter of public record for the free use of all. The motion also states that William Bradford Huie made a statement that the defendant "must not take the witness stand in his expected trial, because if the defendant did take the witness stand, then he (William Bradford Huie) would have no book." According to the motion, the defendant alleges that there would be no profit to anyone if he persisted in his "not guilty" plea and that the defendant was pressured and induced into entering a plea of "guilty."

It is noted that in attached exhibit B the fee arrangement between Percy Foreman and James Earl Ray was signed by both parties. It is to be further noted that a newspaper in Tennessee has quoted Mr. Foreman as stating that he took over the same financial arrangement that existed between Ray and Arthur J. Hanes, Ray's first attorney. Foreman also said that when Ray decided to plead guilty, he suggested to Ray that the fee be adjusted and Ray signed an agreement to pay him \$150,000, a figure suggested by Ray. Mr. Foreman also stated he advised Ray to plead guilty "because I believe he would be electrocuted if he didn't." Mr. Foreman said Ray "thought he'd be electrocuted, too" and sent Foreman a letter officially requesting the plea.

- 2. The letter attached be that agreement by which I agreed to advance \$35,000 in anticipation of earnings from this project.
- 3. Receipts from your attorneys for the \$40,000 which I have advanced to date. (\$30,000 to Mr. Hanes and \$10,000 to Mr. Foreman.)

I am also having sent to you, from my attorneys, the Supplementary Agreement which was signed by Mr. Foreman, Mr. Hanes, you and me. I suggest that you sign another copy of this for Mr. Foreman, so that we can have two copies bearing all four original signatures.

This gives you copies of all agreements existing between you and me; and you will note that I have followed them to the letter. I will continue to do so.

To this date this project has earned \$30,000. Additional earnings will shortly be received from LOOK magazine, from foreign magazines, and from Dell Publishing Company, which will publish the book in May.

LOOK Magazine will publish my next article on April 15th. The book, titled HE SLEW THE DREAMER, will be published about May 15th.

I am currently negotiating with Carlo Ponti, the film producer, over picture rights. I'll keep you informed of developments.

As soon as you are moved to Nashville, I will attempt to see you....or rather we will attempt to get permission for you to see me. We need a picture of you to use on the front cover of the book.

Jerry keeps in touch with me; and if it is your desire you can count on me to keep in touch with you indefinitely. I'll help you in any way I can.

And of course I will keep both you and Mr. Foreman informed as to earnings.

Dear James Earl:

You have heretofore assigned to me all of your royalties from magazine articles, book, motion picture or other revenue to be derived from the writings of Wm. Bradford Huie. These are my own property unconditionally.

However, you have heretofore authorized and requested me to negotiate a plea of guilty if the State of Tennessee through its District Attorney General and with the approval of the trial judge would waive the death penalty. You agreed to accept a sentence of 99 years.

It is contemplated that your case will be dis - posed of tomorrow, March 10, by the above plea and sentence. This will shorten the trial considerably. In consideration of the time it will save me, I am willing to make the fol - lowing adjustment of my fee arrangement with you:

If the plea is entered and the sentence accepted and no embarassing circumstances take place in the court room, I am willing to assign to any bank, trust company or individual selected by you all my receipts under the above assignment in excess of \$165,000.00. These funds over and above the first \$165,000.00 will be held by such bank, trust company or individual subject to your order.

I have either spent or obligated myself to spend in excess of \$14,000.00, and I think these expenses should be paid in addition to a \$150,000.00 fee. I am sure the expenses will exceed \$15,000.00 but I am willing to rest on that figure.

Dear James Earl:

You have asked that I advance to Jerry Ray five (\$500.00) of the "\$5,000.00", referring to the first five thousand dollars paid by Wm. Bradford Huie. On January 29th, Mr. Huie advanced an additional \$5,000.00. At that time I had spent in excess of \$9,500.00 on your case. Since then, I have spent in excess of \$4,000.00 additional.

But I am willing to advance Jerry \$500.00 and add it to the \$165,000.00 mentioned in my other letter to you today. In other words, I would receive the first \$165,500.00. But I would not make any other advances - just this one \$500.00.

And this advance, also, is contingent upon the plea of guilty and sentence going through on March 10, 1969, without any unseemly conduct on your part in court.

Tho rifle and the white mustang are tied up in the P.S. suit filed by Renfro Hays. Court costs and attorneys fees will be necessary, perhaps, to get them released. I will credit the \$165,500.00 with whatever they bring over the cost of obtaining them, if any.
