



Relaxed Ray Suddenly Panicked

London (AP)—James Earl | recently, redecorated it from | your and ill he seemed. Ray seemed to be an easy going fugitive until something alarmed him three days before his arrest.

Then, overnight, he was jumpy and sought to hide himself. The bars and restaurants of Lisbon and London saw him no more. He switched to an obscure back street hotel, locked himself in, changed his whole mode of

WHEN he went out it was only to buy cold snacks from the shop around the corner. He ate them in his room. And his nervousness seemed to incrēase when he was twice informed that his planned flights out of England had been delayed.

THE Pax Hotel in Pimlico. where Ray stayed and called himself Ramon George Snevd. presents a blankly anonymous face to the outside world.

It is a cream-painted threestory building in a street filled with others just like it. A twominute walk away is the British Overseas Airways terminal and the busy Victoria continental rail deport.

There's no name on the black-painted door, and the electric sign above it only says "hotel." The push-button by the knocker is labeled "bell." The telephone number is unlisted. The Pax is discreet.

Anna Thomas, the Swedishborn 54-year-old wife of an Englishman, bought the place

top to bottom, and opened in April. She has seven rooms and can accommodate a total of 12 guests.

SHE saw little of Sneyd during the three days he was with her from last Wednesday to Saturday. He was already lying low.

"He arrived in the middle of a violent rainstorm Wednesday evening," Mrs. Thomas said Monday. "There was no one in the hotel because I'd only just returned from visiting my 86-year-old mother in Stockholm.

"He had only an airline bag as luggage, but I gave him No. 1 on the ground floor. We often get single gentlemen with only an airline bag, staying over between flights.'

(Police say the Ramon George Sneyd name used by Ray belongs to a Toronto policeman. Ray used the name to obtain two passports and, when arrested, had both passports with him).



Mrs. Thomas said Sneyd didn't have much to say.

"HE said he was from Toronto. I asked him about Toronto. He said there was a lot of unemployment there."

"He hardly ever went out and then only to buy food, lots of newspapers and aspirins," Mrs. Thomas said.

"HE seemed so ill and stayed in bed all day. He told me he had arrived on an early flight and was very tired. He seemed very, very nervous."

Mrs. Thomas said she only once got into the room while he was there. That was when he'd slipped out for aspirin. She found he'd made the bed and tidied up. And he'd washes his own shirts.

When she brought him breakfast the first morning he refused to open the door and told her to leave the tray outside. She asked him for the hotel register which she'd given him to sign. He put it out later with the tray. But she found he hadn't signed it.

MRS. Thomas said Sneyd had no visitors and only two phone calls-both from a girl at British European Airways about postponed flight bookings to Germany.

"I didn't know who he was when she asked for Mr. Sneyd," said Mrs. Thomas. "I said: 'Do you mean the Canadian?' And that was it."

Sneyd paid his hotel check with a five-pound bill, the equivalent of \$12. Then he went out for the last time through that anonymous looking street door. He wa But she noticed how ner-arrested at Heathrow Airport

Speculation in Brussels anged from the suggestion that he might be seeking the chroll as a mercenary for African or Yemen, was enroute to Eastern Europe, or just hoped to lose himself in the continental summer vacation crowds.

British police sources said yesterday Ray, when arrested at London, was making the latest of an undisclosed number of trips to Europe to pick up money said to have been deposited for him in a Swissbank.

The police informants said Ray arrived in Britain May 8, went to Lisbon to pickup money sent there for him from his Swiss bank account and returned to London May 17. The sources said Scotland Yard received an alert to be on the lookout for Ray on May 17 but missed him.

Details of Ray's movements between May 17 and the day he was arrested were shadowy, but the police sources said he ran out of money again and was reported to have flown back to Lisbon. Perhaps because of his inability to receive another cash transfer he then decided to fly to Brussels and was caught as he passed through London.

Police Weigh Ray Case Accomplices

'Important' Link | Theorized In Way Suspect Escaped

FROM WIRE SERVICES

Police investigators are weighing the "important possibility" that James Earl Ray, the man accused of killing Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., had important, perhaps underworld, accomplices helping him make his escape to Europe through Ganada.

