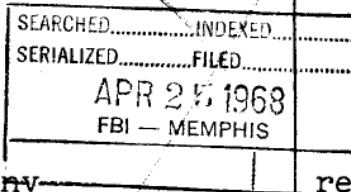

Re Louisville airtel 4/16/68, enclosing FD-302s incorporating data furnished by Mrs. JASPER WARD and Mrs. NORMA DAVIS, who, together with Rev. A. D. WILLIAMS KING of Louisville, Kentucky, were registered in the Lorraine Hotel in Memphis 4/4/68.

Enclosed for the Bureau and Atlanta each is one copy of an FD-302 and for Memphis nine copies, recording information furnished on 4/22/68 by Rev. A. D. WILLIAMS KING.

As a matter of information, it might be noted that during the interview Rev. A. D. WILLIAMS KING was very pleasant and indicated that he felt confident that the FBI would be successful in apprehending the murderer of his brother and only hoped that once in custody, sufficient protection will be afforded the individual to insure he lives to stand trial. It was explained to Rev. KING that the matter of the protection of a prisoner would be the responsibility of the prison officials in whose custody the prisoner might be. Rev. KING stated he understood this.

As noted in re airtel, as of 4/15/68, Rev. A. D. WILLIAMS KING reportedly was in Atlanta, Ga., and was scheduled to return to Louisville late 4/17/68. Telephonic effort by SA WARREN L. WALSH on the morning of 4/18/68 to reach Rev. KING at his home in Louisville were negative. A message was left with his son for Rev. KING to telephonically contact SA WALSH on his return to Louisville.

Later on the morning of 4/18/68, SA WALSH telephonically contacted the Kien Baptist Church in Louisville where Rev. KING is pastor and was advised that Rev. KING had not yet returned to Louisville. At 5:15 p.m. on 4/18/68, SA WALSH telephonically reached Rev. KING's wife at his residence, and she advised that Rev. KING had not yet returned to Louisville, but was expected momentarily. SA WALSH explained to Mrs. KING that he desired to talk with Rev. A. D. WILLIAMS KING because of the report that Rev. KING had been in Memphis, Tenn., at the Lorraine Motel on the date that his brother had been shot. Accordingly, it was felt he might possibly have information of value in connection with instant investigation. Mrs. KING stated she would have her husband promptly contact SA WALSH upon his return to Louisville.

Not having heard from Rev. A. D. WILLIAMS KING as of 10 a.m. 4/22/68, SA WALSH telephonically contacted his home and reached him there. Rev. KING advised he had received the message for him to call SA WALSH, but he had been so busy he had not as yet had the opportunity to set up the appointment. He advised he would be available in the office of his church at noon, 4/22/68, for interview.

Reverend A. D. WILLIAMS KING, 1005 Southwestern Parkway, Louisville, Kentucky, pastor of the Zion Baptist Church, 2200 West Walnut Street, Louisville, Kentucky, was interviewed in the office of his church. He furnished the following information:

He is the brother of the late Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.

Late on the night of April 3, 1968, Reverend A. D. WILLIAMS KING arrived in Memphis, Tennessee, and registered in the Lorraine Motel for the purpose of assisting his brother in connection with the brother's efforts to settle the sanitation strike then in progress in Memphis. He had several contacts with his brother on Thursday, April 4, 1968. During the morning of April 4, 1968, he was in the company of his brother when the brother held a strategy meeting in Room 306 of the Lorraine Motel concerning the action to be taken by his brother and his associates with respect to efforts to obtain a suitable settlement to the sanitation strike. This meeting lasted several hours in the morning.

On the afternoon of April 4, 1968, Reverend KING was with his brother and other individuals at the Lorraine Motel for several hours. This was not a business meeting but rather a social gathering. This gathering ended shortly before 6 p.m. April 4, 1968, when the participants had decided to go to dinner. Reverend KING had taken several sleeping pills during the gathering and went to his room and fell asleep. Sometime shortly thereafter, exact time not remembered, he was awakened and told that his brother had been shot and had been taken to a hospital. Reverend KING immediately felt in his own mind that his brother was dead although as yet no announcement of death had been made. For several minutes Rev. KING felt extreme bitterness, but then when he became rational, he reasoned that whoever had done such a deed had to be mentally "sick" and the bitterness left Reverend KING and he remembered a passage

in the Bible in which JESUS CHRIST, during his agony and death, called upon His heavenly father to:

Father, forgive them for they know not what they do.

Reverend KING then realized that if his Christian upbringing was what he feels it to be, he had to feel the same way about the shooting of his brother.

Reverend KING further commented that the murder of his brother has only served to make him see more clearly that violence is not the answer to the Negroes' problem.

Reverend KING stated that during the several contacts he had with his brother on April 4, 1968, his brother gave no indication that he had received any information indicating an attempt on his life would be made on that date. On the contrary, his brother seemed to Reverend KING to be overly jubilant in that he, the brother, felt that he was making progress in obtaining a desirable solution for the sanitation strikers in Memphis, Tennessee.

Reverend KING advised that after his arrival in Memphis, Tennessee, late on April 3, 1968, until after the shooting of his brother, he, Reverend KING, had left the Lorraine Motel on only one occasion, that being around noon, April 4, 1968, when he, in the company of Mrs. LUCRETIA WARD of Louisville, Kentucky, who was also staying on that date at the Lorraine Motel, went to a nearby dry cleaning establishment and drugstore to make some purchases. On this occasion, they were gone from the motel but for a short time and Reverend KING observed nothing unusual or indicative of any indication that harm might befall his brother on that date.

