On April 24, 1968, SAS JAMES RICHARD FLICK, JOSEPH G. SHEA, and JACK T. BEVERSTEIN interviewed LEWIE RAYMOND DOWDA, an inmate at the Cobb County Jail, Marietta, Georgia. DOWDA advised he was formerly incarcerated at the Missouri State Prison, Jefferson City, Missouri. He stated while at the Missouri State Prison, he was acquainted for approximately three years with JAMES EARL RAY, a fellow inmate. DOWDA advised he was released from the Missouri State Prison on December 23, 1966, and JAMES EARL RAY was still incarcerated. He stated he had been the chief cook at the Missouri State Prison and RAY worked as a bread slicer.

DOWDA advised RAY was the type person the other inmates did not "mess with." He described RAY as a "loner" who usually initiated the conversation if he wanted to talk to anyone. He stated that RAY spoke in a mild, low tone and when angry would speak even softer. He stated he had never known RAY to become excited and shout. To his knowledge, he has never known RAY to smoke. He stated RAY had a fair complexion, which was blotchy, having pimples around the lower portion of his face. He stated RAY had a rash on the right side of his head during the entire time he had known RAY and RAY would scratch this rash. He stated this rash was very noticeable due to the type of haircut in the Penitentiary and RAY put some type of salve on this rash. He stated RAY's hair was lightly streaked with gray. He advised the only scar he can recall which RAY had was a large burn scar on his forearm, side unrecalled. stated this scar was located near the wrist. He stated RAY had dingy teeth.

DOWDA advised RAY always talked about "running around" in St. Louis, Missouri. He normally talked about two girl friends, one of these he had met at the Gaslight

(a bar) located in either St. Louis or Kansas City. DOWDA stated the other girl was a girl RAY had met around the college at Columbia, Missouri, and it was his impression this girl had worked in a tavern there.

DOWDA advised RAY, while in prison, wore a ring on his left hand which was made at the Penitentiary, having been made from white metal with raised initials. He stated RAY never smiled, but when he smiled, it looked like a smirk. He advised RAY was clean and not sloppy in his dress. He described RAY as an avid reader and considered RAY to be intelligent. He advised RAY participated in softball games as a pitcher and would watch all of the baseball games at the Penitentiary, however, he had never heard RAY speak of professional baseball.

DOWDA stated that some time in 1966, a group of Black Muslims had petitioned for the right to have their own religious services. He stated the Muslims would congregate in groups and that a subsequent search of the Negro prisoners had uncovered a large cache of weapons. DOWDA stated the white prisoners then armed themselves and there was a riot at the prison. DOWDA stated three Negro prisoners were killed. DOWDA stated he would not say RAY had knifed these Negro prisoners, but did say that if RAY had not knifed them, he definitely knew who had killed them.

DOWDA stated RAY definitely was a racist and hated Negroes. He stated RAY had made the statement and firmly believed that all the Negro prisoners inside the Penitentiary should be killed. He stated RAY had on several occasions made the statement that if the price were right, he would kill MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. DOWDA stated he does not recall ever hearing anything which would indicate a "contract" was out for the murder of MARTIN LUTHER KING.

DOWDA advised he would not be surprised if JAMES EARL RAY was the murderer of MARTIN LUTHER KING, however, he does not believe RAY would have killed KING without being paid for it.

DOWDA stated approximately four months before he, DOWDA, was released RAY had attempted to escape from the Missouri State Prison by going out of the prison behind the ovens in the prison bakery. He stated RAY was apprehended and RAY had broken his arm in this escape attempt. He stated RAY had talked about escaping from the Penitentiary prior to this. DOWDA advised he does not believe RAY returned from maximum security confinement prior to DOWDA's release from prison.

DOWDA stated while in prison, RAY was particularly interested in Western music. He stated he does not recall RAY ever mentioning anything about dancing. He stated that during this period a number of orchestras from the Lake of the Ozarks had played at the State Prison and RAY would never miss these performances. He stated RAY often talked about planning to go to the Lake of the Ozarks when he got out of prison. DOWDA stated he would have no idea who RAY would contact at the Lake of the Ozarks, but stated if he were to look for RAY there, he would first find out who was selling dope and through this person, locate RAY. He stated RAY had talked about being on dope prior to being in the Missouri State Prison. He advised RAY had to have an outside source of income while in prison inasmuch as RAY's dope habit was costing RAY \$35 to \$40 a week for shots and RAY appeared to be well fixed, never wanting for anything.

