The Texas Democrat, who referred to Sprague as an 'unconscionable scoundrel," submitted his resignation in a letter to Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill. The speaker said the resignation woud have to beconsidered by the full House, raising the prospect of a divisive floor fight.

D'Neill said he would not submit the resignation for a House verdict until he talked to Gonzalez.

Sprague made no early comment.

Republican Conference-Chairman John B. Anderson of Illinois said, "the life of the committee still hangs by a slim thread."

Gonzalez said in his letter to the speaker that Sprague "refused to produce any kind of information on which the committee could make rational budget decisions.'

Further, Gonzalez said, "since he pursued a deliberate course of action to undermine me with members of the committee and staff alike, I had no recourse but to dismiss him, which I did.

"I found in the committee an administrative nightmare," Gonzalez wrote. "I found a chief counsel who assumed full powers of the committee itself, (and by implication usurped the powers of the House itself); a chief counsel who was insibordinate and insulting not |c mention disloyal.

"I found unjustifiable salaries, unjustified employes and reckless, inexplicable financial obligations," Gonzalez said. "I had a responsibility to act and no one has yet demonstrated that I acted wrongly or without full cause.'

The situation appeared Congress between then Chairman Lucien N. Nedzi (D-Mich.) and fellow Democrats on a Select House Intelligence Committee.

Nedzi resigned and former Speaker Carl Albert put his resignation before the full House, which voted to refuse to accept it.

But that committee remained deadlocked by the dispute and the House finally replaced it with a new committee with Rep. Otis G. Pike (D-N.Y.) as its chairman.

Gonzalez's resignation followed a showdown with Sprague during which Gonzalez tried to fire him. His fellow committee members supported the former assistant Philadelphia prosecutor.

Gonzalez said he tried to get support from House Speaker Thomas O'Neill (D-Mass.) and Majority Leader Jim Wright (D-Tex.).

"It was an exercise in futility," he said. "The fix was in."

He said he then realized "at last that the House leadership never had intended for the JFK investigation to fly, and indeed had prefabricated the whole thing for the skids."

Without being specific, Gonzalez said "powerful forces, including criminal elements," had deliberately put Sprague and himself into the committee on an automatic collision course.

"They never did want the Kennedy assassination conspiracy unmasked," said Gonzalez. "They knew I was an honest, direct man who wouldn't hold still for it transparent phony like Spra ue. They were so right The UFK investigation is over."

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Probe Chief Holds Little Hard Data

Washington, D.C. —UPI—The House Assassinations Committee, its life ticking away toward a March 31 deadline, has yet to produce "smoking gun" evidence in its five month investigation into the murders of President John F. Kennedy and the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., the chief counsel acknowleged Monday.

Richard Sprague, the controversial investigator for the leaderless panel, said he could not come up with a thorough, believable report by the end of the month when the committee's temporary mandate

expires.

"The chance of coming up with a smoking gun, if that's the only way, then in my opinion, the job cannot be

done," Sprague said.

But he said a good report could be made if the committee received a new mandate, an investigative staff and sufficient budget for the remainder of this two year session of Congress.

Rep. Bruce Catuto (R-N.Y.) called Tuesday for dissolution of the committee and appointment of a new panel and new chairman with a specific timetable and dates for periodic reports to the House.

Catuto said that "whatever good new ethics rules might have done to restore public faith in Congress, the Assassinations Committee has more than undone with its sorry, petty ineptitude."

CP-N. C.), who presided at Monday's two sessions as ranking member of the committee, told reporters that the odds now were minimal that the panel could survive another House vote to extend its life.

Preyer presided in the absence of Rep. Henry Gonzalez (D-Tex.), who resigned as chairman last week in a dispute over his attempt to fire Sprague. Other committee members voted to keep Sprague.

Preyer rebutted charges made by Gonzalez in a San Antonio newspaper interview Sunday that criminal forces, powerful business interests, the Kennedy family and the House leadership were trying to abort the Kennedy investigation.

"No sinister forces are at work," Preyer said. "The committee has enough problems of its own."

