He advised that on March 14, 1968, he and Greg Birmingham flew to Los Angeles, California, and registered at the Shangri Lodge, 9510 Van Nuys Boulevard, Panorama City, California. According to Mr. Mc Namara, Birmingham registered under the name of Eric S. Galt.

The records of the Shangri Lodge for March, 1968 were located at Bekins Records Center, 215 North Canon Drive, Beverly Hills, California on March 3, 1969 and were reviewed by Special Agents of the FBI. No record for Eric S. Galt, Gregory Birmingham, or Leo Mc Namara for March 14, 1968 was located.

GANZER advised he has a number of acquaintances in the Bureau including TOM BISHOP and that he ordinarily covers the East Coast.

It should be noted CHARLIE STEIN made a trip to New Orleans with subject RAY and is a hippie type who is constantly on the move. His sister RITA reportedly has returned to New Orleans.

GANZER was tactfully advised that there is no information available as to the STEINs' current whereabouts.

JAMES MARL RAY

Raul Victor Esquivel, Sr., was interviewed at his residence, 4534 Persimons Street, Metairie, Louisiana. Esquivel identified himself as a Trooper with the Louisiana State Police, and stated he had been so employed for the past ten and one-half years. He further advised that he had been assigned to Troop B of the State Police in Metairie, Louisiana, for the past several years.

Maquivel stated that he has resided at his present residence for the past several years, that he built the residence himself, that he has raised his family in that residence, and that at the present time, only he and his wife are residents of the home. He stated that his son, Raul Maquivel, Jr., is married, resides in New Orleans and that he is a grandparent as a result of his son's marriage, his grandson having been mused Raul Maquivel, III. Maquivel furnished the following information:

Upon observation of a photograph of Charles J.
Stein, Esquivel did not recognize Stein as a person he
has ever seen, nor did he recall of having ever heard of
the name Charles Stein. Upon observation of three photographs of James Earl Ray, including two front and one
right profile, Esquivel recognized Eay for the reason that
Eny's photographs were widely publicised following his
identification as the individual who assassizated Martin
Luther: Eing. Esquivel has never been personally acquainted
with Eny and to the best of his knowledge has never persenally observed Eny, except by photographs through news
medis. Esquivel has never visited Canada, Mexico, Eirmingham,
Alabama, or Mamphis, Tennessee. Esquivel has no personal
knowledge of James Earl Ray.

According to "Look" magazine articles concerning activities of James Earl Ray, the following dates are deted wherein Ray and his friend "Raoul" are alleged to have been together.

"Raoul" allegedly was in Memphis, Tennessee, and fired the shot at 6:00 PM that killed Martin Luther King.

Prior investigation has disclosed that Trooper Esquivel had worked as follows during the month of August, 1967:.

Further investigation has disclosed that during August, 1967, Esquivel was assigned to duties in different areas of the Troop B responsibility since he was filling in for other troopers on their day's off. During August, 1967, Esquivel worked in the New Orleans area.

Requivel stated that he has not engaged in any lengthy travel of recent years and noted that for the past three years, a great majority of his off-duty time has been devoted to the building in his garage at home of a small airplane. Esquivel advised that he is a licensed pilot.

Requivel recalled that during the summer months of 1967, he was performing duties out of Troop B, but that he does not recall any specific activities on any specific dates. He stated that he would also be unable to recall any specific dates of his activities during the months of October and December, 1967, and April, 1968.

Maguivel pointed out that he regards himself as a professional law enforcement officer, that he takes pride in his occupation and that he has nothing whatsoever to hide. He stated that if he did possess any information concerning Ray or the assassination of King, he would not hesitate to furnish same to the FBI.

V'illiam Bradford Huie has written a third article for "Look" magazine. The article appears in the issue dated April 15, 1989, but this issue was circulated on April 1, 1930. A review of the article reveals that James Earl Eay allogedly registered at the Travelodge Motel, Five Points, Birmingham, Alabama, on March 20, 1908; at a motel near Florence, Alabama, on April 1, 1900; and at a motel near Corinth, Elisaissippi, on April 2, 1968. It is to be noted that Eay, using the name Marvey Lowmyer, negotiated the purchase of a rifle at the Acromariae Supply Company, Birmingbam, Alabama, on March 29 and 39, 1989. On April 3, 1988, he was registered at the Rebol Motel in Monachis, Tennessee.