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police, whose diligent check of passport applications provided the clue leading to his identification and arrest in London last Saturday, has decided that Ray on his own could hardly have worked so fast and successfully in his month in Toronto.

HIS KNOWLEDGE of laxities in procedures for obtaining birth certificates and passports impressed the police as having been expert, the New York Times News Service reported.

"He didn't come cold into the city. There was help of some kind," said an RCMP spokesman. He noted that many Canadians, seeking passports and related documents in the normal way, often complain that it takes longer than the two weeks it took Ray.

He lived in Montreal for a while last July, signing an apartment lease under the alias of Eric S. Galt, a name he also used in Los Angeles.

The real Eric S. Galt is a supervisor with Union Carbide in Scarboro, a community in metropolitan Toronto.

PEOPLE WHO encountered Ray in Canada say he once was handed an envelope by a fat man and that he visited a bar several times to drink beer and watch go-go dencers.

Mrs. Wes Sun Loo, Raw andlady at one of two 20 rento rooming houses where he stayed, said the fat man was the only visitor King's suspected killer had in 16 days.

Ray got the envelope on the day his \$9-a-week rent was due and the day he paid a Toronto travel agency \$345 for a round-trip air ticket to London. Ray arrived in London in mid-May and was arrested there Saturday.

Habitues of two Toronto pool halls said Ray showed up that same day but walked away when asked to shoot a game.

Two waiters at a bar in Toronto's Waverly Hotel said they saw Ray sitting at a front-row table, drinking beer and watching the go-go dancers.

It was believed that Ray was at the bar with another man for two or three concutive nights between April BD and May 3.

All three men - Galt, Bridgman and Sneyd - bear certain resemblances, police say, to Ray. All three have dark hair as does Ray. They are about Ray's height - 5 feet 10 inches. Ray is reported to weigh 174 pounds. Galt weighs 172 and Bridgman 190. Galt is 54 years old but passes for a man much younger. Bridgman and Sneyd are 35, Ray is 40.

When Ray was arrested in London he was carrying two Canadian passports issued to Ramon George Sneyd. When he first came to Toronto on April 8, four days after the King slaving Ray used the name of Reul Transmitten and brained a birth certificate in his name.

POLICE SAY THEY do not know how Ray obtained vital statistics about Bridgman and Sneyd. But this need not have been difficult. He could have obtained the data from birth announcements in Toronto newspapers.

When applying for a passport, using Sneyd's name on April 16, Ray might have checked the telephone directory to ascertain if Sneyd were still alive.

Police say Ray intended to get his passport in Bridgman's name, but after obtaining the appropriate birth certificate and passport photo found that this man already held a passport. How did he find this out? The investigators are trying to learn the answer.

IN LONDON yesterday a judge ordered Ray held without bail on charges of illegally entering Britain and gave the go-ahead for American authoritles to begin extradition proc@edings.

The legal machinery was set

and scowling.

The hearing on the British charges that Ray entered the country with a loaded .38 caliber pistol and forged passport lasted I minute and 22 seconds.

The magistrate ordered Ray held for another hearing on June 18 and informed sources said he grantéd United States authorities a "provisional warrant" for extradition.,

THE PROVISIONAL document gave the U.S. Justice Department the green light to prepare a full, formal application for extradition. Authoritative sources said this will be done at a hearing in Bow Street Court on Thursday. Ray will be present, these sources said.

Immediately after the brief hearing yesterday, guards hustled Ray off to Brixton Prison and transferred him later in the day to the maximum security wing of Wandsworth Prison, Informed prison source, and two dialds were posted in the state of the maintainer and the second

maintain ka watch.

In addition to the murder charges in Tennessee, Ray faces possible trial in Missouri as an escapee from the State Penitentiary there.

With head partially lowered, Ray spoke only twice and both times his voice was barely audible. He had one word to say each time - "No." The judge asked if Ray objected s to restrictions on news coverage of the hearing and if he had a statement of his own lo make.