Because of the shrinking time frame, the panel Monday whizzed through all but two of some dozen agenda items involving frozen staff salaries, unpaid bills and expenses, restoration of access to FBI and Secret Service materials, security and house-keeping measures.

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JFK-King Panel Hears New Evidence Claim

Washington, D.C.—AP—Chief Counsel Richard Sprague told the House Committee on Assassinations Wednesday that he had uncorroborated evidence "indicating that others may have had knowledge of or participated in the assassination" of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.

Sprague also told the committee in a brief opening statement that his staff had evidence on the assassination of Fresident John F. Kennedy idicating "there was prior knowledge on the part of some individuals of that as-

sassination before it oc- James Earl Ray, acting alone.

But in both investigations,

Sprague told the committee, the staff has been unable to thoroughly check witnesses' stories or determine whether they are corroborated.

The chief counsel gave only the hints of what his evidence was

Sprague's indication of evidence of a conspiracy in the King assassination was in contrast to a Justice Department investigation that concluded that no evidence had been found that King was killed by anyone other than James Earl Ray, acting alone.

The assassination committee, with a new chairman in charge, is moving to provide evidence to Congress that further investigations are warranted into the two assassinations.

Rep. Louis Stokes (D-Ohio) was named chairman Tuesday by Speaker Thomas O'-Neill (D-Mass.) after the House voted to accept the resignation of Henry Gonzalez (D-Tex.).

James Earl Ray contended in an interview broadcast nationally Tuesday night that he had been sent to have a tire fixed when the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. was assassinated and that he was set up to take the blame.

Ray, convicted of killing King, said "investigations by people representing me' were producing evidence that he thought would clear him in a new court proceeding.

Ray made the comments in a TV interview with newsman Dan Rather on the CBS program "Who's Who." It was Ray's first such interniew since the assassination pril 4, 1968, in Memphis.

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Ray Tells TV Newsman Associate Set Him Up

Washington, D.C. - AP -James Earl Ray contended in a nationally broadcast TV interview Tuesday night that he had been sent to have a tire fixed when Martin Lu-, ther King was assassinated, and that he was set up to take the blame.

Ray, convicted of killing King, said "investigations by people representing me" are producing evidence he thinks will clear him in a new court proceeding.

But Ray shed no new light on who killed King if he did not, or why. He said, as he has before, that his only contact with the murder was through a Latin named Raoul. He said he thought Raoul was conducting a gun running operation.

Ray made the comments on the CBS-TV program "Who's Who," in his first television interview since the assassination April 4, 1968, in Memphis. The interview took place at Brushy Mountain State Prison in Petros, Tenn.

Newsman Dan Rather told him many viewers obviously would think he was just making up a story to get himself out of prison and Ray replied he had always thought people would not believe anything he said in a news interview.

Giving new details in his story about Raoul and a conspiracy, Ray said he delivered a rifle to Raoul shortly before the assassination in what he thought was part of the gun running operation. He said Raoul then sent him to have a ire fixed.

not keep a bargain. "Have you seen how his brother is hitting (Teamster President Jimmy) Hoffa, a man who is a worker, who is not a millionaire, a friend of the blue collars?" Aleman quoted Trafficante. "He doesn't know that this kind of encounter is very delicate. Mark my words, this rian Ke nedy is in trouble and he wil get what is coming to

Crile reported that when

Aleman argued Kennedy would be re-elected in 1964, Trafficante replied, "N Jose he is going to be hit."

Crile quoted Aleman as saying he reported the conversation to the FBI but agents took no notice of it until after Kennedy was assassinated on Nov. 22, 1963. Two FBI agents then questioned Aleman at length.

The assassination committee's chief counsel, Richard Sprague, conducted most of the interrogation of Trafficante, asking him about his participation in CIA-sponsored plots in the early 1960s to assassinate Castro, about reports that Trafficante predicted Kennedy's "hit" more than a year in advance and ed the Cuba-Mafia angle two about rumors that Trafficante might have been acquainted with "an American ga gster type named Ru years before the preside t's death.

