This defendant on April 1, 1955 entered a plea of guilty to an Information in one count which charges that he on or about March 21, 1955 at Ransas City, Minsouri knowingly, wilfully, unlawfully, and feloniously forged a material endorsement on a U. S. Post Office Department Money order No. 7-12,239,597. On this same date a companion, Valter Torry Rife, entered a ples of guilty in Declar's No. 19119 to an information in one count charging him with the forgary on North: 71. 1955 of postal money order No. 7-62,239,536. Imposition of centence as to defendant and his companion was deferred and this presentence investigation was ordered.

The facts of the case are as follows: On March 7, 1955 the U. J. . ost Office st del'erville, illinois was burglarised and sixty-six blank U. S. Postal Kenny Orders, Serial Wos. 7-62,237,535 to 7-62,239,600 inclusive, and the office validdating stump/vers stolen. On March 8, 1955 at Alten, Illinois an unsuccessful attempt was made to cash one of these stolen money orders. On March 21, 1955 one of the stolen money orders, order No. 7-h2,239,597, was presented to Askin's Clothing Company, 12% Grand Avenue, Kansas City, Missouri, oy an unknown person in payment for a suit of clothes which was nover licked up after alterations had been made. This money order, which was in the amount of 175.00, was take tayable to Willard J. McBride with the purchaser being shown as Vernon octride. On this same date an unknown person presented stalen money order No. 7-12,239,568 to the Chaffer Office Machine Company, 1810 Grand Avenue, Soneas City, Missouri, in payment for a used portable Remington typesriter. This money order, too, was in the amount of 175.00 payable to willard it corrido with the surchaser being shown as Vergon McBride. The manager of this firm, being suspicious of this transaction, directed an employee to follow the customer. The employee noted the model and make of the nutomobile entered by the easterner and the license number of the car. Later whom this money order was assistated

to have been stolen a description of the customer and his automobile was given to post office inspectors who alorted the Missouri State Highway Fatrol. A highway patrolean on March 23, 1955 at Mannibal, Missouri arrested in this automobile Walter Terry Hife, Jemes Earl Ray, and a voman companion of the been released. Thirty-four of the money orders stolen from the feller life, Il incis fost office were found hidden under the dash above the glove compartment in this automobile. All of them had been stamped with the validating stamp. Some were made out ready for cashing while others were not.

On March Ch, 1959 Rife executed a statement for costal inspectors in which he admitted he had prepared, forged and uttored the postal memory order presented to the Chaffee Office Supply Company in Manson (Lity. He adultted preparing the rune, order which was attered on forged endorpement at assin's Alothing Gompany, Lancar City, Missburi. He admitted that he ned prepared the race of the money orders made ready for cashing and which were found in the automobile in which he was arrested. He admitted eaching numerous other nomey orders on forged andorsements in the states of Florida, Jouisiana, Arkaness, and Fiscouri. We recalled unsuccessfully attempting to cash the money order at Alto:, Illinois on Carch 6, 1955. In his statement he admits that he purchared in Coincy, Illinois the stolen money orders. They were sold to him by an unidentified man for \$20. On March 21, 1955 Ray, declining to execute statement for postal inspectors, did verbally state that he had participated with 'd.o in the coshing of the stolen money orders in the various states. He doubted noticelly knowing that the money orders were stolen. However, he schittedly presumed that they were for he had been told by Rife that they had been purchased for \$23. He admitted that it was be who forged and uttered the money order presented at Askin's Mothing Company in Kansas City, Missouri. He stated that he purchased for Il in St. Louis, Missouri from a "Wino" named Willard J. McBride the identification he and Rife used in uttering the money orders.

The two money orders uttered by Bife and Day in Paness City, Discouri and as well the money order Rife attempted to utter in Alton, Illinois have been recovered. As noted previously thirty-four of the money orders were recovered in the automobile. On April 15, 1955 when reinterviewed by postal inspectors Rife and Ray gave particulars relating to the cashing of twenty-seven additional stolen money orders located by the Regional Accounting Office. The particulars are as set out in the following table:

Two of the stolen money endors have not you been recovered. They, however, eye ascounted for as Ray has admitted eaching one of them at a luggege store in Assocra-City, Kensas and Rife admits cashing one of them at Hismi Beach, Florida.