DOWDA extimated RAY spent \$15 to \$20 a week for personal conveniences. He stated RAY, while in prison,

used amphetamine, taking the shot in the "main line." He stated RAY would take two to three shots a day. He stated RAY never lacked for money, but had no idea of RAY's source of income. DOWDA stated he is certain RAY was not selling amphetamine to other prisoners, stating he has known RAY to give free amphetamine to prisoners who needed a shot. DOWDA denied that he himself had ever taken any shots, but admitted he has taken pills. DOWDA claimed he and RAY were not engaged in the sale of amphetamine at the Missouri State Prison.

DOWDA stated that HAROLD SCHAFFER Guard on the gate in the kitchen of the Missouri State Prison, was very close to JAMES EARL RAY and it was DOWDA's understanding that SCHAEFER was RAY's source of amphetamine. He stated BENJAMIN O. GOODIN was a civilian in charge of the kitchen and he is certain GOODIN was not connected in any way with the bringing of amphetamine into the prison. He stated while GOODIN was friendly with RAY, he understands it was GOODIN who had disclosed RAY's hiding place when RAY had attempted to escape in 1966.

DOWDA advised one NEIL ABBY (phonetic) was RAY's closest friend in the Missouri State Prison and was responsible for bringing RAY into the kitchen. He stated ABBY at this time was chief cook at the prison. He believes ABBY was serving time for breaking into a drug store and he does know that dope was connected with ABBY's offense. He stated ABBY had a detainer on him as he was an escapee from the State of Texas. DOWDA does not know whether or not ABBY is presently in custody but does not believe he is presently in the Missouri State Prison.

He stated RAY had another friend, one DONALD DEAN RIGGER. He stated RIGGER was from California and RIGGER's wire was a psychiatrist at the Napa State Hospital, which

is located north of San Francisco, California.

DOWDA advised that RAY and other inmates that might have DOWDA's address would have a Route 1, Sanford, Florida, address, and would not know that he is presently in Marietta, Georgia. He stated his father, STEVEN C. DOWDA. presently resides at 110 South Chandler Street, Deland, Florida, and that anyone inquiring for him at Sanford, Florida, would be sent to Deland, Florida. DOWDA claims he has not been contacted by RAY and has heard nothing to indicate RAY has attempted to contact him. He stated RAY had talked about traveling over all the United States, but had never mentioned anything which would indicate RAY was associated with anyone in the Atlanta, Georgia, area. DOWDA stated the only other prisoner he knew who was from the State of Georgia, who was an inmate at the Missouri State Prison was one JERRY WHITE from Calhoun, Georgia. He advised WHITE had a Federal detainer against him and believes WHITE is still incarcerated at the Missouri State Prison.

DOWDA advised he had made a trip to California in November of 1967, and that he and his wife had spent Thanksgiving Day visiting her uncle, BOB GRAHAM, who resides at Palos Verdes, California. He stated GRAHAM is Regional Manager for IBM in that area. He stated that he and his wife had stopped at Jefferson City and while there, contacted a Missouri State Prison guard, Mr. "PETE" PETRIE. He stated he had not made any inquiry concerning RAY and was not aware that RAY had escaped. He stated he had not made any inquiry concerning inmates inasmuch as his wife did not know he was a former inmate of the Missouri State Prison. He stated he had stopped in the Kansas City, Missouri, area and attempted to locate PAUL ALVIN LAIL. JR., who had been in the Missouri State Prison as PAUL ALVIN CARTER. He stated LAIL had been released approximately a year before he had and that they had agreed to attempt to get together

after their release from prison. He stated LAIL worked in the license shop at the Missouri State Prison and although he was acquainted with RAY, he did not believe LAIL was a particularly good friend of RAY. He stated after his return from California, he was contacted by PAUL ALVIN LAIL, JR. He stated LAIL owns a home at 34 Barbedos Drive, Palm Springs, West Palm Beach, Florida, Telephone Number 965-4221. He stated LAIL in February of 1968 was out of a job and had come to Marietta, Georgia, looking for employment. He stated LAIL had come to Marietta, Georgia, with his wife and a small baby and had resided with DOWDA for approximately one and one-half weeks, leaving approximately two or three days after DOWDA was arrested, DOWDA having been arrested on March 4, 1968.

DOWDA advised he could recall nothing else concerning RAY which might assist in his location, but in the event he remembered anything additional, he would contact the FBI.