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Assassination-Panel to Check Bullets

The House assassing tion committee is hoping the two independent ballistics experts can prove for the first time whether the rifle handled by James Earl Ray killed the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.

"If the tests prove that rifie is not the one that was fired we've got a whole new ball game," a committee aide said Thursday after plans were announced for tests on the rifle.

The independent tests, set for next week, also will be conducted on the bullet that killed King, said Walter Fauntroy, District of Columbia delegate, adding that the experts who will make the test have not yet been selected.

It is not possible through the ballistics tests to establish

whether King was assass ated by Ray, who acknowleds is handling the rifle. ay also contends he turned the weapon over to a man named Raoul before the assassina-

Ray confessed guilt in the 1968 killing of the civil rights leader, but has been trying since to win a new trial, claiming he entered the plea on ad legal advice.

disclosed plans for two or its lawyers to interview Ray, under oath if he agrees, next week in the prison where he is serving a 99 year sentence.

Richard Sprague, the committee's chief counsel, and Robert Lehner, deputy chief counsel of the King assassination investigation, will conjuct the interview.

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Man Indicted In Threat to Kill Mrs. King

Baltimore, Md. — AP — A reputed Ku Klux Klan leader linked to an alleged plot to sabotage military facilities and a civil rights group's office has been indicted on a federal charge of threatening to kill the widow of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.

William Marx Aitcheson, of Clarksville, Md., was charged in a one count indictment with mailing a letter containing a threat against the life of Coretta Scott King, the widow of the late civil rights leader.

The letter, mailed about Feb. 20, 1976, and addressed to Mrs. King's Atlanta home, said she would be killed if she did not stay off the University of Maryland's College Park campus, where Aitcheson is a communications major, the indictment said.

No date was set for Aitcheson's arraignment, although an FBI spokesman said Wednesd y there were no implediate plans to take him into cushody on the federal charge.

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Recruitment Effort to Kill King Related

Louisville, Ky. — AP — Mary Baird confirmed Wednesday that her husband told Rep. Gene Snyder (R-Ky.) about an alleged plot to assassinate Martin Luther King Jr.

Mrs. Baird, 44, said her husband, Clifton, 50, a retired Louisville policeman, told Snyder about an alleged plot involving Louisville policemen and FBI agents.

Snyder said last week that a man told him he had been offered \$500,000 on two occasions to kill King. He declined to name the man, however.

Mrs. Baird said her husband retired from the Louisville Police Department several years ago after 27 years on the force. "He told me about this when I first married him, seven years ago," she said in an interview. "I think he thought he wasn't going to be believed."

Mrs. Baird said she believed one reason her husband came forward with the allegation was because "te wants to know why somed te as ed him" to kill King, wio was assassinated in Memph, Te in., in 1968.

"It sure has been on his lind," Mrs. Baird said. "He sid it just got to bothering him and that's why he contacted Mr. Snyder."

Her husband, before contacting Snyder, told one of James Earl Ray's attorneys about the alleged plot, she said. Mrs. Baird said her husband was "discouraged" after talking with the attorney. Ray is serving 99 years in prison for slaying King.

The \$500,000 offer allegedly was made two or three years before King was killed, according to an "informed source" quoted by the Kentucky Post, which identified Baird as the man who wrote to Snyder.

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Probers Claim Unity, New Assassination Data

Washington, D. C. -UPI The House Assassination Committee Tuesday prepared its case for survival, proclaiming new found unity among its members and fresh but uncorroborated information on the killings of John F. Kennedy and Martin Luther King Jr.

The House Rules Committee approved a resolution 9 to 4 Monday to continue the panel for the rest of this Congress beyond its scheduled March 31 termination date. The House is expected to take it up Wednesday.

Earlier, the committee issued its first report of the year, claiming new leads in he King killing and indidi-tions that the Warren Coumission was wrong in at least

he Kennedy murder.

The committee got in p million over two years since cut to \$5.6 million and was further jeopardized when Rep. Henry Gonzalez (D-Tex.) resigned as its chairman after failing to get support in his effort to fire chief counsel Richard Sprague.