It is pertinent to note that following the apprehension of Rife and Ray postal inspectors obtained from the room which they occupied a quantity of merchandles they had acquired by passing the stolen mency orders. Found in their room ware a typewriter, several pieces of luggage, a radio, a camera, a wristwitch, a considerable quantity of new wearing apparel for men, and other items. They have authorized the postal inspectors to return this merchandics to the stores or individuals from whem it was obtained.

Under released on probation from that sentence he returned to residence in Chicago where he lived alone until he was committed in June of 1952 to the Illinois State Penitentiary. Since his release from the Illinois State Penitentiary in March of 195h he has been rether transient living principally in Quincy, Illinois.

V. EDUCATION:

Defendent states that he completed the let through the 8th grades at St. Hary's School in Alton, Illinois. He states that in 1952 while residing in Chicage, Illinois he attended the Academy of Adults and obtained the equivalent of a two-year high school education.

VI. RELIGION:

Defendent denies any effiliation. His nother was Catholic, and his father was Protestant. While in military service he infrequently attended Catholic pervices.

VII. INTERESTS AND ACTIVITIES:

None.

VIII. HEALTH:

Defendent 10 5' 10g" tall, weight 170 lbs., has a raidy complexion, blue eyes, and brown hair. There are no apparent marks or scars of identification. He apparently is in good health. He states that before becoming involved in the instant offense he was in the process of potitioning for elmittance to a Veterons Hospital in Illinois for a general physical checkup. He denies a history of surgery other than a tensillectomy in Chicago in 1952. He denies a history of veneral disease or the use of nercotics. He states that he is a "mederalle drinker."

IX. EMPLOMENT AND MILITARY HISTORY:

Defendant states that at Alten, Illinois on February 19, 1966 he emlisted in the U.S. Army. He received his basic training at Comp Crember, Miscouri. He was then transferred to Comp Ailmer, Now Jersey to await transportation to the European Theater of Operations. He states that he left the continental limits of the United States for Germany in July of 1966. Gverseas he was attached to the 382nd Military Police Batchlion. He educts that he was once ANOL for a period of two days which resulted in a suspended sentence to confinement for period of cirty days. He returned to the United States from Comment in Describer of 1968 and was, he states, on Becomber 23, 1968 given a general discharge under honorable conditions.

Defendent states that his last employment was with an uncle when he refuses to identify but who resides in Quincy, Illinois. He worked for this uncle as a painter for a period of time in the summer of 1954.

He claims that from August 1951 to May 1952 he was employed by the Borg Erickson Corporation, Chicago, Illinois. This employment was terminated then he was arrested for robbery, which eventually resulted in a positiontiary sentence.

He states that from July of 1950 to June 1951 he was employed by the Arbey Corporation, Chicago, Illinois. He was discharged from this employment for absenteeism caused by his arrest in Alton, Illinois for vagrancy when visiting in that city.

He claims that from April 1950 to July of 1950 he was employed as a laborer of a wage of 90% per hour by the Neo Produce Company, Chicago, Illinois. Es claim to have left this employment to accept more lucrative employment.

From July 1969 to Septembor 1969 defendant states he was employed as a laborer at a wage of \$1.10 per hour by the Dryden Rubber Company, Chicago, Illinois. He quit this job to move to California.

He purports that from May 19th to December of 19th he was employed at a wage of 65¢ per hour by the International Shee Company, Hartford, Illinois. He indicates he was laid off by this employer in a general reduction of ferces and that he then entered the army.

approximately one year before becoming involved in the instant effense defendant was released from service of a sentence of one to two years for arach rebery in the Illinois State Penitentiary. In August of 1954, he burglerised a cleaning establishment in East Altea, Illinois. Although he edulitedly was charged with burglery he apparently has never been before the appropriate court and apparently is not presently wanted on this charge. In 1969 in Les Angeles, California he was co-victed of burgler, and sen moved to light measure in the courty jail. After serving ninear days of this as tence he was released on probabion for a period of two years.