THOMAS BUTLER, the Scotland Yard detective who are rested Ray at Heathrow Air port last Saturday morning handed Magistrate Frank Mil ton a request for counsel for Ray.

Court sources said the Bow Street magistrate appointed the British law firm of Michael Dresden and Co. to represent Ray. The firm was chosen because it stood next in line on the court's legal aid roster.

Ray could waive opposition o extradition, or the British Home Office could simply deport him to the United States, it was reported.

Ex-Convict Ray Seized After Tip

LONDON (UPI) — Scotland Yard detectives today arrested James Earl Ray, accused of murdering civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr., ending a 65-day manhunt.

Officers said Ray was carrying a loaded pistol and two Canadian passports.

Scotland Yard, working closely with the U.S. Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, announced Ray was seized at the London airport as he was going through British

customs after his arrival on a flight from Lisbon, Portugal.

Informed sources said the arrest was made on a "tip"—possibly from the FBI or the Royal Canadian Mounted Police after an examination of more than 100,000 passport

photos in Washington and Ottawa, Canada. It involved going through every photo of every passport issued in each country since April 5. The total was in excess of at least 10,000.

He was rushed from the airport to Cannon Row Police Station in mondon, where he was charged with possessing a forged passport and a firearm without a certificate,

The arrest of Ray was first announced in Washington by Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark and FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover and then confirmed in London by the famed Scotland Yard.

Clark said extradition proceedings would be initiated shortly to return Ray to the United States, to face murder charges in Memphis, where King was shot April 4.

The arrest of Ray meant police now had in custody both alleged killers in two assassinations which have horrified the United States in recent weeks. In Los Angeles, the alleged assassin of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, Sirhan B. Sirhan, was being held under heavy guard after his indictment for murder.

King's widow, Coretta, attended Kennedy's funeral in New York today and upon leaving St. Patrick's Cathedral was informed of Ray's capture. She moved on impassively without comment.

The Scotland Yard authorities said Ray had been planning to go on to Brussels, Belgium. His forged Canadian passports were in the name of Raymon George Sneyd, 35, of Toronto, Ontario.

The arrest ended a manhunt that was one of the most intense in American history. The escaped Missouri convict was placed on the FBI's most wanted list on an emergency basis 16 days after King was cut down by a rifle shot as he stood on a hotel balcony in Memphis. Ray was indicted for first-degree murder by a Memphis grand jury on May 7.



On June 5, 1968, EARLETTE GARNER, Clerk, New Castle Credit Bureau, New Castle, Indiana, advised according to her records WALTER and CORA KOGER, Route 2, New Castle, enjoyed a satisfactory credit rating with the New Castle Credit Bureau. KOGER's employment was shown with the Dana Corporation, Perfect Circle Division, Hagerstown, Indiana.

On June 5, 1968 the following individuals advised from their records that WALTER and CORA KOGER were unknown to them: Detective HAROLD SWIM, New Castle Police Department, Sheriff ROBERT PAGETT, Henry County Sheriff's Office, and Det. MARTIN WERLING, Indiana State Police, all of New Castle, Indiana.

WALTER RAY KOGER, Route 2, New Castle, Indiana, advised on June 5, 1968, that his nephew, PAUL OSBORN BRIDGMAN, was born at Winchester, Indiana, possible in ______, the son of JAMES and IRENE BRIDGMAN. PAUL OSBORN BRIDGMAN resided in Winchester, Indiana until he was approximately six years old, after which time his parents moved first to Madisonville, Kentucky and then to Warrensburg, Illinois, and subsequently to a town on the Arkansas/Missouri line. BRIDGMAN was raised and possibly attended the public school system of an Arkansas school. BRIDGMAN's only sister, JANET (LNU), still resides in Missouri, town unknown.

