MEMPHIS, TENN. hree months ago this week the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. was gunned down outside Room 306 on the balcony of the Lorraine Motel, 406 Mulberry Street, this city.

Fired from a flophouse at 4181/2 South Main Street, 65 yards opposite and five yards north of the motel, the bullet from a Remington big-game 30.06 caliber rifle (catalog cost \$139.95) shattered Dr. King's jaw, perietrated his throat, severed his spinal cord.

The charismatic leader and cofounder of the ten-year-old Southern Christian Leadership Conference, a monviolent civil rights organization, died at

6:41 on the evening of April 4, 1908. He was 39, the third Negro, and at age 35, in 1964, the youngest man to have been awarded the Nobel Peace Prize.

Three hours later that same evening, Mrs. Loree Catherine Bailey, 58, owner of the Lorraine Motel, sufferca a stroke. She fell into a coma, was taken to the Baptist Hospital, died the night of April 9. Mrs. Bailey was an intelligent, thrifty;

Her husband, Walter "Bill" Bailey, ten years her junior, survives her. Currently he finds himself in a most perpicaing dilemma.

Bailey who works as a porter for the Downtown Holiday Inn here-he averages \$20 Iday in tips—is the remaining

owner of the Lorraine Motel and doesn't know what to do with it.

"I am sitting on a goldmine," he recently told me, "a potential goldmine. That's what this motel is. And no one wants to help me. All they want to do is to exploit me!

"This motel where Dr. King was killed by all rights should become a hallowed shrine. It's already become a shrine," he declared. "Why, I get thousands of people coming here, driving by here every week. 'Where did it happen?' they all ask. 'Where did it happen?'

"Dr. King was shot on the balcony outside his room, Number 306. A double room. It rents for \$13 a day, only we never charged him for it. Never charged him. My wife, may she rest in peace, she.

wouldn't hear of it. To her, Martin King was something special, very special.

"Now Martin's become a martyr. On Memorial Day last month we had this marble plaque in his honor set in the window of 306. I honestly think that Room 306 will go down in history as the most famous motel room in the world.

"I'm telling you, man, the Lorraine Motel has already become one of the most famous tourist attractions in Memphis. And saddest part of it all, I just don't know what to do about it. Just don't know what path to follow."

Bailey's major conflict is that there is a mortgage on the Lorraine Motel for \$240,000, "and I've got to meet those payments. I've got money worries, but I don't want people to accuse me of com-

mercializing Dr. King's death. Some of the schemes I've been offered! You wouldn't believe 'em."

One entrepreneur wanted to construct a cable car line or a monorail between the flophouse and the Lorraine balcony, call it "Bullet's Flight" and sell rides for \$1 per passenger.

Another suggested that Bailey insert into the door of Room 306 a neon sign, "Martin Luther King slept here," then rent out the room for \$100 a night.

A third suggested guided tours of the motel, at \$1.50 for adults, 75 cents for children.

"All I know," says Bailey, "is that if I continue to have anything to do with it, Room 306 will never again be occupied by mortal man. That room belongs to the memory and honor of Mattin Luther King, and that's that.

"My problem is, how do I share that memory with the public? What I have in mind—and here's where I need some good advice—maybe I can get it from W.D. Ingram [Ingram, on today's PARADE cover with Bailey, is a former mayor of Memphis, trusted and respected by the city's Negroes]—what I have in mind is to concrete the swimming pool and erect a canopy over it, construct a kind of combination chapel and museum. Into it I'd like to put a pulpit, the Bibles used by Dr. King, maybe statues of Jesus and all the disciples.

"Then up in Room 306 I'd like to con-

struct bookcases. My wife was a great reader. That's why she was so intelligent. She left me about 1500 books. I'd like to line the wall with bookcases. Then I'd like a special little glass case for her two rings. When we were married 32 years ago, I bought these rings, cost \$19.75, 50 cents down and 75 cents a week. We also bought her a watch for \$29.75. She loved that jewelry just out of sentiment's sake. I'd like to show it, also lay out the clothes she was wearing when she suffered her stroke.

"She was the one who got the idea for the Lorraine. In 1945 we bought it for \$18,000 with a \$5,000 down payment. Then four years ago we added on the motel part, and that cost \$240,000. We got some other property on Advance and Third Street, and here's what I'd really like to do.

