





# Fading Clues Raise Question of Conspiracy

MEMPHIS—When the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was killed by a rifle shot as he stood on the balcony of a Memphis motel two weeks ago, police at first thought it would be an easy murder to solve. The killer had left behind an unbelievable number of clues.

Witnesses said the shot which killed Dr. King had come from a dilapidated rooming house 205 feet from the motel balcony. On the sidewalk in front of the rooming house, a deputy sheriff found a 30.06 caliber Remington rifle in a box. Beside it was a blue suitcase which contained a pair of pliers, some clothing, and a pair of binoculars.

One witness said a young white man came down the steps from the rooming house and dropped the box and the suitcase.

Two patrons at a bar said they saw the man drop the suitcase and the box and then get into a 1966 white Mustang car and drive away.

With all this evidence, and more, on hand in just a few hours, Attorney General Ramsey Clark predicted that a solution of the murder would be forth-coming almost immediately and the arrest of the assassin made.

Two weeks later, all of the physical evidence seemed to have led practically nowhere, and the alarming word "conspiracy" has begun to sound loudly.

The bullet which killed Dr. King was so smashed that F.B.I. technicians in Washington were able to tell little more than its caliber—a 30.06.

#### **Best Evidence**

Fingerprints found in the longnosed man's room at the flophouse could not be classified.

The rifle seemed to be the best bit of evidence. It was traced to Birmingham, Ala., to the Aeromarine Supply Co., where it had been sold March 30, 1968, to a young white man who bore very little resemblance to the longnosed man from the flophouse.

On Monday, April 8, F.B.I. agents got a name from the gun store. The search led agents to a \$22 a week boarding house in Birmingham. A former resident of the boarding house, Eric Starvo Galt, fit most of the physical description of John Willerd, the name given by the alleged sniper when he had registered at the Memphis flophouse; the main differences appeared to be in the ages and in the noses.

Galt had been gone from the Birmingham boarding house for more than seven months when F.B.I. agents went there looking for him.

On April 11, Galt's white Mustang, for which he had paid \$1,995 cash in Birmingham, was found in Atlanta. It had been abandoned for almost a week. The F.B.I. got no useful fingerprints from it.

On April 18, the F.B.I. asked the public to help look for Galt and a photograph was distributed. And, for the first time, the F.B.I. agreed that Galt had had some help in the slaying. Agents said an "alleged brother" had conspired with him.

#### True Identity

Late Friday, the F.B.I. said that it had learned the true identity of Galt.

He was, the F.B.I. said, James Earl Ray, a five-time convict who had escaped from a Missouri prison in April, 1967, and who had been sought by the F.B.I. since last July on a fugitive warrant.

The F.B.I. had been unable by Friday night to develop a firmer motive for the slaying, which touched a wild weekend of riots in the United States.

Unnamed F. B. I. sources have been quoted in the Birmingham newspapers as saying that the F.B.I. has considered the possibility that Dr. King was shot by a professional killer.

The F.B.I. itself reased to comment.

# B.I. Hunt for Ray in Dr. King's Killing Stuns Prison

#### Dy DOUGLAS E. KNEELAND Special to The New York Times

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., April 22 - Prison officials and inmates at the state penitentiary here are still stunned that James Harl Ray, a convict who escaped a year ago, has been accused of conspiring in the slaying of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Last Wednesday the Federal Bureau of Investigation named Eric Starvo Galt, described as a 36-year-old "loner," a meat . dresser and avid dancer, as a conspirator in the assassination April 4 of Dr. King in Memphis. Tenn.

Newspapers with pictures and sketches of Galt circulated behind the gray walls of the sold penitentiary on the Mis-- souri River, but no word of Stecognition was heard along

the prison grapevine.

On Friday, the F.B.I. said
Galt was Ray, a 40-year-old
habitual criminal who escaped from the penitentiary here
April 23, 1967, after having served seven years of a 20-year sentence for armed rob-*⊕* вегу.

Warden Harold R. Swenson said in an interview last night that the F.B.I. had not notified officials here before the announcement. Nor, he added, has any representative of the agency come to Jefferson City to look at Ray's record or interview prisoners who knew him.

#### 'Doesn't Shape Up'

"I was floored," the white-haired warden said. "This guy's penny-ante. It doesn't shape up, does it?"

Thumbing through Rays' records, noting that his work reports in food service here were "pretty good," Mr. Swenson, who has been in prison work nearly 30 years, mostly in the Federal system, shook his head. "He's innocuous," he said. "Pennyante."

Noting that the pictures of Galt had meant nothing to the staff and that there had been no reaction from the inmates, the warden added: "If there's anyone who'd talk, it's the prisoners. Once a guy's gone they'll talk."