Gonzalez renewed his complaints in a speech Monday, charging that he was treated shabbily and repeating his demands that Sprague be fired.

The panel's report noted that the Warren Commission concluded that Lee Harvey Oswald, Kennedy's killer, and Jack Ruby, who in turn killed Oswald, did not know ach other.

But the committee said it had found a witness nev before questioned wh claimed to have been introduced to Oswald by Ruby before the Kennedy assassination.

The committee also claimed several new leads indicating that Oswald was associated with CIA supported anti-Castro groups as well as having connections with the CIA and FBL

"The most important development" in the King killing, said the report, is James Earl Ray's willingness to talk to the panel, which he did in interviews in the penitentiary in Tennessee last week and again Monday. Ray is serving a 99 year sentence for the killing.

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Assassination Panel Claims New Evidence

Washington, D.C. — UPI
— The House Assassination
Committee, seeking to persuade Congress to keep it in
business past Thursday, said
it has new but "uncorroborated" evidence on the killings
of John F. Kennedy and Martin Luther King.

The panel's first formal report of the year was issued while the Rules Committee considered its bid for continuation, and on the House floor former Chairman Henry Gonzalez (D-Tex.) was repeating his bitter criticism of the chief committee counsel, Richard Sprague.

Gonzalez in an hourlong speech repeated allegations Sprague exceeded his authority and the House leadership abandoned him when he sought unsuccessfully to fire Sprague. Gonzalez then resigned as chairman.

The panel had been given only temporary life to March because of opposition to be budget request for \$1 billion over two years and louse weariness of the Golzales-Sprague squabble.

Its report offered no new indications of its discoveries ince its inception last September.

It said, "The most important development in the King investigation is the willingness of James Earl Ray... to talk to the committee."

Sprague and other committee investigators last week interviewed Ray at the Brushy Mountain State Penitentiary in Tennessee, where he is serving 99 years for killing King.

The panel also said it had information of a "conspiracy" to kill King, reportedly from a now deceased informant for what the report described only as "a Southern police department."

The panel noted the Warren Commission, which decided Lee Harvey Oswald acted alone in killing Kennedy, concluded Oswald never knew his own killer, Jack Ruby.

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JFK-King Prober Resigns

Washington, D.C. —AP—Richard Sprague, embattled chief counsel to the House Assassination Committee, resigned Wednesday after being told the House would kill the investigation if he remained on the job.

The committee accepted the resignation at an emergency meeting Wednesday. Some members insisted, however, that he had not been asked to quit.

The House scheduled a vote for later Wednesday on whether to continue the investigation of the murders of President John F. Kennedy and the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. If the vote is negative, the committee expires at midnight.

Sprague submitted a two sentence resignation, effective immediately, after a 3½ hour meeting Tuesday night with committee Chairman Louis Stokes (D-Ohio) and several other members of the panel, sources said.

"Shown Figures"

"He was convinced by some members that a head count indicated strongly that the resolution to reconstitute the committee would fail on the floor of the House if he remained," a source said. "Hyas shown figures. He fel here was nothing left form to do but resign."

Sprague was reported to be out of town and not available for comment.

His letter said he resigned dead Tuesday in Palm Beach, "with the hope that the Congress can now proceed with the challenge of seeing that these investigations are pursuell promptly."

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A former friend of Lee Harvey Oswald apparently killed himself within hours after an investigator for the House Assassinations Committee attempted to injerview him, authorities ruled Wednesday in Palm Beach, Fla.

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out of the woodwork" to change the theory that the death on Tuesday was a suicide. noigush.

"We have the gunshot on tape," Sheets said, adding that there were no sounds of anyone else in the background. He said that by comparing the tape with television station logs, investigators determined that de Mohrenschildt shot himself at 15 seconds past 2:21 p.m. Tuesday. De Mohrenschildt, a geologist who taught French at Bishop College in Dallas, had known both Oswald and his wife Marina."

The House Assassinations Committee was eager to question de Mohrenschildt about a report that he knew in advance what Oswald planned to do.