"We've got 16 rooms on the second floor of the motel, running along the balcony where Dr. King was shot. I'd like to turn those rooms into individual shrines for the leading people, black and white, killed in the civil rights cause. Each room would contain their personal belongings. The downstairs rooms I'd continue renting out as a motel under the name 'The King-Lorraine.'

"What I'm really hoping is that some organization like Holiday Inns—they're based right here in Memphis, and Mr. Kemmons Wilson is the big boss, and he really knows the business—what I'm

hoping is that some outfit like that go in with me and construct on our third Street property a brand new motel called the King-Lorraine. Then we could bus people back and forth between there and the King-Lorraine shrine.

"If Holiday Inns don't go for the idea, maybe Sheraton, Hilton or TraveLodge, or some of those others can see the possibilities. Because I am telling you, man, sooner or later, all the black people and millions of whites in the United States are going to come to Memphis ty see where Martin Luther King was shot. You can't stop 'em. They're curious.

Towasts used to come to Memphis to see the Mississippi River and Beale Street, but I feel the King-Lorraine-can

become an even bigger attraction.

"It's sad to say, but everyone is trying to make a buck on Martin's death. There are paperback books and special magazines and bronze busts and records, tapes, coins, watchfobs, key rings. I don't know if Mrs. King is getting a single cert in royalties or anyone is contribut-

ing the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, but whatever I sure have in mind that a percentage of the profits uses to the Conference.

"People sure are funny, however. I got me a Polaroid camera a few weeks ago. I figured it would be a good idea to take snapshots of tourists who were coming here to look at the spot, to pose them on the balcony. You know what? After I paid for the camera, paid for the film, they wanted the photos as free souvenirs.

"No, sir. It takes know-how to capitalize on this site. That's why I hope some big outfit will go into partnership with me and do the whole thing right with dignity and respect.

"I don't want any kind of a carnival atmosphere, setting up concessions where we're selling booklets and hamburgers and Martin Luther King trinkets. Mrs. Bailey wouldn't have gone for anything like that.

"My wife was a woman of character. Only like I say. She's not here anymore, and I've got to meet the payments."








Ray Sole Killer, U.S., Says at Hearing

LONDON The United States said today James Earl Ray was the "single hand" killer of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. It said it had a witness to prove

A British lawyer for the United States called in a formal extradition hearing for Ray's return to Memphis, Tenn., to face charges of the "calculated, brutal and senseless murder" of the Nobel Peace Prize-winning civil rights leader April 4.

British barrister David Calcutt said in historic Bow Street Magistrate's Court that finger prints connected Ray to the rifle used to assassinate King.

The attorney said U.S. authorities had a witness who saw Ray enter a rooming house bathroom overlooking the motel where King died, heard a shot fired from the bathroom and watched Ray come out of the room a minute later.

Calcutt identified the witness as a "Mr. Stevens" but did not give his first name.

Heard Shot Fired

The barrister said the witness said Ray stayed an "unconscionable length of time" the third and last time he was observed going in the bathroom.

The third time Mr. Stevens heard a shot fired from the bathroom window," Calcutt said. "A minute later Mr. Stevens saw a man coming out of the bathroom. He was the same man who booked accommodations" (in the rooming house.)

King was hit as he stood on a motel balcony. Investigators said the shot was fired from the bathroom window in the rooming house across the street.

As Ray stood — showing no apparent emotion — in the prisoner's dock, Calcutt looked at him and said: 'This tragic death was the work of this criminal.'

Work of "Single Hand"

Calcutt described the crime as "the working of a single hand."

One hunred policemen guarded Ray at the hearing. He rode to the court in a black police paddy wagon.

Calcutt quoted Stevens as saying he was certain a shot had been fired from the bathroom window, "because a partition between my kitchen and the bathroom was very thin."

Saw Man Running

"I looked through a broken pane of glass and heard voices coming from across the street in the direction of the Lorraine Motel," the lawyer quoted Stevens. "I opened my door and I looked toward the bathroom. The door was open. I ssaw a man running. He was carrying a bundle which looked to be about three to four feet long and six to eight inches

wide. It was wraffiled in newspapers."

"I think it was the same man I had seen earlier with Mrs. Brewer (the landlady) in Room 5B. I went back to the window and looked toward the Lorraine Motel. I saw a lot of men and policemen."

The barrister charged the bundle the man carried contained the murder rifle, with telescopic sight, and binocunars. Calcutt said there was strong evidence the bullet that killed King came from the rifle. He said the United States also had evidence Ray purchased the rifle. The rifle was found in a doorway on the street.