Mr. ALFRED BURKHARDT, 305 Boonville Road, formerly employed by the Missouri State Tenitentiary, said he was the relief driver of the "bread truck" for Renz Farm on April 23, 1967. He said he picked up the bread about 8:30 a.m. He noted the box was on the platform (loading dock). He said this was unusual because usually the empty is taken from the truck and the full box returned. He said he recalled it had been there the day before. He said he was supposed to check the box to be sure it contained nothing but bread. He said the box was about 3 by 2-1/2 feet. He said he had heard that someone tried to get into one of these boxes, after RAY's escape, and could not do it with room for bread. He said the box is checked at the dock, and at the tunnel. He said, however, that it was not "probed." He said the check was visual. He said the box was delivered to Renz Farm and he heard no more about it.

However, he "heard" the next day that civilian cook at Renz Farm complained "that the bread had been all messed up." He also "heard" that there was no shortage of bread on April 23, 1968. He said he also "heard" that some of RAY's clothing and been found on the loading dock a week or two after the escape. He said the only thing unusual about this particular trip and perhaps the 22nd, was that the box was on the dock when he arrived there.

Mr. STEPHAN I. KRAY, Elston, Missouri, Officers' Dining Room Supervisor, Missouri State Penitentiary, formerly guard at Renz Farm, said it was his regular job in 1267 to drive the truck to the main prison for bread five days a week, except weekends. He said the truck leaves Renz Farm about 8:00 a.m., and gets the bread no later than about 8:30 a.m. He said the empty box is taken from Renz Farm and taken to the loading dock. At that place the driver gives the order for bread. The inmates take the empty box on an elevator to the bakery and a box is loaded with the order. It is then brought back to the dock. driver is supposed to check it to be sure it contains nothing but bread. He said the box was about 4 by 3 feet. He said it holds about 100 loaves of bread and they are packed 15 loaves to each layer. He said he always ran his arm down inside the box to count the layers. He said the truck then goes out to the truck tunnel. There a guard again checked to be sure there was nothing under or around the truck, including the box and under the hood. He, if satisfied, signaled the tower and the exit gate was released and the truck went back to the farm. He said the truck made several stops for lights, intersections, etc., en route and one would have no difficulty getting off the truck. He said the box was large enough to hold a man.

Mr. KRAL said that he heard some talk, after RAY escaped, that some officers had seen RAY "practicing a little yogi", that is, curling up in corners, and similar. He said he presumed he was doing this to see if he could fit in the bread box, but he had no personal information in this regard. He also said he "heard" that Renz Farm had been receiving more bread than requested for two or three days prior to April 23, 1967.

Mr. KRAL said the entire delivery trip from Renz to the Penitentiary and back did not continue until after 9:00 a.m.

He said he did not know what procedures of checking were followed on April 23, 1968, as this was a weekend and both the regular driver and regular tunnel checker were off duty.

At 11:45 A. M. today ASAC KYLE CIARK of the Chicago Office called to advise that JERRY RAY, brother of the subject in this case, is leaving for St. Louis and is expected to arrive around 5:00 or 6:00 P. M. today. Purpose of his trip is to visit his sister, CAROL; and will be in St. Louis until Wednesday when he anticipates returning to Chicago.

He is driving a 1960 DeSoto, four-door, light-green; bearing 1968 Illinois License (white background, red numbers) KX-5820.

I asked ASAC CLARK what coverage Chicago is giving JERRY RAY, and he stated that they do not have him under surveillance, however, they have developed contacts who can report on his whereabouts. ASAC CLARK stated that while he appears to be cooperating, the Chicago Office is not one hundred per cent convinced he is. They do not feel that he knows the present whereabouts of the subject, and are merely playing him along in case of future contact. He stated that JERRY RAY is going to tell both JOHN RAY and CAROL that the FBI in no way revealed their names to the press.

In addition, ASAC CLARK stated that JERRY RAY would stay either at the MacArthur Hotel or with his sister, CAROL.

CLARK also desires to be advised when JERRY RAY departs St. Louis for his return to Chicago in order that they may afford coverage of his activities there.

RE: INTERVIEW OF EROTHERS CARL BENTON AND JAMES FRANCIS DRAKE.

CARL DRAKE, a self-employed contractor, 2934 St. Vincent, St. Louis, Mo., home phone PR 6-3540, was located and interviewed by SA WALTER C.JCHNSON on 4/29/68, and stated while an inmate of the Missouri State Penitentiary (MSP), he became acquainted with JAMES EARL RAY who was incarcerated in either 1960 or 1961, and subsequently became close friends until DRAKE's release in June 1965. Their main association was while they both walked together in the prison yard and DRAKE feels he became as close a friend to RAY as anyone at the prison. He described RAY as "a loner, close-mouthed" who kept his own council and did not even consult him prior to RAY's unsuccessful attempt to go over the wall by the use of a ladder. RAY had very few friends, however, he mixed well with other inmates, both black and white, and had never showed any propensity for violence or appeared to be a racist.

