
This matter was discussed 6/21/78 with Commander Anthony Lampard, C-5 and Det. Chief Sutt. Brian Worth. Regarding the proposed visit of the House Select Committee on Assassinations (HSCA) they have had no recent correspondence. All their correspondence has been through the Home Office, who presumably has been in contact with HSCA. Their last communication was in & May and they were anticipating a visit of the HSCA in June. The Home Office was advised that NSY was agreeable to furnishing officers as witnesses for the HSCA under certain conditions but would not make any reports available. Home Office relayed a list of officers it was desired to interview together with a longer list of civilian potential witnesses. NSY replied that they could not answer for the civilians and that only two of the officers on the list are currently with NSY. They agreed to make Peter Elliott, then Sergeant now Det. Chief Insp. available, and if absolutely necessary, Phillip Birch, of Special Branch, however under the condition that someone from the Home Office be present. Butler who headed the investigation is dead, and other officers named are deadm or retired. "poarently HSCA was asking that the civilians be contacted and NSY opposed this doing this.

Alec Fist is not known to them as figuring in this investigation and does not appear on the HSCA list. He is known to them as a very active officer and a very controversial officer. He was clever and knowledgable about the underworld but involved in questionable activities and altho acquited for of charges brought against him was medically retired. He left under a cloud and is no doubt unsympathetic to NSY. Caution should be excercised in dealing with him.

Det. Chief Insp Peter Elliott, Clapham Station, tel 824 525 knew Bist and recalled that Eist formed part of the escort for Ray from prison to the airport. He also possible was part of an escort on court appearances. However he played no significant role in the matter, did not participate in interrogation, would never have been alone with Ray and had Ray furnished any information of value such as an accomplice, would have had to have reported such information at the time for inclusion in the report forwarded to the U.S. Elliott is certain that at the time there was no evidence of anyone else being involved with Ray and there was a thorough inquiry. Elliott was present at all interviews.

Ray pride at murder described by ex-Yard man

Washington, Aug 18
A retired detective chief inspector from Scotland Yard has told congressional investigators that James Earl Ray claimed credit in London for the assassination of Dr Martin Lother King, the American civil rights leader, in Memphis, Tennessee, 10 years ago.

The evidence by Mr Alexander Eist, who was a sergeant with Scotlband Yard's flying squad in 1968 when Mr Ray was arrested in London, apparently, came as a complete surprise today to Mr Ray and his lawyer Mr Mark Lane. After Mr Eist's 20,000-word statement, given earlier this month, was read to a congressional hearing here, Mr Ray said it was the most damazing evidence presented against him, but that it was rotally false.

said it was the most damaging evidence presented against him, but that it was totally false.

Mr Lane, who had left the hearing room while the statement was being read, returned to say that the committee's action in submitting such a statement as evidence was utterly irresponsible and outgated.

In his statement Mr Eist said that he had spent a considerable time with Mr Ray after his arrest in London and before he was extradited to the United States to stand trial for the murder of Dr King. Duriog this period Mr Ray began to look on him "as the only friend he had in the country", Mr Eist said.

Mr Ray was a man with great criminal cunning, Mr Eist said. He was shrewd and a complete nutcase. During their conversations Mr Ray had made it clear that he hated blacks and at one stage said he wanted to get to Africa to shoot some more of them.

According to Mr Eist, Mr Ray seemed to want to become a "national hero" and appeared to be mad for publicity. He had mentioned a gun and explained that he threw it away with his fingerorints still on it. Mr Eist said. He recalled Mr Ray laughing about the possibility of a prison sentence and mentioning that he was interested in maiking a lot of money out of his case, at one stage \$500,000 (£250,000) and on another occasion \$250,000

Asked whether Mr Ray hadever said he shot Dr King, Mr Eist said: "During the question of conversation, he definitely—he did not actually come, out with it—but it was there in the conversation that he had done it. He was quite proud of it."

Mr Eist believed Mr Ray had acted alone in shooting Dr King.

He was certain that Mr Ray would have mentioned other, participants.

After reading the statement a member of the committee explained that because the interview with Mr Eist had taken place quite recently he could not speak for its veracity. It was at that stage that Mr Lane returned to the hearing chamber to challenge Mr Eist's credibility.

The Ray hearing had reopened today with Mr Lanes
accusing congressional investigators of distorting evidence to
try to prove that his client had,
stalked Dr King for several
days before his assassination.

He said he believed there was a deliberate effort by the committee "to deceive us and the American people".

His accusation centred on a change-of-address form allegedly made by Mr Ray in Los-Angeles in March, 1968, giving a new address in Atlanta, Georgia, and a newspaper article stating that Dr King intended to travel eastwards, The two documents were submitted yesterday by Mr Louis Stokes, the committee chairman.

GUIDANCE FOR VISIT CONTROL OFFICERS

The proper, comprehensive, and professional handling of official visitors to this Post is viewed as one of the most important facets of the conduct of our business. The degree of support provided to visitors is often the sole means by which these visitors judge our operations, since in many cases the only contact a visitor has with this Mission is through his Control Officer. Control Officers for official visitors are selected from all offices within the Mission; the Administrative Counselor will make such selections based upon substantive need or organizational affiliation of the visitor.