Calcutt quoted a deposition from George Bonebrake, U.S. Department of Justice fingerprint expert, that three fingerprints found on the murder rifle, its telescopic sight and a pair of binoculars found outside the rooming house matched prints of Ray on file with the FBI.

Admitted Being American

A Scotland Yard detective testified that Ray admitted he was an American although he carried two Canadian passports in the name of Sneyd when he was picked up. Tolson

The Ray Extradition

GETTING JAMES Earl Ray extradited from England could prove almost as complicated as tracking him down was.

Ray, who is accused of the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, has made two court appearances in London. The United States seeks two warrants for his extradition. These formalities aren't troublesome. It's the British extradition laws that portend difficulties.

The British law, which dates from 1870, would permit Ray to argue that the crime of which he is accused is a political offense. Under the extradition act, no one may be turned over to another country for a political crime.

A British journal, The Economist, says that while it seems clear the framers of the 1870 law did not intend to include political assassination among the "political offenses" which would exempt Ray from extradition, the law is so vaguely worded that Ray could crawl under its protection.

And there are British court decisions, The Economist says, which could put Dr. King's murder in the category of an offense of a political nature.

The United States has filed a warrant for Ray's arrest as an escaped prisoner. He escaped prison and still has 13 years to serve of a 20-year term for armed robbery and car theft.

But if extradited on this count, could he be tried then on the charge of King's murder?

Britons point out that Ray could be sent to the United States under "disguised deportation," in which he would be ordered to leave Britain on a specific ship or airplane, which would go directly to a U.S. port, and put Ray right into the hands of U.S. authorities.

This however, verges on being illegal.

Police have international agreements which help them cooperate to track down criminals. The system worked well in Ray's case.

It seems imperative that the courts work out similar international agreements for extradition that would work to serve justice, and not let criminals flee to another country (which can be done now in a few hours), to escape prosecution.

In this case, it is important that Ray be brought back to face trial. There are too many unanswered questions about the murder of King.



Has **Full** Story Been Told?

OR most of his failure-filled life, James Earl Ray has been a bungler and chronic loser—and that may be the principal reason why his arrest in London for the assassination of Rev. Martin Luther King, jr., in Memphis on April 4 has raised more doubts than it has satisfied.

That so mediocre a man—the man with many faces—a humpty-dumpty at everything he tried, should have been the accused sole architect and engineer of one of the century's most heinous crimes was a conclusion which many found hard to accept.

That was why his capture, on the day that another assassination victim, Robert F. Kennedy, was buried, was met by a number of nagging questions -unanswered questions that suggest the possibility that the full story of Dr. King's murder may not yet have been uncovered. Among them:

- Was Ray acting entirely on his own?
- Or was he the indispensable man in a cleverly-planned plot?
- Who helped him elude the law for an incredible 65 days?
- run and hide?

And, perhaps most vital of all:

Those who knew Ray, either during one of the five prison sentences he served or in the now-andthen years when he was free, were more than aware of his deep-seated feeling against Negroes; he never made any great effort to hide it.

But not even so strong an emotion as hatred would, in the view of his brother, Jerry, have

driven him to kill. "I know," said the brother, "that he wouldn't have put himself in a spot like this unless there was something in it for him . . ."

And there was an even stronger reason, in the opinion of some police, to believe that he did not act alone. Put hluntly, it, was this?

Ray was too stupid to have devised, and exe-

cuted, a murder like that of Dr. King without a great deal of help.

He was discharged from the Army for what was described as ineptness and lack of adaptability—a gentle way of saying that, as far as the military service was concerned, he was a hopeless case.

And he was just as hopeless as a small-time hood. After robbing a supermarket in St. Louis of \$190 in 1959, he literally led police to his doorstep by parking the getaway car directly outside it.

Another stickup was botched when he cracked up the car in which he was attempting to flee with \$2200 in loot.

Given that history of failure, some authorities cannot see Ray putting together, entirely on his own, a complex plot to kill and flee. But, though he may have had help either in the planning, the execution, or the escape, neither the FBI or anyone else is ready to say-officially-that there was a conspiracy and that he was the trigger man in it.

Despite their reluctance, there is persuasive, though inconclusive, evidence to suggest that this may have been so. For instance:

Although Ray was a man who made a career out of getting caught, he broke out of the Missouri State Prison on April 23, 1967—and for a full year thereafter kept clear of the law. A most remarkable reversal of fortune.