But de Mohrenschildt's extensive testimony gave no l'int of what Dutch journalist William Oltmans recently galled a "shocking confession" that he knew of Os wald's plans and felt "responsible for Oswald's behav ior."

Knew Oswald Well

However, de Mohrenschildt's testimony indicated that he knew Oswald's character well and might have guessed other plans.

While de Mohrenschildt and his wife Jeanne were visiting the Cswalds, Mrs. de Mohrenschildt opened a closet door and exclaimed, "Look, George, they have a gun here. What is that? That looks like a telescopic sight." . .

Marina Oswald said, "That crazy idiot is target practicing all the time."

De Mohrenschildt, talking in the apartment doorway ith Oswald said in a joking tone, "Are you then the gay who took a potshot at Gen. Walker?"

De Mohrenschildt testified Oswald's reaction was a giveaway.

"He sort of shriveled, you see, when I asked this question," de Mohrenschildt testified. "He made a pecu-liar face."

The Warren Commission concluded that Oswald was the man who shot at Walker, narrowly missing his head.

Oswald Confided Little

These and many other references indicated de Mohrenschildt, a close observer of human nature, was able to guess much about Oswald although Oswald confided very little.

De Mohrenschildt expressed remorse for having innocently helped Oswald with financial and other problems. His testimony indicated he might also have felt guilt if he had guessed the plan to kill Kennedy and did - A P nothing to stop it.

"It was just a misfortune that we helped them, Mohrenschildt testified. "We shouldn't have done it. We should have known better."

Albert Jenner Jr., assistant commission counsel. sought through hours of questioning to find a motive beyond charity in de Mohrenschildt's friendship with Oswald in Fort Worth, Tex., and later in Dallas. He found none.

In reference to Oswald's attractive wife, Jeiner asked de Mohrenschildt if he ever courted pretty wom-September 1

"I still do. I hope I do until the day I die," he said. But in his description of the Oswalds' poverty, "horrible surroundings and dull life," he made it clear he and his wife were acting out of kindness.

Panel's Life Extended

The final vote on continuing the existence of the committee for two more years, which has been in hot water since the first day of the current legislative session, was 230 to 181. Without the approval, the committee would have died at midnight Thursday.

Committee Chairman Louis Stokes (D-Ohio) said after the vote he believed the approval came only because the committee's controversial chief counsel, Richard A. Sprague, resigned earlier in the day in an effort to savethe investigation.

Stokes said an informal survey Tuesday indicated the committee would lose its battle to stay alive by 20 votes if Sprague had remained.

The final vote came after opponents of the committee tried to get the House to hold a rare secret session to hear evidence the committee has uncovered.

The maneuver failed, 226 to 185, after Stokes said the committee feared information such as the names of witnesses the committee had talked to or wants to lalk to would leak out and put their lives in danger

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Marchers Mark King Slaying

Memphis, Tenn. — UPI — Crowds marched beneath the motel balcony where the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. was assassinated nine years ago Monday in a demonstration aimed at keeping alive the dream of the slain civil rights leader.

But a march leader said the movement King led during the 1960s appears to have waned. March officials had hoped as many as 5,000 marchers would take part, but rainy weather apparently kept many away. When the crowd was asked to sing "We Shall Overcome," many did not know the words and had to hum along.

An estimated 800 persons, most of them black, took part in the march to the Lorraine Motel to eulogize the Nobel Peace Prize winner.

King was killed on April 4, 1968, as he stood on the balcony of the Lorraine. He was the victim of a bullet police said was fired from a high powered rifle from a flop-house across the street.

King's convicted killer, James Earl Ray, is serving a 99 year prison sentence for the assassination but has then talking with investigal ters of the House Assassinations Committee in hopes of winning a new trial.

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Stirring Dust, Spreading Distrust

The House has voted to continue the Select Conmittee on Assassinations largely because, as Rep. Richard Bolling (D-Mo.) said, the committee his stirred up so much dust over the assassinations of John F. Kennedy and Martin Luther King that to discontinue it would be seen as a coverup.

