Ray Motion In King Case Turned Down

MEMPHIS (a—Judge W. Preston Battle rejected Firday a defense contention that James Earl Ray could not get a fair trial here because of widespread publicity given the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. slaying case.

The judge overruled a motion to quash an indictment charging Ray with the civil rights leader's murder and said it was his considered opinion that Ray would receive a fair and impartial trial. The trial is scheduled to start Nov. 12.

Ray was not present in the courtroom when the motion, one of three by the defense, was heard and rejected. His attorney, Arthur J. Hanes, former mayor of Birmingham, Ala., waived his client's presence for the arguments and Judge Battle permitted the hearing to proceed without him.

Even so there was little relaxing of the tight security measures prevalent when Ray was arraigned last July. Newsmen were frisked before being admitted to the courtroom and none was permitted to leave while the proceedings were in progress.

Speaking at a recent law enforcement seminar in Kansas, FBI agent George Bone-brake reiterated the testimony he gave in London which linked James Earl Ray to the rifle allegedly used to assassinate the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Ray Gets Off Easy

JAMES EARL RAY believed in capital punishment for Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. but not for himself.

As the climax to the weird case in Memphis, Ray pleaded guilty to murdering Dr. King last April.

But the plea was part of a deal to save Ray from the electric chair.

In California there is no doubt about who murdered Sen. Robert F. Kennedy. Sirhan Sirhan admits it. His whole pitch at the trial is to escape the capital punishment he meted out to the senator.

Ray's deal in Memphis was made with the judge, the jury and the prosecution. It was not made with the public, or with those bescaved by the murder.

IN THE COURTROOM, the defense attorney and the prosecutor both insisted Ray acted alone in the murder, that there was no evidence of conspiracy.

But Ray, voluntarily, stood up in court and voiced his disagreement with the theory that there

was no conspiracy.

Whether there was or not may never be known now, even though the Justice Department claims the investigation is still "open." Whatever Ray had on his mind, true or untrue, presumably will remain undisclosed. If he had had to stand a four-square trial, with the threat of execution confronting him, it might have been a different story. Who san say now?

"If there was a conspiracy," said the judge from the bench, "no member of such conspiracy can ever live in peace or lie down to pleasant dreams because there is no statute of limitations on: capital cases in this state."

LHO

But a conspirator, or conspirators, if there were any, now can rest much easier. The trial is over. Ray will be under no more compulsion to talk-if, indeed, he had anything to say.

CONCEDING there are "practical" aspects to an engineered verdict, such deals nevertheless leave the impression that justice has not been clear-cut. And in this case, doubt about the possibility of a conspiracy is bound to flourish. The more so because, in the brevity of the compromise trial, no motive was even suggested. In most capital trials, motive is one of the major factors.

In short, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., who had no opportunity to compromise with his killer, is dead. But James Earl Ray, while he presumably will spend the rest of his days in prison, is alive.

Is this justice?

Was James Earl Ray capable as a person of the kind of animus that would drive him—alone—to kill Martin Luther King Jr.? The question is a haunting one because the available evidence is inconclusive on this score. Prosecutor Canale in Memphis says there are indications of race hatred on Ray's part.

Ray's lawyer, Percy Foreman, has now answered the above question in the affirmative. In an interview with the Columbia Broadcasting System, he expressed the belief Ray was such a person. One has to understand the criminal mind, Mr. Foreman says.

He agrees with the judge in the case that perspective may have been served by not bringing the murder to trial. There might have been a danger of Memphis burning, he says, but he reminds the public that his own objective was to see that James Earl Ray did not burn. Criminal Court Judge W. Preston Hattle Jr., who presided in the Ray case, disclosed Wednesday that he had been notified by Ray that he wanted to withdraw his guilty plea and stand trial for first-degree murđer.

The judge said also that Ray wrote his he had fired his attorney, Percy Foreman of Houston, Tex.

Stoner, 44, has been involve in Ku Klux Klan and anti-Jew ish activities since boyhood. At 16, he was an organizer and officer of a Chattanooga, Tenn., Klan and once was shown as the Kleagle of Tennessee.

Formed Party

In 1945, he formed the "Stoner Anti-Jewish party" and mailed out pamphlets urging removal of the Jews. In 1952, he an-nounced fermation of the Chris-tian Anti-Jewish party and urged departation of Jews and confiscation of their property for distribution to "Christian Americans.

He authored a book entitled "The Gospel of Jesus Christ Versus the Jews."