In an effort to establish whether or not Ray was in contact with any individuals immediately prior to the assassination, appropriate investigation should be conducted by the Dirmingham and Jackson Cifices. It should be understood that there is to be no indication made whatsoever that the following investigation has any connection whatsoever with the case involving James Harl Ray.

Dirmiegham and Jackson Offices should make inquiries of the motels in or near the cities indicated above to determine the identities ci individuals registered during the period Larch 29 to April 3, 1988. Efforts should be made to identify all individuals listed. as well as

obtaining descriptions and registrations for the automobiles of such persons. A review of such records might indicate whether any one individual might have accompanied Ray or been in contact with him during this period. Pertinent or questionable registration records should be obtained if possible for examination by the FEI Laboratory.

Momphis should insure that the Eureau is kept currently advised of pertinent developments in this case, particularly all aspects of court action since the death of Judge Battle on March 31, 1989.

Approx. 300 were present at the dinner(there were approx. 50-60 at each table) with 5 tables being used. Approx. 40 persons were standing in line to await seating for the dinner, yet. Many persons left, after the dinner, leaving approx. 200-250 who heard the evening speeches in the auditorium.

Agenda-

Unknown woman, acting as m.c., introduced different persons, who were affiliated with the Fellowship for Social Justice, who were seated at tables in the foreground. They did not speak, however. (unknown). Other speakers, she introduced, included Susan Schnall(Lt.), Jack E. Lunsford (district spoke), and Robert M. Hamburger (Lunsford and he were were from the Whittier Unitarian Church, being a.w.o.l.), and Evelyn J. Whitehorn (who refused the permission for her son to be drafted), and Stephen H. Fritchman, (Rev., of the First Unitarian Church, Eighth St., L.A.) Believe several others spoke, but was outside (due to needed space at the tables, therefore, unable to get names), or content of speech.

Lunsford, in speaking, said there were 15 others at the Whittier sanctuary, who were a.w.o.l. He said he had been there now 45 days and would not be leaving, though, he added one or two of persons, there, felt they might be leaving and have to make up their own minds in their decision(names unknown). Stated the government(federal men) have not tried to come into the sanctuary to get them out, and didn't know why, but felt they must have their own reasons, probably being that it was a church. Said it was a useless war and his morals wouldn't let him serve in killing for such.

Evelyn Whitehorn's speech context dealt with the story of her son being underage, therefore, being as he was underage to vote, drink, and she was responsible for him until he was 21, she has refused permission for him to be drafted, too. Other contents of speech remarks were along line from leaflet "The Whitehorn Case", leaflet put out by the Fellowship for Social Justice. (See Samuelled). It was announced there is now a Whithorn Defense Fund(P.O. Box 2766, Menlo Park, Cal. 94025) and calls to support her was made.

Charge for the dinner, alone, was \$2.00 with tickets for such having been sold before the dinner, by members of the fellowship. The evening program charge was \$1.00. Tickets for a combination

of both had been sold for \$3.00. Many had bought tickets for just the evening program, alone, Others bought tickets for the evening program, at the door. Tickets, for the dinner, had been sold out and were not being sold, then, at the door. Dinner consisted of beef stogonoff, green beans, small dish of fruit cocktail, a bun, small slice of fruit pie, and milk, coffee or tea.

Evening speeches were made by Fritchman, who spoke of previous awards the fellowship has given through the years. (one of whom included Dumbrowski (Southern Conference Educational Fund-one of which King and Abernathy were affialiated with-check for accurracy of correct name of such). He stated this year they were happy to announce Lt. Schnall was being given the award of the year. for the courage, admiradation (check spelling accurracy) she has displayed in her fight to bring freedom in speaking out in the military services. He presented a signed petition to her (names of members of this church, from Sunday school age up to the elderly, included. Along with it was a check (amount not announced, though when she looked at it, a huge smile came forth, therefore, assuming it was a large check). He said it was to help her in the costs of her attorney and defense in fighting her case from the military. (to that effect). Cover of petition, he added, was designed from the peace symbol(name unknown who designed such. though mentioned).

Lt. Schmall's speech content dealt with her trial, harrassment, etc. She stated the C.I.A. and F.B.I. tried to plant evidence to get servicemen arrested at the Fort Hood, Texas, coffee-house(G.I.) but it hadn't worked as they had been forewarned and got rid of it before the government's arrival, so they couldn't find anything therefore, no arrests were able to be made. A tape or bug had been found, too, which had been put out of commission, she stated. She called for support for servicemen to be able to speak out in freedom, against the war. She stated the military had tried to, in brainwashing her, tell her that the peacemovent is filled with communists and they were trying to destroy the country with riots, racial fights, etc. She said it was their words, not her feelings.