Defendant shows absolutely no remains at this time. He ambicipates receiving a substantial centence for the inquant offence. In uniter's epinion he is a confirmed criminal and a menace to society then in the free world.

PRESENT OFFENSE:

Official Version: On April 1, 1955, Ray entered a plea of guilty to an information in one count charging him with forging the endorsement off a U.S. Post Office money order and he was sentenced to serve one and a half yerrs. On July 1, 1955 another information was filed against him in three counts, charging offenses at Hot Springs National Park, Arkansas. He was also charged in an information with an offense connected with a money order at Tallahassee, Florida. He received a total of three and three-fourths years for these various offenses.

The facts which were broughtout in this case indicated that on March 7, 1955 the U.S. Post Office at Kellerville, Illinois was burglarized and sixty-six blank U.S. Postal Money Orders and the office validating stamp were stolen. The following day at Alton, Illinois an unsuccessful attempt was made to cash one of these stolen money orders. Several other money orders were cashed at various places, and it was finally learned that Ray and his co-defendant, Walter Terry Rife, our 72497-L, were the persons who were attempting to cash these money orders. At the time of their apprehension thirty four of the money orders which had been stolen from the post office were found hidden under the dash above the glove compartment in the automobile, all of which had been dated and stamped with the validating stamp and some which had been made out ready for cashing while others had not.

Through questioning and admissions on the part of Ray and Rife, all of the sixty six money orders were accounted for with the exception of two, and Ray has admitted cashing one of them at a luggage store in Knasas City, Kansas and Rife admits cashing one of them at Miami Beach, Florida. Thus the entire group of sixty six money orders has actually been accounted for. Following their apprehension the Postal Inspectors obtained from the room occupied by Ray and Rife a quantity of merchandise they had acquired by passing the money orders and this merchandise was eventually returned to the persons from whom it tad secured by this fraud.

Inmate's Version: Other than to admit that he had gone on a spree of cashing these money orders, Ray had no further information to give and no statement to make.

Previous Institutional Adjustment; Ray was committed to the Illinois State Pennitentiary on July 13, 1952 to serve one to two years for robbery. On May 6, 1952 he had held up a Red Top cab driver at gun point and took from him \$11.00 belonging to the cab company, and then ordered the cab driver out of the cab and drove off in the cab. He was apprehended shortly thereafter by police who shot him during the capture and he admitted his guilt. He claims that he was heavily intoxicated at the time and had used a pipe in place of a gun, placing it at the back of the driver's body. He had a good adjustment at the Pontiac Division of Illinois State Prison, was assigned to their honor farm where he worked as a considered an average worker and had no punishment reports. He was discharged by expiration of sentence March 12, 1954.

FAMILY BACKGROUND:

Ray says that both of his parents were bown in the state of Illinois and that the

are both now deceased. He says his father died of a heart attack in 1947 and his mother died in 1949 of causes not given. He claims that he is an only child.

PERSONAL HISTORY:

the only child of parents and resided in the parental home in Alton until about 18 years of age. Ray claims that he completed thight grades at St. Mary's School in Alten, Illinois and that while residing in Chicago in 1952 he attended the Academy of Achilts and obtained the equivalent of a two year high-school education.

Ray has not had much of an employment history. The last employment he had was with an uncle in Quincy, Illinois and he refused to reveal the name of the uncle to the U.S. Probation Officer. However, he gave us the name of William Mahor, 1118 E. 7th St., Alton, Illinois. He also gave us the name of an aunt, Lucilla Ryan, 801 N. 12th St., Quincy, Illinois. Neither of these parties has answered our inquiry. He claims that from August, 1951 to May of 1952 he was employed by the Borg Erickson Corp., in Chicago, Illinois and that employment was terminated when he was sent to the penitentiary for robbery. Other employment prior to this is listed under the employment section of page one of the classification study.

Ray has never been married.

EVALUATION, RESOURCES & PLANS:

Ray has no property and says he has no particular plans for the future at this time. He would like to work on a farm, pointing out that he was a trusty at the Illinois State Penitentiary. He admits drinking to excess at times. Just what motivates him to mommit crime is not known.