DRAKE pointed out there were several instances of racial trouble at the penitentiary but RAY never seemed involved or expressed his feelings in the matter.

RAY often mentioned that he could not do his 20-year sentence but never indicated any escape plans or any contacts with outside individuals. RAY's brother, JACK RAY, from St. Louis, Mo., was the only member of the family he mentioned and believed JACK averaged visiting RAY about once a year at the penitentiary. He vaguely recalled RAY mentioning he had another brother killed in an auto accident. He did not discuss his general background other than mentioning on several occasions he had previously done time at Menard Prison, Chester, Illinois.

RAY was not addicted to use of drugs, however, DRAKE said nearly all inmates "fooled around" with anything they could get their hands on. DRAKE said about two weeks after his release in June 1965, he visited JACK RAY upon the request of JIMMY, and that was the last time he saw JACK. Their conversation concerned primarily JIM's welfare at the MSP.

DRAKE had not heard of JIM's escape and presumed he was still in prison until the recent publicity.

DRAKE regards RAY as a small-time robber mentally incapable of planning the assassination of Doctor MARTIN LUTHER" KING without additional intelligent guidance from some other source. He believes RAY may be capable of being hired for this but would certainly not be alone in this matter. He is also of the opinion that whoever hired RAY, that person or group, has disposed of RAY. He commented that with the "heat" on RAY and rewards advertised, it would be extremely difficult for a fellow like RAY to hide.

CARL DRAKe indicated that he would cooperate in any way he could with the FBI in the event any information came to his attention re the whereabouts of JAMES EARL RAY.

CARL DRAKE said his brother, JAMES FRANCIS DRAKE was also an inmate at the MSP and was acquainted with RAY in a similar manner. All three formerly walked the yard together and that was JAMES BRAKE's main association with JAMES RAY. JAMES FRANCIS DRAKE was released two years before CARLand later served time at Terre Haute Federal Prison, and was released in November 1967. CARL said his brother, JAMES, resides with his mother, OLA DRAKE, at Modesta, Ill., and is currently employed at the Valley Steel Co., Jacksonville, Ill.

On 4/12/68, at approximately 6 p.m., Mrs. CLARA PHILLIPS. 4245 Cook, caught the GM&O bus to Ullin, Illinois. On this bus Mrs. PHILLIPS met a man she describes as a W/M, over 6' tall, with brown hair brushed back on each side, dressed in dark suit with white shirt, with exceptionally wide shoulders and a very thick neck. This man had a mustahee but resembled very closely the picture of Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING's assassin as pictured in the St. Louis Post Dispatch dated 4/18/68. Mrs. PHILLIPS stated that this individual was enroute to Union City, Tenn., and indicated that he lived near a lake just outside of Union City. The man appeared to like music, was very quiet and did not give Mrs. PHILLIPS any name.

PHILLIPS could not identify any of the photos displayed to her of JAMES EARL RAY. She insisted that the subject most resembled the picture which appeared in the paper with the exception of the mustache and his face was much thinner.

Results of this interview were discussed with Supervisor EDMUND WELTON and due to the wide discrepancies in physical description, it was decided that no further action would be required.

At 9:00 a.m., 4/23/68, ROBERT JOSEPH TRINGALI, a Technician for the Missouri National Guard, 3676 Market telephone JE5-8591, who resides with his parents at 3349 Ringfield Drive, Affton, Mo., telephone TW2-7975, appeared at this office and asked to look at all available pictures we have on JAMES EARL RAY. He said last night on the 10:00 p.m. news broadcast on Channel 5 he had seen a photograph of JAMES EARL RAY and had thought that it resembled a man he saw at the Stadium Club in East St. Louis, Ill., last Saturday morning. TRINGALI related that he and his girl friend whose name he declined to give at this time went to the Stadium Club and about 2:00 a.m. he went to the men's room and when he came back found two men sitting at the table with his girl friend. He said he told the men to leave but they did not leave until they had drunk a couple of beers. He said that one of the men who later identified himself as BRIAN EVERETT GALLACHER was drinking very heavily and said to TRINGALI, "Do you know this face?" to which TRINGALI replied that he did not and then GALLAGHER said, "Well, you should know this face -- that means trouble." TRINGALI said that this individual then kept talking and took out his driver's license and threw it across the table at TRINGALI. TRINGALI recalled that it had the man's photograph on it and his name as BRIAN EVERETT GALLAGHER and an address of Anaheim, Calif. TRINGALI said the man appeared to be in his late 30's or early 40's, just under 6 feet tall, medium build, 170 pounds, dark hair with a wave in front combed back, average complexion, eyes half closed--appeared to be sunken possibly from having bags under his eyes.