Her husband spoke about the medical aspects of the war, the wounded, dead, etc. Said he hasn't been involved as his wife, but is trying in his own knowledge to help. (is or was supposed to have attended some American Medical Association meeting (annual one) to speak out.

Mr. Neuman(Newman-President of the Fellowship) spoke for several minutes on the Fellowship and it's purposes. Mr. and Mrs. Grant(her first name was Shurli) sang some folk-type songs and played instruments. Fritchman supported the work they are doing and told persons to pick up a printed sheet in the hall to see the great job they are doing. (see the great job they

Literature and books were sold in the hall, outside auditorium. All types including Black Panther books and newspapers, Abraham Lincoln Brigade pamphlet, Soviet Weekly, Moscow News, (Several hundred different types of such being sold) Betty Rottger gave out the Whitehorn leaflet and a Peace Vigil leaflet at the door.

A collection was made, after the end of program, with many giving checks and ten-dollar donations. Amount was not mentioned as to the total collection taken in.

Announcement was made by Fritchman that there would be a Fellowship for Social Justice meeting that next day, and any wishing to attend for perhaps joining such, were welcome. He, also, mentioned a meeting would be held next Sat. (or Sun.) whereby the candidates who had ran for the Junior College Trustees Board would be present so persons could get acquainted with them. These were to be at the church, here, both meetings.

Wright has stated he disliked Negroes and hasreferred to them in vulgar terms. About two orthree days after the Martin Luther King murder, three males, identity unknown, visited Wright and they, including Wright, saluted each other with "Sieg Heil" salutes. These persons were dressed "roughly" in slacks and shirts. Two of them were between 35 and 40 years of age. One was about 23-24 years old. All were Caucasians and had short haircuts. One of them mentioned that a new light was shining; that "we" have gotten rid of Kennedy and King. Another of the three said in a Southern voice, "Now, if we can kill Warren." He did not identify Warren. One of the men said he hoped "we" paid enough and mother in the goup then said "we" did par enough. That was said in connection with talk about the King murder.

On the 4th or 5th day after the King murder, C went to the office of James Watkins, attorney, in Torrance, who is a close friend of Wright's. While there, a woman came in with a box containing about 40-50 magazines for U. S. Army M-16 carbine automatics. Watkins told the woman, "We canget a lot of them now". C thought that was a reference to "getting" negroes. These magazines had been ngthened to hold more rounds. Watkins told C that he hoped the killer of King would not be caught.

On the 7th or 8th day after the Ming killing, Wright flew to San Antonio and Dallas, Texas. When he treturned he pulled a brand new Army .45 cal. automatic out of his desk ad said that they were going to get several hundred of them. Wright said that one of them could blow off a "night is head with one shot. During this conversation Wright received a phone call from San Antonio. The girl at the switchboard identified the caller to Wright as one of his men. Wright talked on the phone, laughed, and said That was number one. We'll have to start killing them by the dozen. Wright said on the telephone, we can give him \$2500. and he can get the rest back there from the caller. C suspected this come erned some assassination. Wright mentioned the caller's name as Bud and identified him as one of those heading the telephone company in San Antonio.

Prior to the murder of King, C overheard conversations of people visiting Wright and overheard them making detrimental remarks about Regroes.

On several occasions persons in Wright's office mentioned the Klan or the Ku Klux Klan and also mentioned that their head man in the Klan was on trial infederal court. C mentioned that Wright, Cliff Eubanks, Watkin's son were among those in the Klan. C said he knew JAMES WATKINS was a Klan official as others referred to him a "boss". These people do target practice in the Borstow, Calif. area.

The son of James Watkins (FNU) was a body guard for General Le May during the last presidential campaign.

Wright has about 4 guns in his dask. On one occasion Wright, after speaking on the telephone, told C that he had been talking to the secretary of millionaire cilman Hunt in Texas and that he would be seeing Hunt. Wright and James Watkins were jubilant when Senator Kennedy was milled. On December 2 or 3,1968, Wright went to Dallas and Houston, Texas, and returned with new automatics.

C overheard one conversation involving Wright and someone in Texas, name unknown. Wright told the caller, "We have enough to blackmail him and then we'll make him work for us whether he likes it or not."

Wright has indicatedhe has frequent telephone conversations with oilman Hunt.