Reverend KING further commented that prior to his above visit to Memphis, Tennessee, he had last personally seen his brother in Washington, D.C., in February, 1968, exact date not recalled. However, he frequently telephonically was in contact with his brother and during none of these contacts did his brother indicate to him that any open threat upon his life had been made. However, Reverend KING

commented that he knew his brother lived with the thought in mind that efforts might be made to assassinate him and Reverend KING feels such an effort did occur in Birmingham, Alabama, several years ago, when first Reverend KING's home was dynamited and about 20 minutes later, the motel at which his late brother was then staying was also dynamited.

1. OFFENSE:

This defendant on April 1, 1955 entered a plea of guilty to an Information in one count which charges that he on or about March 21, 1955, at Kansas City Missouri knowingly, wilfully, unlawfully, and feloniously forged a material endorsement on U. S. Post Office Department Money Order No. 7-42,239,597. On this same date a companion, Walter Terry Rife, entered a plea of guilty in Docket No. 19149 to an Information in one count charging him with forgery on March 21, 1955 of postal money order No. 7-42,239,5--. Imposition of sentence as to defendant and his companion was deferred and this presentence investigation was ordered.

The facts of the case are as follows: On March 7, 1955 the U. S. Post Office at Kellerville, Ill. was burglarized and sixty-six blank U. S. Postal Money Orders, SNs. 7-42,233,535 to 7-42,239-600, inclusive, and the office validating stamp were stolen. On 3/8/55 at Alton, Illinois an unsuccessful attempt was made to cash one of these stolen money orders. On 3/21/55, one of the stolen money orders, order No. 7-42,239,597, was presented to Askin's Clothing Co., 1206 Grand Avenue, Kansas City, Missouri, by an unknown person in payment for a suit of clothes which was never picked up after alterations had been made. This money order, which was in the amount of \$75.00, was made payable to Willard J. McBride with the purchaser being shown as Vernon McBride. On this same date an unknown person presented stolen money order No. 7-42,239,568 to the Chiafies Office Machine Co., 1410 Grand Avenue, Kansas City, Missouri, in payment for a used portable Remington typewriter. This money order, too, was in the amount of \$75.00 payable to Willard J. McBride with the purchaser being shown as Vernon McBride. The manager of this firm, being suspicious of this transaction, directed an employee to follow the customer. The employee noted the model and make of the automobile entered by the customer and the license number of the car. Later when this money order was ascertained to have been stolen a description of the customer and his automobile was given to post office inspectors who alerted the Missouri State Highway Patrol. A highway patrolman on March 23, 1955 at Hannibal, Missouri arrested in this automobile Walter Terry Rife, James Earl Ray, and a woman companion who has been released. On March 24, 1955, Rife executed a statement for postal inspectors in which he admitted he had prepared, forged and uttered the postal money order presented to the Chaffee Office Supply Company in Kansas City. He admitted preparing the money order which was uttered on forged endorsement at Askin's Clothing Co., Kansas City, Missouri. He admitted that he had prepared the face of the money orders made ready for cashing and which were found in the automobile in which he was arrested. He admitted cashing numerous other money orders on forged endorsements in the states of Florida, Louisiana, Arkansas, and Missouri. He recalled unsuccessfully attempting to cash the money order at Alton, Illinois on March 8, 1955. In his statement he admits that he purchased in Quincy, Illinois the stolen money orders. They were sold to him by an unidentified man for \$20. On March 24, 1955 Ray, declining to execute statement for postal inspectors, did verbally state that he had participated with Rife in the cashing of the stolen money orders in the various states. He denied actually knowing that the money orders were stolen. However, he admittedly presumed that they were for he had been told by Rife that they had been purchased for \$20. He admitted that it was he who forged and uttered the money order presented at Askin's Clothing Co. in Kansas City, Missouri. He stated that he purchased for \$1 in St. Louis Missouri from a "Wino" named Willard J. McBride the identification he and Rife used in uttering the money orders.

The two money orders uttered by Rife and Ray in Kansas City, Missouri and as well the money order Rife attempted to utter in Alton, Ill. have been recovered. As noted previously thirty-four of the money orders were recovered in the automobile. On April 18, 1955 when reinterviewed by postal inspectors Rife and Ray gave particulars relating to the cashing of twenty-seven additional stolen money orders located by the Regional Accounting Office. Post Office, Kellerville, Illinois, on March 7, 1955. Defendant categorically denies the burglary of the post office. He states that his companion in the instant offense, Walter T. Rife, whom he met at a bar in Quincy, Illinois suggested that he accompany Rife and cash the money orders which Rife reportedly had purchased from an unknown person. He states that from July of 1950 to June 1951 he was employed by the Arday Corporation, Chicago, Illinois. He was discharged from this employment for absenteeism caused by his arrest in Alton, Illinois for vagrancy when visiting in that city.

He claims that from April 1950 to July of 1950 he was employed as a laborer at a wage of 90¢ per hour by the Hoe Produce Company, Chicago, Illinois. He claims to have left this employment to accept more lucrative employment.

From July 1949 to September 1949 defendant states he was employed as a laborer at a wage of \$1.10 per hour by the Bayden Rubber Company, Chicago, Illinois. He quit this job to move to California.

He purports that from May 1944 to December of 1945 he was employed at a wage of 65¢ per hour by the International Shoe Company, Hartford, Illinois. He indicates he was laid off by this employer in a general reduction of forces and that he then entered the army.