Yet, The Washington Post suggests that the committee's 14 page report on its activities to date should be called "Twice Told Tales." That's about right. Nothing new in the report has been corroborated. And much that is in it has been disclosed before and discarded.

The committee has had a hectic life. Its first chairman, Rep. Henry Gonzalez (D-Tex.), quit in a fight with the chief counsel, Richard Sprague. Recently, Sprague himself quit and several top aides have left. As far as is known, the 67 member staff hasn't come forward with a single verifiable instance that casts new light on the assassinations.

George McMillan, author of "The Making of an Assassin," says of the committee: "I really don't think they should take things that have been cleared up and talk about them so provocatively when they should know better." Rep. John Dingell (D-Mich.) told the House that the committee report contains "not a smidgin of evidence." Even Sprague, before he quit, told committee members that information collected so far is much "too raw and uncorroborated for us to be stating publicly."

But the committee report has gone public. It states that George de Mohrenschildt, friend of Lee Harvey Oswald, the man charged with assassinating Kennedy, is "an important witness." But the committee never talked with de Mohrenschild, who came out of a psychiatric ward recently and allegedly said he knew of a plot against Kennedy and who was in it. The other day, de Mohrenschildt killed himself. What does that prove?

The report also focuses on Orest Pena, a New Officens bar operator. He has changed the testimony he gave to the Warren Commission, which investigates the Kennedy slaying. Pena now says that he saw

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Oswald meet several times with an FBI agent. But the agent denies it. And Pena told his story some time ago on a CBS-TV program called "The American Assassins," so it isn't new.

These are just two samples of the kind of stuff that the committee is issuing, giving status to rumors and myths, spreading suspicion and crazy conclusions.

The assassinations have been much in the public eye lately. Some legitimate questions can be raised. There is need for careful investigation to see where the truth lies and to clear up mysteries and doubt. But, unfortunately, the committee so far has not given anyone reason to trust either its judgment or its truthfulness.

Prosecutor Urged As JFK, King Prober

Washington, D.C. - AP -Richard A. Sprague, who resigned under pressure as chief counsel for the House Assassinations Committee, said Monday that President Carter should appoint a special prosecutor to investigate the killings of John F. Kennedy and the Rev. Martin Luther King.

Sprague said he does not believe the House committee can get the facts in either assassination because it "is a political animal."

"They (committee members) play to what they believe to be the public will," he told a news conference. "They play to what they believe will be good press and good headlines."

Sprague resigned as staff director and chief counsel of the committee two weeks ago when it appeared the House would kill the investigation if he remained on the job. After his departure, the House voted, 230 to 181, to continue the probe.

Sprague had become an issue because many members of Congress resented what they saw as a victory for him when Rep. Henry B. Gonzalez (D-Tex.) resigned as chairman of the committee in h feud with Sprague.

Ray Says Car Was Being Fixed

Washington, D.C. — UPI - James Earl Ray said Monday he was in a gas station having his car serviced when the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. was killed.

Ray, who pleaded guilty to the 1968 assassination of the civil rights leader, said in a filmed interview broadcast Monday on ABC's "Good Morning America" that a man named Raoul might be responsible for the murder.

Ray was interviewed in his ntison cell at Brushy Mountin Park Prison in Tennessee Mark Lane, the author Tho claims the assassinations

of both King and President Kennedy were the result of conspiracies and not the single deeds of Ray and Lee Harvey Oswald.

Lane appeared on the ABC program and showed parts of his interview with Ray, who is seeking a new trial.

He said Ray may have pleaded guilty as a result of "inhuman, torturous conditions" he was subjected to in prison and that a clue as to the identity of Raoul might be contained in a recent statement by Ray in which he described a calling card

"which may have had the name of a contact for Raoul."

"This card and the story that Ray told me is now being investigated by the House Select Committee on Assassinations," Lane said. The committee itself has interviewed Ray four times so

As for his precise movements on April 4, 1968, when King was shot, Ray said:

"At that time, I intended to go to a movie ... I recalled that I had car trouble the day, before. I doubled back to service the car. I believ that's close away from the

erminal and where the shooting took place."