He used four aliases in the King murder-Eric Galt, Paul Bridgman, John Willard, and Ramon George Sneyd. All bore a general resemblance to Ray, and Galt even had scars on his forehead and right palm—as did Ray.

But what was just as remarkable was that all four lived in the same area of Toronto, Can., and neither knew each other or Ray. Yet, he knew all that was necessary for him to know about them.

He used the name of Galt when he bought a white Mustang in Birmingham, Ala., in the summer of 1967—and he used the name of Willard when he

Here, too, there was evidence suggesting smarter man-or men-than Ray may have been involved. Had he followed his instincts, he probably would have tried to get out of Atlanta on the first available plane-but airlines keep records of all their clients.

On the other hand, railroads and buslines do not —and there are three buses a day which leave Atlanta for Toronto, Ray is believed to have crossed the border on April 8, four days after Dr. King was slain, and took a room in a boarding house at 102 Ossington ave. under the name of Paul Bridgman.

"He didn't come cold to this city and make all his own arrangements," said a Canadian Mountie stationed in Toronto. "There was help of some kind."

An American detective, who worked on the Canadian angle of the case, made this comment:

"A guy like Ray, a five-time loser with the law, just does not have the background for the way he behaved."

And Deputy Chief Bernard Simmonds of the Toronto Metropolitan Police said:

"I think someone else was the mastermind."

That comment could apply either to a plot or to a getaway . . . and in either respect it seemed almost certain that someone other than Ray had to do the kind of thinking that was well beyond him.

Truman Capote, the fancy man whose flair for writing a factual account of another crime—"In Cold Blood"—earned him a million dollars, cannot conceive of Ray being able to travel undetected for so long a time after Dr. King's murder without getting help from an unknown expert.

What made Capote's thesis seem plausible was that, in the only two instances where Ray may possibly have acted on his own, he made incredible mistakes. He left a print on the murder gun when he dropped it in the doorway of a grocery moments after the murder and, when he was traced to Atlanta April 19, FBI men went to a room where he was known to have stayed.



to indicate he was acting under instructions. He needed a birth certificate in the names of both Bridgman and Ramon George Sneyd, one of which he would use when he applied for a Canadian passport.

As nearly as police can deduce, he went to the public library on College st., and went through the old newspaper files. The Toronto Star of Oct. 8, 1932, contained a notice of the birth of Sneyd, and the Toronto Telegram of Nov. 11, 1932, carried a birth announcement for Bridgman. Both had the information Ray needed, the names of the parents, including the maiden name of the mothers.

He had some passport photos taken, and on April 15, Ray—now using the name of Sneyd—showed up at the Kennedy Travel Agency, on Bloor st. and asked for a passport application. All he had to do, under the conveniently loose Canadian law, was to swear that the data on the application was true. It was forwarded to Ottawa, with a request that action on it be speeded because Sneyd—or Ray—was in a hurry to leave the country.

That same day, he also ordered a round-trip excursion ticket to London aboard a BOAC flight that was scheduled to leave Toronto May 6.

A few days later, the FBI announced that the man it had been seeking as "Eric Starvo Galt" was, in reality, James Earl Ray, a 40-year-old drifter and highly unsuccessful thet. His photograph was carried in newspapers all over the world, including those in Toronto, but by then he had moved out of the Ossington ave. address and into another rooming house a few blocks away on Dundas st., operated by one Mrs. Yee Sun Loo.



Back at Ossington ave. his former landlady, Mrs. Adam Szpakowski, went to clean "Mr. Bridgman's" room. A newspaper was on the bed, opened to the page that bore Ray's picture, but Mrs. Szpakowski failed to notice the resemblance between "Bridgman" and the fugitive.

A few days after Ray checked out of Mrs. Szpakowski's house, a small man in a nondescript business suit rang her bell and asked to see "Mr. Bridgman." When he was told that "Bridgman" had left he went away, without giving either his name or any hint of what his mission might have been.

For nearly two weeks, Ray lived discreetly, and did nothing to attract attention. His caution was, in a sense, a kind of insurance, because the FBI was still a long way from learning that he had crossed into Canada.

He picked up his airline ticket May 2 and paid \$345 for it—in cash. He also gave Paul Bridgman as the next-of-kin who should be notified it, anything happened to him. Four days later, he left Canada, and landed in London.

