Suspect Kay Takes Stand, **Denies Guilt**

Lawyer Seeks to Prove Slaying Was 'Political'

LONDON (P) - James Earl) fingerprint expert of the Feder-Ray denied yesterday that he killed the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. Fighting extradition to the United States to stand trial for the murder of the Negro civil rights leader, Ray profes-sed innocence in Bow Street Magistrates Court.

The 40-year-old fugitive from the Missouri Penitentiary took the stand in his own defense after the U.S. Government unveiled a carefully detailed case against him in the assassination at the Lorraine Motel in Memphis, Tenn., April 4.

George Jacob Bonebrake, a

al Bureau of Investigation, testified that he found Ray's prints on the field, telescopic sight and binoculars that were dropped at the doorway of a shop near the motel shortly after King was slain.

Bore No Grudge

.Under questioning by his court-appointed British attorney, Roger Frisby, Ray said that he had never met King and that he bore him no grudge.

"Did you kill Martin Luther King?" Frisby asked. "No, sir," the prisoner said.

Chief Magistrate Frank Milton later adjourned the hearing until next Tuesday. It is expected to be completed then. Ray went back to prison.

Ray resisted moves to extradite him to stand trial for King's murder with all the legal ammunition provided by Britain's clouded extradition

If the court's decision goes against him, Frisby is expected to appeal to a higher court on the ground that King's assassination was a political crime, for which Britain does not permit extradition?

Ray was formerly addressed as Ramon George Sneyd, the alias under which he is held here on charges of entering Britain on a forged Canadian (Indicate page, name of newspaper, city and state.)

Asked by the court clerk tosign a summary of his testimony for evidence, Ray turned to his lawyer and said: "How would I sign it?"

Recorded Unsigned

It went into the record unsigned. At no point during the hearing did his lawyer admit that the prisoner was Ray.

The U.S. case was presented by British Lawyer David Calcutt. It took him one hour and 10 minutes sum up the case.

This was Calcutt's version of the evidence against Ray, drawn from the documents submitted by the U.S. embassy:

On March 29 Ray went into he Aero Marine Supply Co. in Birmingham, Ala., and bought a rifle with a telescopic sight from Donald Wood, the son of the owner.

The next day he came back and exchanged it for a Remington 760 rifle, Serial No. 461476, with a telescopic sight numbered A17350.

John Deshazo of Montgomery, Ala., another customer in the store, told FBI agents later that Ray-or a man he tentatively identified as Ray through pictures-had bought a rifle and said he was going hunting in Wisconsin with his brother r brother-in-law.

On April 3, according to a worn statement by recepdonist Henrietta Hagermaster, Ray checked into the Rebel Motor Hotel in Memphis. Then he went to a Memphis store run by a Mr. York and bought a pair of Bushnell binoculars numbered DQ408664 with a case and strap, in a yellow and black box, and wrapped in a gray-blue paper bag. He got a receipt for \$41.05.

The next affidavit came from Charles Stevens, 46, one of the government's key witnesses. On the day of King's death, he was living with his common Continued From First Page

law wife in apartment 6B of the rooming house on 4221/2 South MAIN St., Memphis, which from the rear faced the motel where King was shot.

Stevens, who spent most of his time in bed, as he is a disabled veteran said he heard footsteps on April 4 leading from apartment 5B to the bathroom.

"On the first couple of times, he did not stay long. On the third time the person stayed there what seemed like a long time toward the end of the afternoon between 5 and 6 p.m. I wanted to use the toilet.

"I was in my kitchen working on a small radio when I heard a shot. I could tell that it came from the bathroom because it was very loud.

'Then I heard voices yelling and hollering in the Lorraine Motel. I went out and saw a man running and carrying a bundle about three or four feet long and six or eight inches thick, wrapped in newspaper. Although I didn't get a long look, I think it was the same man I saw earlier with Mrs. Brewer."

A dramatic high spot in Calcutt's case was a report by Detective Chief Suptr Thomas Butler of Scotland Yard of a jail cell meeting with Ray.

Butler testified the prisoner, on hearing that police had identified him as an American wanted for a killing rather than as Canadian Ramon George Sneyd, sat down, put his head in his hands and said: "Oh God... I feel so trapped."

In Ga., meanwhile, an organization calling itself the Patriot Legal Fund has offered to defend Ray if he is brought to trial on charges that he killed King.



Ray's American lawyer, Arthur J. Hanes of Birmingham, Ala., was refused permission to speak to Ray once he was turned over to U.S. authorities in London. Hanes' request to accompany Ray on the flight was denied.

Hanes took a commercial flight to New York today. He told newsmen at London airport he would protest "this bizarre affair - the spiriting away of a man in the night.

"For all I know," said Hanes, "my man could still be in Britain. I knew at 9:30 last night that a move was imminent. I was told that I should appreciate that I could not travel with my client. I said I most certainly did not.

VIEWED AS BIZARRE

"The entire affair was bizarre in the extreme - undercover and secretive . . . I don't know what the U.S. attorney general is up to in not giving permission for me to go with my client. I shall be taking this matter up most strongly when I get home."

As Ray left Britain, the London Daily Sketch reported that his fingerprints had been matched with those of a gunman who robbed a London bank a few days before he was arrested June 8. The report had circulated in London for several weeks, but British law bans the publication of such information involving a man facing legal proceedings.

Scotland Yard officials refused to confirm or deny the report in the Daily Sketch, which said a gunman on June 4 thrust a "give me cash" note at a teller in the Trustee Savings Bank in London's Fulham District and escaped with about \$240 to British pounds.