After he left the gas station, he said, "I ran into a (police) roadblock in the immediate vicinity of where the shooting was supposed to have taken place. There have been police statements that they waved me off. Anyhow I went to New Orleans.'

The FBI, which investigated the King murder and a Justice Department review earlier this year, concluded that all the evidence showed Ray killed King with a rifl he is known to have bough several days before.

FK-King Panel Finds New Information

Washington, D.C. - The House Assassinations Committee, which has been in operation for eight months, has come up with virtually no new information or evidence on the deaths of President John F. Kennedy or the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.

And the committee has found that much of the socalled new information on which Congress based its decision to reopen the investigations is in error, according to a well placed committees of rce.

We certainly have cone

up with nothing earthshaking," the source said, "and much that witnesses tell us is in conflict with what they supposedly told people who have written books about the assassinations, and who have provided the basic leads for the committee to pursue."

An examination by The New York Times has determined that it was author and lecturer Mark Lane who provided most of the new leads, on the basis of his published worls.

Primary Force

According to several officials familiar with the committee's investigation - and Lane himself - Lane was the primary force behind the formation of the committee and the architect of the direction that the investigation should take.

Lane, a former New York State legislator better known for his book "Rush to Judgment," which criticized the official investigations of the Kennedy assassination, had been unsuccessful for wo years in trying to get ongress to reopen an invest ga-tion it to the death of Kennedy in Dallas.

Rut early last year he began looking into King's death and persuaded the civil rights leaver's widow, Core ta King, to solicit support from Gonzales (D-Tex.). Arthur the Congressional Black Caucus for a reinvestigation of both assassinations.

Timing of Book

Shortly after an investigating committee was formed, Lane and comedian Dick Gregory began work on a book about King and the assassination in Memphis. Lane refused to say how much they received from the publisher as an advance, but it was reported to have been \$100,000.

The book, "Code Name Zorro," was recently published — at about the time that the committee was seeking favorable public and congressional reaction to its request for funds.

om the committee's ginling, staff members iknowledge, Lane's books, thipries and private investigalons have provided the "vorking hypotheses" or the investigation.

Just as the committee almost collapsed in controversy earlier this year, much of the new evidence appears to be falling apart now.

The lack of credible new eldence has been used to explain why the committee has not been able to fin a new chief counsel to replace

Gonzales (D-Tex.). Arthur Goldberg, the former Su-preme Court justice, and Archibald Cox, the former Watergate special prosecutor, have both declined the post.

And Alvin B. Lewis Jr., acting chief counsel, said funday that he was resid-ig. He gave no reason or spepping down.

Seven convicts tried to escape, but one of them was shot off the wall of the grim, fortress-like prison and captured.

The captured convict, bank robber Jerry Ward, wastaken to a hospital at Oak Ridge for treatment. A hospital official said Ward was shouting:

"James Earl Ray got out! Ray got out!"

Ray broke out of Brushy Mountain on his third try, little more than eight years after he pleaded guilty to the April 4, 1968, murder of King in Memphis 227 527

The escape occurred during the evening recreation period about 8 p.m., according to Brooks Parker, a spokesman for Gov. Ray Blanton.

"The prisoners escaped using a homemade ladder made out of lightning conduit (wire). One has been captured and there are still six at large. One of them is James Earl Ray," Parker said.


Other prisoners still at large were identified as David Lee Powell of Shelby County, Tenn., serving 99 years for murder; Earl Hill Jr., serving two life sentences for murder; Donald Ray Taylor, serving 51 years for armed tobbery and other convictions; and Douglas Shelton, serving sentences for murder, felonious assault and grand larceny.

In Atlanta, Ralph Abernathy, a close associate of King, said Friday he believes Ray's escape is a move to set Ray up to "be destroyed."

"I am greatly outraged over this news. I firmly am convinced beyond a shadow of a doubt that James Earl Ray has not escaped but is part of a plan," Abernathy said.