# **Hunt Spreads for King's Killer**

# Identified as Escapee

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., April 20 ((UPI)) - The FBI Friday identified a habitual criminal and escapee from the Missouri State Prison as the mysterious Eric Starvo Galt, object of an international manhunt in the slaving of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Agents said James Earl Ray, 40, who fled prison 51 weeks ago by hiding in a bread truck, was identified through fingerprints after a 15-day check of the prints of more than 53,000 wanted criminals in FBI files.

The prints, FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover said in Washington, proved "that Galt and Ray are identical.'

Mr. Hoover's announcement came as sources close to the investigation into Dr. King's slaying theorized the name Eric Starvo Galt may have been a code name for the murder at Memohis. Tenn., April 4. The name appears in too many scattered places at about the same time under varying descriptions of its user to be one man. these sources said.

U. S. and Mexican officials were reported Friday to be hunting "unofficially" for Ray in Mexico, where rumors have spread of his presence is the past two weeks. An FBI alert has been issued in Southeast California, near Arizona and Mexico, for a man fitting Ray's description.

The FBI said Ray had assumed such aliases as Galt, Harvey Lowmeyer, John Willard, James McBride, James Walton, W. C. Herron and James O'Conner.

Authorities said Ray, born in Alton, Ill., had a criminal record dating to 1949 and was serving a 20-year, habitual criminal sentence at Jefferson City, Mo., for armed robbery and automobile theft when he escaped April 23, 1967. Ray was working in the food service section of the Missouri State Prison and fled by hiding in a bread truck. A year earlier, he had tried to escape by hiding in the prison's ventilation system, but was discovered.

#### 'EVASIVE TYPE'

Warden Harold Swenson said a 1966 mental examination showed Ray had no personality troubles or adjustment difficulties not common to confined men. "He was an evasive type person," said Swenson. "I don't think anybody either liked him or disliked him."

Probation records in Los Anglees, where he served a county jail term for burglary, showed that Ray, eldest of three sons, quit school in Ewing, Mo., in ninth grade.

"I didn't want to go anymore," he told a probation officer who described Ray as "a Catholic who did not attend church services.'


He drifted for several years, once working as a 77-cents-an-hour laborer in a Hartford, Ill., shoe company, and joined the Army in 1946. He spent two years and four months in Germany as an infantryman and military policeman and received a general discharge in 1948 due to ineptness and a lack of adaptability for military service. Ray fled the Missouri Penitentiary on April 23, 1967. He had been serving the seventh year of a 20-year sentence for a 1959 market holdup and auto theft in St. Louis.

# The Other Aliases

In addition to the aliases John Willard and Harvey Lowmyer listed on the FBI fugitive warrant, the bureau said Ray has also called himself James McBride, James Walton, W. C. Herron and James O'Conner.

John Willard was the name used by the man who checked into the Memphis rooming house overlooking the Lorraine Motel, where King was fatally shot as he stood on a balcony and talked with friends.

The portrait sketched by the FBI showed Ray as a rather average-looking ne'er-do-well of conflicting personality traits.

Ray's Description

He was described as 5-foot-10, and 163 to 174 pounds, with brown hair, blue eyes and small scars on his forehead and right palm. He's said to have a habit of tugging on an ear when nervous. His left ear protrudes slightly further than his right

Ray was said by authorities to have worked at various times as a laborer, baker and color-matcher. In addition, persons who came in contact with him while he was outside prison said he spoke of having worked as a merchant seaman and riverboat cook.

The FBI said the fugitive's acquaintances called him a loner who likes beer and vodka, favors country and western music and speaks with a rural twang. The loner tag seemed to conflict with the FBI description of him as an "avid dancer."

# A Discrepancy

In more obvious conflict was the FBI's Wednesday statement saying Galt "took dancing lessons" in New Orleans in 1964 and 1965—a time when Ray was still imprisoned in Missouri.

A bureau spokesman said the earlier Galt description should have said he "reportedly" took

the dancing lessons, rather than stating flatly that he had.

# Attorney General Aggravated Bureau By Glowing Report on King Case

By Rowland Evans and Robert Novak

THE DEEP-seated unhappiness of J. Edgar Hoover's Federal Bureau of Investigation with its boss, Attorney General Ramsey Clark, was aggravated by Clark's misleading public optimism about a quick solution of the murder of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

FBI agents working on the King case grumbled privately that Clark's repeated statements hinting at imminent capture of the assassin were not justified by the actual progress of the investigation. On the contrary, some agents complained that what legitimate information the Attorney General did let drop risked drying up the killer's trail.

Department Justice Ιn conferences, Clark justified his contribution to the credibility gap on the grounds that optimistic talk about closing the case "would help morale"—that is, calm down Negro anger in the turbulent days immediately following the murder.