ADMISSION UNIT REPORT:

This man has a good attitude towards his sentence. He has no resentments and states that he feels as though the Court gave him a break. His adjustment in the population should be good. States that he had no difficulties while on a previous sentence in Illinois. This man seemed to be a rather nervous person while being interviewed but was cooperative with the program while in this unit. He states that he would like to work in the Kitchen as a helper. He stated that he worked on the farm while serving time at Pontiac, Ill. He keeps himself clean

JAMES EARL PAY, Ismate, Missouri State Penitentiary, (MSP), Jefferson City, Missouri, missed at the Penitentiary on April 23, 1987. Subject known at MSP as a "hide out guy" due to his habit of concealing himself within the walls. Investigation indicated RAY concealed himself in bread box and escaped from truck making delivery to an auxiliary farm. He was dropped as an escaped prisoner on 7/10/67. RAY was serving 20 years on charges of Armed Robbery (1st) and for operating vehicle without owner's consent. Authorized complaint filed before U.S. Commissioner, Jefferson City, Missouri on 7/20/67, charging RAY with violation Title 18, Section 1073, U. S. Code. Warrant issued. Subject's criminal record dates back to 1949. He has been confined in Illinois institutions as well as serving time in Federal Penitentiary. His mother and brothers reside in St. Louis, Missouri. MAY confined at State Hospital, Fulton, Missouri in 1966. BECAUSE RAY HAS BEEN CONVICTED OF ECSBERY WITH A DEADLY WEAPON AND BECAUSE OF HIS CONFINEMENT IN A STATE ECSPITAL, HE SHOULD BE CONSIDERED AREED AND DANGEROUS.

This case is predicated on a letter, dated June 19, 1967, from Assistant United States Attorney VILLIAM A. KITCHEN, Kansas City, Missouri, enclosing a letter, dated June 8, 1967 from N. F. LAUF, Identification and Records, Missouri State Penitentiary. Mr. LAUF's letter set forth the following information:

"The indicated subject was missing, from inside the walls of the main Penitentiary on April 23, 1957 and since that date information has been discovered giving us reasons to believe that he has escaped. We also have reasons to believe Ray has fled the state, to avoid presscution, as all efforts to locate him have failed.

"This inmate is described as a white male, age 39, DCB height 5'll", dark brown hair, blue eyes, weight 163, medium complexion and medium build. He was received here March 17, 1930, from the St. Louis City Circuit Court, to serve 20 years for Robbery First Degree by means of a Dangerous & Deadly Weapon (2 chgs.); Operating a Motor Vehicle without permission of the Owner (20, 7, 5 Concurrent).

"We should appreciate it if your office would cause a Federal warrant to be issued against this individual. If he is apprehended, outside of the state of Missouri, the Department of Corrections will extradite him and pay the expenses thereof."

On June 19, 1967, Mr. WILLIAM A. KITCHEN requested an Unlawful Flight to Avoid Confinement complaint be filed against JAMES DARL RAY.

On June 23, 1967, Mr. H. F. LAUF, mentioned above, advised SA THOMAS H. WEAVER that subject is known as a "hide out guy" who stays hidden within the confines of the Missouri State Penitentiary for several days and has done so in the past. He said there is considerable speculation as to whether RAY had actually been able to leave the prison. He said investigation, to date, has failed to develop any information as to RAY's whereabouts.

The following investigation was conducted by IC WILLIAM C. MC DONALD:

AT JEFFERSON CITY, MISSOURI:

On July 11, 1967, Missouri State Penitentiary, MSP, file number 00416, was reviewed. The following information was obtained:

JAMES EARL RAY, MSP #W-00416, was received at the MSP, March 17, 1960, from St. Louis City, to serve a term of twenty (20) years for the crime of Robbery First, by means of a Dangerous and Deadly Weapon and operating a Motor Vehicle without permission of the owner. He was assigned to the Eakery Unit of the Food Service Department. RAY was dropped from the MSP count on July 10, 1987, "As it is assumed that he escaped".