King was felled by a single shot as he stood on the balcony of the Lorraine Motel in Memphis, Tenn., on the evening of April 4, 1968.

Ar intensive manhunt soon focused on Ray, then a fugit ve from the Missouri State Prison. He was arrested at London's Heathrow Airport on June 5.



On March 10, 1969, after shuffling through several attorneys and winding up with noted defense lawyer Percy Foreman, Ray entered a guilty plea and was sentenced to 99 years. There was no testimony.

Almost from the moment he entered prison, Ray began protesting his conviction, saying his attorneys rail-roaded/him. He claimed he was working for a man named "Raoul," who he thought was a gunrunner, and had been set up to take the blame for the killing.

The government claimed he killed King with a rifle aimed through the bathroom window of a flophouse. The rifle was found in a bag by the door of the building.

Ray's efforts for a new trial were rejected by one court after another, although there were many unexplained facets to the case — such as where he got the money to flee to, and around, Europe after the killing.

He told investigators from the House Assassinations. Committee in five meetings at the prison this year that he never fired the shot that killed King.

He claimed "Raoul" had told him to go to a mivie that afternoon. When the shot was fired, Ray clainled, he was getting the spare tire of his car fixed.



Marden Stoney Lane said searchers believe Ray, a ld one of the remaining fugitives were using cautious hide and seek tactics through the densely wooded Cumber land Mountains, while the third man, Douglas Ray Caydor, had broken from the group in full flighted and mass. some allered some magnification found off inch federal agent and two sheriff's deputies recaptured Larry, E. Hacker, 32, believed by state officials to have been the ringleader of the Friday night escape. Hacker servilg two 28-year prison terms for armed robbery,

arrested about I a.m. Milwaukee time at ru al Beech Grove Baptist Church about four miles east of the prison during a routine check of the church.

Another of the fugitives - convicted murderer David Lee Powell, 27, the only black among the escapees surrendered Saturday to a Tennessee Highway Patrol. helicopter crew in an open field near Wartburg.

Still at large with Ray, 49, were convicted murderer Douglas Shelton, 32, and Caylor, 24, convicted of armed robbery and attempted murder.

More than 175 law enforcement officials expanded

their search area to snake infested mountainous terrain ca all sides of the prison. That covers about 2,000 square miles, including the Tennessee communities of Wartburg, Oliver Springs and Coalfield

The searchers, using bloodhounds and helicopters, fanned out over rugged terrain within a 25 mile radius of Brushy Mountain State Prison Sunday in a wider hunt for Ray and the three other convicts.

Officials said a brief afternoon shower increased the chance bloodhounds would pick up the scent of the men in the thickly wooded area around the maximum security prison. The area had not had significant rain for several weeks.

The dog handlers tell me moist ground holds a scent better than dry ground," a prison spokesman said.

One car was stolen and a second was broken into at two motels at Caryville, about 20 miles from the prison, but police refused to say whether there was a possible link to the Ray escape.

Police said a camera and some other valuables were ignored, but a shirt and pair of trousers were taken in the auto break-in at another motel parking lot adjoining the scene of the car theft.

Blanton briefed US Atty. Gen. Griffin Bell on the search by telephone and then repeated his order that law enforcement personnel "should use all possible clution and restraint" to insure that Ray, convicted assassin of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., is returned to custody safely.

State officials believed Hacker led the escape plot because of a previous breakout from another Tennessee. prison and his connections on the outside.

Jim Gilchrist, a spokesman for Blanton, said the apprehension of Hacker was a "big break" in the case.

Gilchrist said because Hacker was found near the prison, there was hope Ray and the others were still in the area. He said it was generally believed "that if Larry Hacker had made it out of the dense forest around here, then Ray ... the others might have, too."

He added: "If anybody had the money and the connections to get away, it probably was Hacker.'

Gilchrist called Hacker "very shrewd, a professional" criminal." Hacker previously escaped from the state's main prison in Nashville and was at one time associated with the notorious "Dawson Gang" of bank robbers that plundered several Southern states in the mid-1970s. MUST ANNE PORTE COURSE