Simultaneously, there is considerable skepticism inside the Justice Department and FBI that the present renewed investigation of Black Power extremist Stokely Carmichael will result in any ac-

FBI agents are making detailed probes into Carmichael's role in formenting the Washington, D.C., riots of April 4-6 following Dr. King's death, but many feel Clark will never push for a Carmi-chael prosecution. The Justice Department staff overwhelmingly recommended a year ago that the Government seek an indictment of Carmichael, but the Attorney General vetoed the advice on grounds that it would only make him a martyr.

The FBI's appeal to the public included the customary warning that the man on the street should not attempt any capture since Ray is considered armed and "extremely dangerous."

He was described as a native of Alton, Ill., and a man with a "rural" accent and a taste for country music. The FBI said Ray is about 5 feet, 10 inches tall, weighing between 163 and 174 pounds, with with blue eyes and brown hair and scars on the forehead and right palm.

Ray's most conspicuous feature was said to be a protruding left ear and his most noticeable characteristic was said to be the nervous habit of tugging on his left ear lobe.

# FBI Assembles an Identity

The FBI's identification of James Earl Ray as a suspect in the slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was a sort of needle-in-the-haystack operation combining intuition with highly advanced scientific criminology techniques.

The key decision was to concentrate the resources of the FBI Identification Division on the existing files of known fugitives. These contain complete sets of fingerprints of 53,000 fugitives among 187 million sets of prints in the FBI files.

Possessing only latent and partial prints left behind in various places by the suspect, it was necessary for the ID experts to begin checking the 530,000 single fingerprints in the fugitive file against the incomplete traces left behind by the murder suspect.

The FBI will not say how many prints in its possession are considered as solid evidence, but in no case was there a complete impression of a hand and many of the prints were of palms or blurred single fingers. The number of useful prints probably did not exceed 10, including those recovered from the suspected murder weapon and other items the killer is believed to have touched.

Experts explained that if they had had the prints of all Ray's fingers, it would have been possible to classify and identify them quickly. With the partial prints it had obtained, the FBI decided it had to focus first on the fugitive file.

By use of a standard electronic sorting device, he fugitive prints were flushed out of the 187 million sets of points and the painstaking search egan.

Complicating the task was the fact that the suspect's prints did not reach the FBI all at once.

Dr. King was shot to death

on April 4. The suspected rifle was found almost immediately nd was flown from Memphis, Tenn. to the FBI crime laboratory here along with 68 other items of evidence. Only partial latent prints of a few fingers and a palm were found on the rifle. More were found on a pair of binoculars believed to have been used by the sniper. Additional prints were found later on other undisclosed items.

New evidence continued to turn up, including more fingerprints as late as April 12. By noon of April 19 the FBI had identified the suspect previously identified as Eric Starvo Galt, alias John Willard and Harvey Lowmyer as in reality an escaped convict named James Earl Ray.

This quickly led to Ray's entire criminal and military record, his birthplace, his relatives and much information about his habits, past decupations and leads about blaces where he might take refige.

# Massive Manhunt Continues For King Slaying Suspect

What may be the nation's most intensive manhunt gained fresh pressure yesterday when the FBI placed on its "most wanted" list a fugitive convict accused of murder in the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

James Earl Ray, a 40-year-old habitual criminal, is being hunted by police from border to border and beyond for the April 4 sniper slaying in Memphis, Tenn., of the Negro civil rights leader from Atlanta.

The FBI always has limited its list of most wanted criminals to 10 names but it lengthened this roll of dishonor to 11 by adding Ray, a white loner known also by the name of Eric Starvo Galt and by six other aliases.

# MAN 'RESEMBLING RAY' LIVED IN ATLANTA EARLY IN 1968

ATLANTA (UPI) - A man bearing "a very striking resemblance" to FBI pictures of the prison escapee sought in the slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. lived with a woman in an apartment here during January and February, a landlady said yesterday.

"From what I saw of him, he bore a very striking resemblance to the FBI pictures," said the landlady, who asked to remain unidentified.

The woman said FBI agents questioned her Friday and showed her pictures of James Earl Ray, a 40-year-old escapee from the Missouri State Penitentiary who has been identified by the FBI as the elusive Eric Starvo Galt, wanted for the slaying of King.

She said that the young woman with whom the man stayed moved out of her apartments April 1 but left a forwarding address. The woman told the landlady that her husband was in the Navy and that her visitor was her brother.

The young woman, shown pictures of Ray by UPI reporters, said he was not the man she knew. She said the FBI had not contacted her.