A certain telephone company employee who does telephone work at Wright's is friendly with Wright and is a "Sieg Heil" man. Wright has askedthis man for confidential telephone company information. Wright has done this in connection with mention of Negroes and their (Megroe's) allies.

On one occasion while a radio/was reporting some violence Wright asked C if he could shoot. Wright has encouraged C to join Wright's group. Wright indicated the group hated negroes. Wright told C that he could get rich if he joined.

On three or four occasions, Wright has bragged about having six Torrance police officers "in his hand". Prior to the election a Torranc officer talked to Wright nearly every other day, doing so with the door to Wright's office, closed.

One week ago C reminded Wright that Wright owed him money. Wright then said, "You know what fafia people do when you are behind in payments?" C understood this to mean that Wright would have to first pay the Mafia money he owed them.

Additionally, C suspects Wright of passing bade hecks but said he does not know of specific details at this time. Wright has an account at Imperial Bank, Torrance Blvd. and Hawthorne.

James Watkins, the attorney, is described as White race, about 60 years, 5' S or 9", having a stocky build.

Cliff Eubanks is with Cliff Eubanks Electric, Torrance. He is of white race, about 40-42 years, about 6'0", 160 lbs. He has dark curly Thair and a moustache.

C said that he would hear conversations and partial conversations at Wright's office and heard conversations similar to "he will be contacted there upon hisarrival and willbe paid plenty."

ADDENDUM:

DeLong was recontacted on6-23-69 for clarification of certain of the foregoing information:

He advised that with reference to "Kennedy and King", their first names were not mentioned but Source said he understood, however, this to be a reference to martin Luther King and to President John Kennedy.

Source advised that General LeMay is identical with General Curtis LeMay, who, during the last presidential campaign ran for Vice President on the American Independent arty ticket along with George Wallacewho ran for President on that ticket.

With reference to millionaire oilman Hunt to whom he had previously referred, Source a dvised that Wright had not referred to Hunt using a first name. Source advised that he assumed reference was being made to Lamar Hunt.

Mr. CURTIS WILLIAMS, 650 West 106th Street, Los Angeles, California, and a sales representative, American Telephone and Telegraph Company, Room 1250, 727 West 7th Street, Los Angeles, California, furnished the following information on 7/28/69.

WILLIAMS served on the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) as a patrolman for approximately twenty months, terminating that employment approximately one year ago.

WILLIAMS stated he recently returned from a visit with his mother, Mrs. MARY WILLIAMS, Route 1, Box 139B, Somerville, Tennessee (phone 465-25530-party line). On the last day of his visit, his mother furnished him the following information:

A personal friend of Mrs. WILLIAMS, DOLL COE, a domestic, had been employed by a white family in Somerville for over 12 years. COE was a respected and trusted employee of this family (name unknown to CURTIS WILLIAMS). About two days prior to the assassination of MARTIN LUTHER KING, and during the evening hours, a Mr. PARSONS, a white Somerville businessman, came to COE's employer's residence in company with another white man, never before seen by COE.

The three men sat around a table in conversation.

Whenever COE would come within voice range, they would cease their conversation, which was unusual behavior at that residence. At one point, the stranger left the house for a few minutes and returned with a box. The box was later opened, and Mrs. COE observed a gun, not further described, and a gun scope. When the three men became aware of Mrs. COE's presence in the room, they concealed the gun.

Mrs. COE thought the behavior of the three men unusual and strange. Prior to her returning to her residence that evening, Mrs. COE retrieved the box in which the gun had been contained from the trash and removed it to her residence. She continues to have custody of the box which is concealed in the attic of her home.

Mrs. WILLIAMS advised her son that after JAMES EARL RAY was apprehended and his photograph appeared in the newspapers, Mrs. COE felt that the unknown male who appeared at her employer's home earlier in April was JAMES EARL RAY.

According to CURTIS WILLIAMS, Mrs. COE is not hostile toward white people but is afraid of them. Because of this fear, she never furnished the foregoing information to anyone except Mrs. WILLIAMS. She has not furnished it to any law enforcement agency and has never been interviewed by any agency regarding MURKIN. CURTIS WILLIAMS stated that according to his mother, Mrs. COE terminated her employment subsequent to the above incident, but he does not know when or under what circumstances.

DOLL COE resides north of Somerville on Highway 19. Her son, MICKEY COE, is presently serving a 12-year sentence for murder, having previously served time for burglary.

CURTIS WILLIAMS stated his mother would be cooperative during interview with the FBI, and that if requested, she could arrange for interview with Mrs. COE.