KOGER stated that he last saw PAUL OSBORN BRIDGMAN in August of 1963 at the funeral of BRIDGMAN's parents at Monticello, Kentucky. BRIDGMAN's parents were the subject of a murder/suicide death in Daytona Beach, Florida, at which time BRIDGMAN's father allegedly killed his wife and then committed suicide. KOGER felt the circumstances of these deaths were mysterious and noted that BRIDGMAN, who received some money as a result of the deaths, refused to pay the funeral expenses of his father and mother.

KOGER advised that since August, 1963, he had not seen or heard from BRIDGMAN. BRIDGMAN's wife, name unknown, but who is now separated or divorced from BRIDGMAN and possibly resides in Bloomington, Illinois, on one occasion, possibly in September of October, 1963, contacted him by telephone 44-563-350

and requested that she be loaned \$400 to pay hospital expenses incurred by her husband, PAUL OSBORN BRIDGMAN. KOGER refused to make this loan of money and learned later, possibly from BONNIE DAVIS who resides at Madisonville, Kentucky, that BRIDGMAN needed this money for either fine or bail money. Apparently, BONNIE DAVIS had contacted several hospitals at Bloomington, Illinois and had been able to find that BRIDGMAN had never been admitted as a patient.

KOGER stated that this was his last contact, either directly or indirectly, with BRIDGMAN and he had no idea where this individual might presently be located. He denied any knowledge of BRIDGMAN's present whereabouts and stated that if he should receive any information about this individual, he would immediately make it available.

King Murder Probe Continues

By Paul Scott Washington

AGENTS OF THE Federal Bureau of Investigation went through one very tense period and spent more than \$5 million during their brilliantly con-

ducted two-continent man hunt for James Earl Ray, the accused killer

of Dr. Martin Luther King.

After successfully tracking and locating Ray in London early in May, the G-men temporarily lost his trail when he slipped through their surveillance network and flew to Portugal.



While Ray's disappearance almost caused a near panic among top Justice De-

partment officials here, cooler-headed FBI agents directing the search kept the search from collapsing by immediately setting up a new dragnet.

With only the lead that Ray, alias Raymon George Sneyd, had apparently fled to Europe, the FBI agents reasoned that because of his temperament and the foreign language barrier he would soon return to an Englishspeaking country.

SPECIAL WATCHES for Ray were then carefully organized at all ports of entry in Great Britain, Canada, and the U.S., on the belief that the suspect would try to return to one of those nations.

'Before any heads within the agency could roll, the swift chain of events that followed proved the effectiveness of the FBI strategy.

Eleven days after his second disappearance, Ray, alias Sneyd, flew back to London from Lisbon. With the help of British authorities, the FBI again picked up his trail.

Ray was then kept under close surveillance until he suddenly prepared gain to depart Great Britain for urope—this time for Brussels. He was arrested at London Airport before he could board his plane.

Despite Ray's capture, the FBI investigation of King's assassination is far from being closed.

One agent involved in the inquiry says privately that "the arrest of Ray is only the beginning of this inquiry." He points out that "Ray is the key to determining the others involved in the assassination plot."

For instance, FBI and Canadian authorities are still investigating how Ray was able to exploit legal loopholes like a pro in obtaining his Canadian passport.

Several dozen agents are probing Ray's alleged contacts with the U.S.based American South African Council which he wrote on Dec. 30, 1967, to ask about emigrating to Rhodesia. Also, being carefully checked is Ray's contact with a person whom the FBI photographed with King at a major U.S. airport.

ONE OF THE IRONIES of the successful FBI investigation is that just two months before the King assassination, the bureau was obliged to cut) in half the number of agents in Europe, including those in London as a result of President Johnson's order slashing overseas personnel of all government security and intelligence.

When Ray's trail led to London, however, many of these agents were sent back overseas with instructions to forget about the economy move until the suspect was picked up.

In their intensive search for King's killer, the FBI spent more than \$5 million in the first nine weeks of its investigation. At times, upwards of 3,000 agents were assigned to the case.

Half that number of agents still are involved in the continuing investigation. In addition to running down new leads, they are rechecking Ray's travels to and from Memphis, the scene of the assassination.

sion inquiry on the assassination of President Kennedy.