RAY was discovered absent prior to the 5:00 PM count on April 23, 1967, after a thorough search, at which time RAY could not be found.

On July 10, 1967, Mr. BERARD C. POIREY, Custodial Assistant Warden, Missouri State Penitentiary, advised that he had conducted an investigation into the escape of RAY. He said he had determined that an associate of RAY's who worked with RAY in the bakery, had let RAY get into one of the large boxes consigned to the church farm, near Jefferson City, Missouri, and then had covered him up. He said one of the bread boxes had been received at the church farm in an exploded condition, and bread scattered over the truck. He said, therefore, it has been assumed by the prison officials that RAY actually escaped from the Penitentiary and is not inside the walls as previously thought possible. He said RAY was being dropped as an escaped inmate, as of July 10, 1967.

On July 19, 1967, Warden HAROLD SWENSON, Missouri State Penitentiary, said he has contacted several inmates of the Penitentiary who knew RAY, and they indicated to him that RAY had indicated he wanted to escape from the Penitentiary and leave the State of Missouri.

On July 20, 1967, a complaint, as authorized, was filed before United States Commissioner W. C. SHELEY at Jefferson City, Missouri, charging RAY with Unlawful Flight To Avoid Confinement in connection with the commission of a crime of Robbery First, in violation of Title 18, Section 1073, United States Code. Bond returnable was set by the United States Attorney at \$5,000.00 to the United States Commissioner at Jefferson City, Missouri.

Mr. SHELEY issued a warrant on the above complaint on July 20, 1967, which has been transmitted to the Office of the United States Marshal at Kansas City, Missouri.

On August 18, 1967, Mr. H. F. LAUF, Records Officer, Missouri State Penitentiary, advised no further information has been developed regarding the whereabouts of subject.

On July 14, 1955, Mr. WILLIAM L. RUDDELL, Post Office Inspector, Kansas City, Missouri, advised the Kansas City Division that JAMES EARL RAY and WALTER PERRY RIFE were arrested in Hannibal, Missouri, on March 22, 1955, and

were charged with forgery of U. S. Postal Money Orders. He advised that their investigation reflected that the burglary in which the money orders were stolen, was perpetrated at Kellerville, Illinois, at approximately 1:30 AM on March 7, 1955, and that sixty-six blank Post Office money orders and a validating stamp were stolen. He advised that some of these money orders were cashed at St. Louis; Miami, Florida; Tallahassee, Florida; St. Petersburg, Florida; New Orleans, Louisiana; Memphis, Tennessee; Hot Springs, Arkansas, and Kansas City, Missouri, and that thirty-four orders were recovered.

He stated that subjects had advised him that RAY owned a 1945 or 1947 Nash automobile, license number unknown; that it had been traded for a 1949 Lincoln at the Amacker Notors, 135 NE 36th Street, Miani, Florida, on May 14, 1955; and had been titled to WALTER P. BERRY, an alias of RIFE. He said that RIFE and RAY claimed to have obtained the money orders from an unknown man in Quincy, Illinois.

The following investigation was conducted by IC WILLIAM C. MC DONALD:

At Fulton, Missouri:

On August 31, 1967, ROBERT ROSSON, Ragistrar, State Hospital No. 1, advised that JAMES EARL EAY was received on September 8, 1966, and discharged on October 21, 1996. Mr. EOSSON stated that RAY had been sent for examination due to his attempted escape from the Missouri State Penitentiary; however, it was determined that RAY was actually hiding out inside the walls and no escape charge was filed.

Mr. ROSSON stated that after examining RAY it was determined that he had no mental disease or defect and recommended his return to the Missouri State Penitentiary, Jefferson City, Missouri.

Mr. ROSSON advised that according to his records there is no information to reflect that RAY is dangerous.

Hr. ROSSON stated that the only relative listed in this file is JERPY TAY, Brother, Box 22, Wheeling, Illinois.