The writer exhibited to TRINGALI all of the photographs available in this office of RAY, including the 3 on the wanted flier and the photograph taken by the St. Louis Police Department on 10/10/59. TRINGALI's recollection of GALLAGHER's companion is that he was 45 or older, about the same height as GALLAGHER, somewhat stockier. His hair was brown with grey at the temples. Both of the men were neatly dressed. He gained the impression that GALLAGHER was from out of town, whereas his companion was a native as GALLAGHER asked his companion if there was any other place in this town where they could go. It is TRINGALI's recollection that the man who identified himself as GALLAGHER also had a confrontation with a waitress there. He described her as 27 or 28 years old, 5'6", brownish-blond hair.

When the 1/4/66 photograph of RAY is obtained from Kansas City, it is suggested that they be displayed to TRINGALI and to his girl friend.

Two of the stolen money orders have not yet been recovered. They, housver, are accounted for as Ray has edultted caching one of them at a luggage store in Kansas City, Kensas and Rife adults caching one of them at Riemi Beach, Florida.

James Earl Ray, a Missouri prison escapee who has been sought under the alias Eric Starvo Galt in connection with the gunshot slaying of civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., has been added to the FBI's list of "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives."

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover ordered the special addition of Ray to the "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives" list, which already contains ten fugitives, to insure the widest possible dissemination of Ray's photograph and description to help effect his earliest possible location.

Ray has been the subject of a massive and intensive search since the brutal gunshot slaying of Dr. King on April 4, 1968, as he stood on the balcony of a Memphis, Tennessee, motel. One rifle bullet, believed fired from the window of a nearby rooming house, felled the victim.

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An exhaustive FBI fingerprint search, comparing latent fingerprints uncovered in the Dr. King case against fingerprints of over 53,000 persons on whom wanted notices have been posted in the FBI's Identification Division, succeeded in determining that Galt and Ray are identical.

A Federal warrant, issued at Birmingham, Alabama, on April 17, 1968, charges Ray, under the alias Eric Starvo Galt, with conspiring to interfere with a Constitutional Right of a United States citizen. Ray is also sought for unlawful interstate flight to avoid confinement after conviction for armed robbery, based on a Federal warrant issued on July 20, 1967, at Jefferson City, Missouri. He had been confined at the Missouri State Penitentiary, Jefferson City, Missouri, in March, 1960, with a 20-year sentence following conviction for armed robbery and operating a motor vehicle without permission of the owner. In September, 1966, while serving the sentence, he was confined for a time in the maximum security ward at the State Hospital, Fulton, Missouri. He was reported missing from the Missouri State Penitentiary since April 23, 1967.

Ray, who has an arrest record dating back to 1949 and has been convicted of burglary, armed robbery and forging United States Postal Money Orders, has also been confined in the Los Angeles County Jail, the Joliet and Pontiac, Illinois, State Prisons and the United States Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas.

He served in the Army between February, 1946, and December, 1948, received a three-month sentence at hard labor for being drunk and breaking arrest and was given a General Discharge due to ineptness and lack of adaptability for military service.

Ray is a 40-year-old white male, reportedly born in Illinois on He is approximately 5'10" inches tall, weighs from 163 to 174 pounds, has blue eyes and brown hair which he has worn cut short. He has a small scar on the center of his forehead and a scar on the palm of his right hand. He has been described as having a straight, narrow nose and straight and even teeth and to have a nervous habit of occasionally tugging at an ear lobe. His left ear protrudes noticeably.

Acquaintances describe him as a 'loner' and 'drifter' whose language and diction reflect a "rural" quality and indicate he has had limited education.

He is reportedly a fan of western and country music, drinks vodka and beer, dresses neatly and claims past employment as a merchant seaman and cook on Mississippi River vessels. He is known to have worked as a baker, laborer and color matcher.

He is known as an avid dancer who has taken dancing lessons. He also completed a course at a school of bartending in the Los Angeles area early in 1968.

Ray should be considered armed and extremely dangerous.