At least 20 per cent of the commission's file remains locked in the National Archives, where the full record of the Kennedy assassination probe is filed.

A list of more than 250 of the sealed documents was prepared recently by attorneys of the Justice Department for further re-examination to determine if their publication should be recommended to the President.

Most intriguing are reports of the Central Intelligence Agency dealing with the private reaction of high Cuban officials to the assassination.

Another deals with a top secret CIA memorandum from Richard Helms (now CIA director) to J. Lee Rankin, chief counsel of the Warren Commission. It is listed under the heading: "Report of Conversations Between Cuban President and Cuban Ambassador."

Also still under seal is a CIA memorandum from Helms to the Commission which carries the following notation: "Discussions between Soviet Premier Khrushchev and Drew Pearson re Lee Harvey Oswald." Neither Helms nor Pearson ever commented publicly on this memorandum or its contents.

STILL UNPUBLISHED among the many FBI reports in the archives is the agency's interview with Yuri Nosenko, a high-ranking member of the KGB, the Soviet secret police, who defected to the U.S. 10 weeks after the assassination of President Kennedy.

The 36-year-old defector had been questioned at length about the KGB's handling of Oswald during the time the ex-Marine lived in Russia.

Before his defection to the West, Nosenko worked in a sector of the KGB which handled U.S. defectors, including Oswald's case.

Another of the FBI investigative reports still sealed in the archives, is titled:

"The investigation concerning telephone numbers found on the 47th page of Oswald's address book."

For information of Cincinnati, St. Louis has advised that JOHN EUGENE GAWRON, alleged JAMES EARL RAY and an unnamed man, robbed a bank in June - July, 1967. GAVRON subsequently revealed the location as the Bank of Alton, Illinois, and the unnamed man as JIMMIE (LNU), and that he was visited by JINNIE (LNU) the night of 5/13 - 14/68. One JAMES H. CARPENTER, FBI #230 243 is known to have visited GAWRON on these dates, however, CARPENTER was in St. Louis City Jail from 0/5/67 - 3/1/68, and could not have participated in the Alton bank robbery.

The bank of Alton, Illinois was robbed by 2 unknown subjects on 7/13/67, wearing nylon stocking masks and using a sawed off shotgun. They escaped with \$27,230. Description of the number 2 man could fit RAY.

Subsequent to the bank robbery a shotgun and items of clothing were found in a vacant lot in Alton, including a white Van Heusen Van-Guard shirt with markings "NU" or "NO", "JOH - U" or "JOH - O", inside collar; a pair of tan pleated trousers with the markings "44--" and "3107-3" on the right front pocket and "T6276" and "U7703" on the right rear pocket.



GECKS, Sales Administrator, National Marking Machine Co., (MATMAR, Inc.), 4026-30 Charry St., Cincinnati, Ohio, was contacted relative to type of specific information needed concerning the laundry marks found on the clothing related to the Alton, Illinois bank robbery on 7/13/67.

Mr. GRCKS advised it would be best to have color photos of the laundry markings taken alongside a ruler or other fine measuring device. GECKS stated from the information furnished him from Chicago sirtel that the markings appear to have been made by a 16 digit machine which can be coded by the user for his own specific purposes. With the use of color photos, GECKS may be able to identify the size of the type used by the machine and other details which would possibly identify the model of the machine used to make the markings. NATMAN can then furnish a list of laundries or dry cleaners in a specific area that are utilizing NATWAR machines that could possibly have made these markings. QECKS stated it would not be possible to identify the markings with a specific location around the country.

"To all Laundries and Dry Cleaning Establishments

On July 13, 1967, two unknown males, wearing stocking masks, robbed The Bank of Alton, Alton, Illinois, at gunpoint and obtained over \$27,000. Investigation of this crime led to the recovery of a white Van Heusen Vanguard shirt and a pair of tan trousers among other items.

The shirt bears laundry marks and the trousers dry cleaning symbols, facsimiles of which appear below. The laundry marks appear on the shirt collar, the dry cleaning symbols appear on the front and rear pockets on the right side of the trousers.