The following investigation was conducted by SA ROWEN B. AYERS:

At Leavenworth, Kansas:

CARL F. ZARTER, Administrative Assistant, U. S. Penitentiary (USP), Leavenworth, Kansas, on September 12, 1967, advised that USP file number 72498-L, pertaining to JAMES EARL RAY is now stored at the Federal Records Center, GSA, 2306 East Bannister Road, Kansas City, Missouri, Attention - Chief, Reference Service Branch, GSA - Accession Number 65 A 10, in Boxes 85327 - 87468.

The following investigation was conducted by Investigative Clerk JAMES W. WRIGHT:

AT KANSAS CITY, MISSOURI:

On October 2, 1967, Mr. JAMES H. YATES, Archives Assistant, Federal Records Center - General Services Administrati 2306 East Bannister Road, made available U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, file number 72493-L pertaining to JAMES EARL RAY, from which the following information was obtained:

RAY was sentenced on July 1, 1955, in U. S. District Court, Kansas City, Missouri, to a term of three years and nine months on a charge of Forgery of U. S. Post Office Money Orders. He was committed to U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, on July 7, 1955, and was given a Conditional Release from that institution on April 5, 1958, the period of supervision terminating October 2, 1958.

At time of admission to U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, RAY listed the following relatives:

GEORGE RAY, Father, (Deceased); MARY RAY, Mother, (Deceased); LUCILLE RYAN, Aunt, 108 N. 12th St., Quincy, Illinois.

RAY requested numerous changes of address for his aunt, Mrs. LUCILLE RYAN, while she resided in Quincy, Illinois. She resided at Lancaster, Missouri, for a brief period, and the last known address for Mrs. RYAN was 1135 South 10th Street, St. Louis, Missouri.

On December 20, 1955, RAY requested permission to correspond with a cousin, JERRY RYAN, 3393 South 7th Street, Quincy, Illinois, however, the request was denied. He also requested permission to correspond with an uncle, WILLIAM MAHER, 1118 East 7th Street, Alton, Illinois.

Records reflect RAY served in U. S. Army, Serial from February of 1946, to December 23, 1948, at which time he was given a discharge under honorable conditions by reason of ineptness and lack of adaptability

for military duty. He was on foreign service from July 18, 1946, to December 21, 1948.

Records further reflect that RAY has no trades or skill and during his period of confinement at U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, he was not interested in vocational training or self-improvement programs. He claims to have completed ten grades of public school at the age of 16 in Alton, Illinois. RAY claims he is an only child and that his father died in 1947 and his mother died in 1949.

The following investigation was conducted by SA CLETIS B. BIDEVELL at St. Louis, Missouri:

A check of the records of the St. Louis Police Department on September 5, 1967, roflected the details surrounding the arrest of subject, RAY, in connection with the armed robbery of the Eroger Store, 3417 Chio Street in St. Louis, on October 10, 1959, and also reflected that on April 23, 1967, a teletype was received from the warden at Missouri State Penitentiary at Jefferson City, Missouri, in connection with the recent escape of subject, RAY, from that institution. Detectives FRANCIS AUER and CHARLES BILLINGS, assigned to the 3rd District, St. Louis Police Department, conducted investigation on the same date, in an effort to locate subject. A check by these officers at 1918 Park Avenue, 2015 Park Avenue, and 1913 Mickery Street, previous addresses listed for subject, his mother and other relatives developed no information whatever of subject or other members of his family.

On October 3, 1967, RELEM CREAMER, residing at 1915
Hickory Street, advised she had resided at that address for the
last coule of years and had never seen subject or any of his
relatives. Investigation in the neighborhood of 1913 Hickory
Street, revealed this to be a blighted area and the majority of
the residences have been evacuated preparatory to being desolished.
Members of inmilias still residing in the area were interviewed
and all denied ever having known a RAY family residing in the
area since they have resided there.

At the time of the contact with officers AUER and BILLINGS at the Srd District, Detective ROBERT FREIMAUT and several other members of the 3rd District Detective Duross, who are personally acquainted with subject, RAY, were advised of his fugitive status and all premised to be about for any available information concerning the whereabouts of subject or nembers of his family.