# Phone Call On Shooting Is Unverified

A Somerville, Tenn. man has reported overhearing part of a Memphis telephone conversation in which a white man spoke of shooting someone on a balcony a few hours before the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., was slain, but sources close to the investigation of the King slaying theident cannot be verified and is believed to be without foundation.

John McFerren, a Negro civil rights worker and owner of a store in Somerville, reported to authorities that he overheard the conversation in a produce market in Memphis on April but attached no significance to it at the time.

According to McFerren, he saw a heavy-set white man with a scar on his right cheek using the telephone in the market several hours before a sniper fatally wounded King. His account of conversation is that the man said:

"Shoot the S.O.B. on the balcony. Don't worry about the money. You'll get your \$5,000. Don't come here. Your brother will get it (the money) in New Orleans."

The Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Department of Justice today refused to comment on McFerren's story but authoritative sources said the incident cannot be substantiated.

The proprietors of the produce store indicated that it is normal for them to call New Orleans from Memphis to order fool shipments. It is common for them to mention fairly large sures of money in these calls.





# King Suspect Is Escapee From Prison

A Missouri State Penitentiary escapee named James Earl Ray was identified by the FBI yesterday as the man masquerading as Eric Starvo Galt, sought throughout the Nation in connection with the murder of the Rev. Dr. Martin-Luther King Jr.

The announcement, made here by Attorney General

Ramsey Clark, marked the first time in the two weeks since Dr. King's death in Memphis that the FBI disclosed a positive identification of a suspect.

Ray, 40, escaped last April 23 from the Missouri State Penitentiary in Jefferson City, Mo., where he was in his seventh year of a 20-year armed-robbery sentence.

FBI director J. Edgar Hoover said agents linked the case to Ray through latent fingerprints. Hoover's formal announcement did not say where the prints were found, but several prints were known to have been taken by the FBI in the rooming house from which the assassin shot Dr. King as the civil rights leader stood on a motel baleony.

FBI spokesmen said the prints were traced to Ray after a painstaking, page-by-page search of fingerprints filed against more than 53,000 persons for whom "wanted notices" have been published.

Ray, who has an extensive criminal record, has used not only the Eric Galt alias but also the names Harvey Lowmeyer, John Willard, James McBride, James Wakton, W. C. Herron and James O'Conner, the FBI said.

His whereabouts from April, 1967, when he escaped, until August, 1967, when he reportedly surfaced as Eric Starvo Galt, a tenant of a rooming house in Birmingham, Ala, are apparently unclear.

# Combed for Gal

The FBI, reportedly acting on a tip from an informer, apparently thought it had a good chance of catching Eric Starvo Galt, suspected assassin of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in California Wednesday.

On the strength of the tip, the FBI rushed to obtain a conspiracy warrant for Galt. Tennessee authorities at the same time issued a murder

Tip either was wrong or Galt eluded authorities sources disclosed yesterday. A good part of the investigation apparently still centers in Califorma, where Galt attended a bartending school in February and March.

#### MINUTEMEN

Meanwhile an interesting twist in the case comes from Kansas City where the U.S. Attornev's office revealed yesterday that an informant of "apparent reliability" reported some time ago that Minuteman chieftain Robert B. DePugh had ordered the assassination of several persons, including Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., if he ever went to jail.

DePugh disappeared late last year. His rightwing guerilla group believes the government is being taken over by communists.

Anthony P. Nugent Jr., assistant U.S. Attorney, said, however, that "nobody to my knowledge considers DePugh a suspect in the King mur er."

The FBI in Washington yesterday said it "has no one in custody in connection with Dr. King's

"He was a nice fellow with a nice personally, very intelligent," said Mr. Lau of Galt. "I don't believe he did this. There must be some mistake somewhere.'

There were reports from Los Angeles today that added more dimensions to the profile of Galt.

A Federal warrant, issued at Birmingham, Alabama, on April 17, 1968, charges Ray, under the alias Eric Starvo Galt, with conspiring to interfere with a Constitutional Right of a United States citizen. Ray is also sought for unlawful interstate flight to avoid confinement after conviction for armed robbery, based on a Federal warrant issued on July 20, 1967, at Jefferson City, Missouri. He had been confined at the Missouri State Penitentiary, Jefferson City, Missouri, in March, 1960, with a 20-year sentence following conviction for armed robbery and operating a motor vehicle without permission of the owner. In September, 1966, while serving the sentence, he was confined for a time in the maximum security ward at the State Hospital, Fulton, Missouri. He was reported missing from the Missouri State Penitentiary since April 23, 1967.

Ray, who has an arrest record dating back to 1949 and has been convicted of burglary, armed robbery and forging United States Postal Money Orders, has also been confined in the Los Angeles County Jail, the Joliet and Pontiac, Illinois, State Prisons and the United States Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas.
