

considerable sums for use in the Association for a wage and Cong hurled human wave attacks early Friday against a U.S. 25th Infantry Division unit about 50 miles northwest of Saigon but were thrown back by a ground, air and artillery counterattack.

U.S. spokesmen said 14 Americans were killed and a sweep of the battlefield turned up 120 enemy dead. It was the first major action reported in Operation Toan Thang-complete victory-since it opened Monday.


Military spokesman said the enemy approached to within hand grenade range in the fighting near the Cambodian border. The flareup broke a lull in ground fighting that had accompanied peace moves between the United States and North Vietnam.

The predawn attack was repulsed after about five hours of heavy fighting, the spokesmen said. They said the assault was launched against night positions of the division's 3rd brigade.

The sweep of 100,000 allied soldiers in 11 provinces around Saigon was pressed against little opposition for the fourth straight day. The allies are looking for 18,000 20,000 enemy troops believed to be in the 3rd Corps area.

A U.S. spokesman summed up the 3rd Corps situation of the enemy this way: "It appears they aren't ready to fight. With their supplies dependent on hand-carrying things, bicycles and sampans, they've probably used what supplies they had stockpiled. They lost over 47,000 men in the Tet offensive. After losses like that, you don't go into action in quite some time.

"They apparently have fallen back to regroup, to get replacements. Now is the time to go get them, now that they are hurting. We've got to maintain the pressure on them

COSSELS (AP) - Belgian security police are investigating a case of spying for an East European Communist state and have questioned a German official on the staff of the Common Market headquarters here, a Belgian Foreign Ministry spokesman said Thursday. The official was not identified.

The spokesman said the German was questioned by Belgian police two or three weeks ago but was released the next morning on the intervention of Jean Rey, president of the Common Market commission.

Cache of weapons found

KUCHING, Malaysia (AP) - Police in the Malaysian Borneo state of Sarawak disclosed Thursday that they had found a cache of weapons, explosive and ammunition which they said were to have been used by Communist

A police spokesman did not say when the weapons were uncovered, but he said the news was withheld because of security operations in the area about 20 miles south east of Kuching.

Navy to pay for damages

LONDON (AP) — The U.S. Navy said Thursday it is prepared to compensate the French trawler Lorraine-Bretagne whose drag gear was fouled by the nuclear submarine Robert E. Lee in the Irish sea.

"If there is any question of damage we will pay," said a spokesman. "We are waiting for a claim to come in."

The Navy said the submarine was not damaged in the incident April 9. Only the trawler's gear suffered, it said.

U.S. wheat for Arabs?

NEW DELHI (AP) - India has asked the United States to let it sell Egypt 27,400 tons of American aid-to-India wheat held up in the Suez Canal since the Arab-Israeli war last June, Food Minister A.P. Shinde told Parliament today.

Shinde said Egypt has agreed to purchase the shipment, and there is no chance of getting the ship with it aboard out of the canal. No price has been fixed, he added.

Reds tighten control

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Communist party, apparently made fearful by the liberalization move in Czechoslovakia, warned officials down the line they must "wage an offensive struggle against bourgeois ideology.'

The party's central committee gave its approval after a twoday secret meeting to the crackdown on dissenters already launched by the party's leaders.