There he turned in his return ticket for one that would take him to Lisbon where, whether he knew it or not, the breakaway African state of Rhodesia, had an office. Some investigators believed that Rhodesia was where Ray was headed, since it would not have been likely to honor an extradition request from the U. S. if ever he were located there.

Ray stayed in Lisbon until May 17, and while there secured a new passport from the Canadian Embassy, since, on the original, "Sneyd" was misspelled "Sneya."

Then, inexplicably, he doubled back to London, and for two weeks stayed at a small hotel in a section of the capital known as "Kangaroo Valley." He kept out of sight, except for those times it was necessary for him to surface. It was as if he sensed, like a fox, that the hunters were closing in even before he heard the sounds of their pursuit.

And, if that was so it was one of the few times that Ray turned out to have guessed right, for the Royal Canadian Mounted Police had come up with


the clue that was needed to bring a world-wide search to a successful climax. At the request of the FBI, which was aware of the many loopholes in Canadian travel regulations, the Mounties began checking passport applications and the photos that accompanied them.

They went through no less than 250,000 and then, on June 1, a Mountie looked at the picture of "Ramon George Sneyd" and realized that it was, in reality, a snapshot of the clusive fugitive with the deadly aim.

From that starting point, it was a routine operation to trace Ray's travels to London, Lisbon, and back to London again, and to cover all the places where he might be likely to show himself. One of those places was Heathrow Airport.

While the trap was closing, Ray was moving. He shifted from the New Earl's Court Hotel to a cheaper one, the Pax, and quibbled about the \$3.60 a day he had to pay in rent. He never left his room for more than 20 minutes at a time, refusing even to come out to answer four phone calls—two from an airline.

But he did some calling of his own, to Ian Colvin, a writer for the London Daily Telegraph who was considered an expert on Africa. In the first call, on June 5, Ray asked how he might get to Angola, a Portuguese territory in Africa, on the pretext that he wanted to locate his brother there. The second call, on the following day, was more direct. How, he wanted to know, could he join up with white mercenaries who hire themselves out to fight in Africa. Colvin mentioned a man in Brussels, Belgium, who might be able to help—but he did not, as he promised, mail the man's address to Ray.

Where did Ray get the money to pay for his flight from justice?

It was a fact that, on July 13, 1967, not quite two months after he escaped from prison in Missouri, a bank in Ray's home town of Alton, Ill., was robbed of \$37,000. Some authorities hazarded to gues—it was nothing more than that—that Ray might have been one of the lucky bandiss.

Possibly; but if that was so, then there too, fact that the robbery was successful was a ked departure from Ray's record of past Possibly; marked failures.

Against that theory were several seeming contradictions. Whatever his split from the stickup was, it had to be in bills of mixed denominations—but when Ray paid \$1995 for the Mustang in Alabama, when he bought a .30-06 rifle, when he bought the airline ticket at Toronto, he paid in \$20 bills only.

And, even if it could be proven that he had taken part in the Alton robbery and had taken his cut exclusively in \$20s, it was a fact that, in the year before Memphis, Ray was a man on the lam, moving from Missouri to Canada (in the summer of '67), to Birmingham, to New Orleans, to Los Angeles, Atlanta and, ultimately, Memphis. That took money and, since he was a fugitive, it probably took more than what he was able to pick up when—and if—he robbed the bank in Alton.

Despite all that, Ray, only a few days ago, asked Arthur S. Hanes, a Birmingham lawyer, to defend him.

Hanes is a former Mayor of Birmingham, and was a member of the defense battery for three Ku Klux Klansmen who, the FBI said, murdered civil rights worker Mrs. Viola Liuzzo on an Alabama roadside a few years back

He agreed to represent Ray, and, when he was asked how Ray would be able to pay his fee, was said to have replied that he understood his client "had funds."

Which again raised the question; if he ney, where did he get it? And from whom:

money, where did he get it? And from whom?

The question, like all the others, has not yet been answered—and maybe it never will be. Up to now, James Earl Ray has been as silent as a clam.

But, one day, when the tortuous process of extradition has been completed and he goes on trial in Termessee, all that may change.

For hanging over Ray's head, on conviction, will be the death penalty, and he may decide he does not want to pay that grim price alone. In that event, the last and potentially most important question. tion will arise:

Will he talk?

If he does, the many odd pieces of a tough tough puzzle will fall into place, and all the questions which have sprung from the murder of Zev. Martin Luther King, Jr., will be answered.