A review on September 13, 1967, by IC EARL M. RANEY of the military service records on file at the Military Personnel Becords Center. St. Louis, Missouri, for JAMES EARL RAY, Serial Number indicated he enlisted in the United States Army on February 19, 1946, at East St. Louis, Illinois,

and served on active duty until December 23, 1948, at which time he was given a General Discharge as a Private First Class at Camp Kilmer, New Jorsey, by reason of imaptness and lack of adaptability for military service.

Becords indicated he was tried and convicted by a Special Court-Hartial for being drunk in quarters and breaking arrest. He was contenced to be confined at hard labor for three months and forfeit \$45.00 per month for four nonths.

Records also indicated be received treatment for gonorrhea and syphilis while he was a number of the military.

He advised that records pertaining to JAMES EARL RAY, Pontiac #19121, FBI #395-443A, have been reduced to micro film. He advised that all that is kept on micro film is certain catagories.

The micro film records pertaining to subject were reviewed by SA ARTHUR LRE WOODS, on October 23, 1967. Records reveal that RAY was recoived at the Illinois State

Penitentiary, Joliet, Illinois, on June 13, 1952, on the charge of robbery to serve a one to two year sentence on a plea of guilty from Cook County, Illinois. RAY was released upon expiration of a short term sentence on March 12, 1954.

Subject listed relatives as follows:

Father, GEORGE RAY, deceased.

Mother, Mrs. LUCILLE RYAN, 214 Spring Street, Quincy, Illinois.

Brothers, JOHN and JERRY, both at home with mother.

Correspondence file was checked and determined the only person who corresponded with subject while he was incarcerated at the Pontiac Prison was his mother, Mrs. LUCILLE RYAN.

Subject, while incarcerated, had no visitors. Records fail to reveal any associates or former addresses for subject.

By communication dated November 24, 1967, the Springfield Office advised as follows:

The following investigation was conducted by SA ROBERT C. HAINES:

AT ALTON, ILLINOIS:

Records of the Alton Police Department and the Credit Bureau of Alton were reviewed on November 15, 1967, and found to contain no reference for the subject or his father, GEORGE RAY.

It is noted that at the time of his admission to the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, RAY indicated his father and mother were both deceased.

Investigation at 1118 East 7th Street to locate and interview WILLIAM MAHER disclosed that the house is now vacant.

A review of the records of the Alton Police Department and the Credit Bureau of Alton in connection with WILLIAM MAHER was unproductive in developing information concerning his current whereabouts.

Records of the Illinois Bell Telephone Company and a review of the City Directory of Alton, Illinois, and of Wood River - East Alton were unproductive with regard to MAHER.

A review of the report of SA ROWEN B. AYERS, dated 8/29/67, at Kansas City, reveals that on 7/10/67, Mr. BERARD C. POIREY, Custodial Assistant Warden, Missouri State Penitentiary Jefferson City, Missouri, advised he had conducted an investigation into the escape of the subject and had determined that an associate of the subject's, who worked with him in the prison bakery, had let the subject get into one of the large boxes consigned to the church firm near Jefferson City, Missouri and then had covered him up, thereby helping him to effect his escape. On 7/19/67, Warden HAROLD SWENSON, Missouri State Penitentiary, said he had contacted several inmates who knew the subject and they indicated to him that the subject had indicated he wanted to escape from the penitentiary and leave the state of Missouri.

A review of a pre-sentence report on the subject prepared by the U.S. Probation Office, Kansas City, Missouri, on 4/26/55, reveals that the subject on 4/1/55 had entered a plea of guilty due to information charging him with forging U.S. Post Office money orders. His companion in forging a large number of these money orders in numerous states was WALTER PERRY RIFE, who also entered a plea of guilty to a similar account and records of the Post Office Inspector's Office, Kansas City, Missouri, indicate both Subject RAY and WALTER PERRY RIFE were sentenced to the Federal Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas on 7/1/55 in Kansas City, Missouri and were apparently released from that institution on 4/5/53. Inasmuch as Subject RAY and WALTER PERRY RIFE, FEI # 4558766 were very close friends for a period of time and it has been difficult to identify other friends and relatives of the subject, it is felt that an effort should be made to locate and interview RIFE.