Although every visit poses different sets of problems, all share certain common needs. In an attempt to ease the burden on Control Officers, the paragraphs below reflect certain types of common support given to visitors. It is incumbent upon Control Officers to resolve any questions concerning responsibilities or handling procedures prior to the arrival of your visitors.

1. Visits involving Senators, Congressmen, Cabinet Officers or State Governers:
The Embassy especially welcomes visits by these distinguished officials, as such trips enable them to observe major developments in the world and to see first hand the work of Embassy officials responsible for carrying out American objectives and programs in the United Kingdom. Control

responsible for carrying out American objectives and programs in the United Kingdom. Control Officers for visitors of Ambassadorial and higher rank should inform the Ambassador's Staff Aide of the anticipated arrival and departure dates and the nature of the business the traveler intends to conduct in London. For detailed guidance concerning service requirements to travelling Congressional Delegations, see the attached State Department Airgram (72 State A-10315).

- 2. Visitor Transportation: It is normal practice here for our motor pool to provide arrival and departure transportation to official travelers with the rank of Assistant Secretary or above. When vehicles are available, we also endeavor to extend transportation to travelers of Ambassadorial level. To arrange for the use of a motor pool vehicle, please call the Dispatcher on extensions 358 or 371.
- 3. Special Airport Handling; Arrangements for special handling at Heathrow Airport can be made through A/VIS, extensions 347/348. You should not make these arrangements directly. In the event a requirement arises after office hours, and Miss Auten (Home Telephone: 624 3519) is unavailable, you should call Miss Fran Cobb (Home Telephone: 992 6803). Only if these two individuals are unavailable should you directly contact the airline, in which case you should ask for their "Special Facilities Office."
- 4. Funds: In the vast majority of Congressional visits (Codels and Staffdels), special Congressional funds are authorized for use of the visitors. Control Officers should make arrangements in advance with the Embassy Cashier, extensions 277 or 278, to draw these funds for payment on the last workday prior to the visit. If accommodation exchange is desired by travelers, contact the cashier for assistance.
- 5. Hotel Reservations: Hotel reservations must be arranged through A/VIS (extensions 347 or 348). You should not make these arrangements directly.
- 6. Onward Transportation or Reconfirmation of Travelers Ticketing: Control Officers should contact A/VIS (extensions 347 or 348) for assistance. Control Officers should not contact Air Carriers directly.
- 7. Embassy Response to Incoming Cables Concerning Visits: Assigned Control Officers should respond within 48 hours to any incoming cable traffic concerning their visitors. Their response should include at a minimum hotel reservations made, the name, office and home telephone number of the Control Officer, and as much other information requested in the incoming cable as possible. If subsequent information is to be transmitted at a later time, the Control Officer's cable should so state.
- 8. Miscellaneous: Visitors may request use of Military PX's and Commissary facilities in the London area. The US/UK Status of Forces Agreement precludes use of these facilities by individuals not formally assigned to duties in the U.K. This fact should be carefully explained to any visitors requesting such privileges, and any problems in this regard should be addressed to LCDR Jerry Morgan, COMMAVACTS/UK, Assion 07-523.

Attached are copies of 12 items which have been made available on an unofficial and confidential basis by New Scotland Yard to the Legal Attache, London. Copies are being furnished the Attorney General, the Deputy Attorney General and Attorneys General Pollak of the Civil Rights Division and Vinson of the Criminal Division. The Department is also being advised that this information is not to be disseminated outside the Department.

Included in the attached material is a report to the Detective Chief Superintendent of New Scotland Yard relative to the local charges pending against the subject in England. Documents are also included to support the report, as well as a certificate of vaccination, a copy of the registration at New Earls Court Hotel, London where Ray stayed, pages of notes apparently in Ray's handwriting, statements of two women who are hotel employees, a copy of a memorandum of the Kennedy Travel Bureau giving details of Ray's flight from Toronto to London and a currency exchange voucher. Also included is a document captioned "Silencers" which is a detailed discussion of the theory and specifications of silencers for firearms, which was found in the subject's luggage.

The statement contained on page eight, item 38, of the report to the Detective Chief Superintendent indicates that U. S. authorities have made tentative arrangements for Ramon, George Sneyd to travel to England to testify if necessary. The real Ramon George Sneyd is a police officer in Toronto, Canada. New Scotland Yard has been advised that the FBI is making he altrangements, and this information is also being furnished to the Department.

Briefly, the report of the British investigation shows the subject arrived in England on 5-7-68 and left the same day for Lisbon, Portugal, returning to London 5-17-68. On 6-8-68 he purchased a single ticket to Brussels and presented himself at the Immigration desk. The act was witnessed by Detective Sergeant Philip Birch who asked the subject to accompany him to an office in the airport where he later searched the subject and discovered a .38 caliber revolver loaded with five rounds of ammunition. was questioned intensively concerning his identity and that the British believed his name was not Sneyd but Ray, alias Galt, and was wanted in the United States for serious criminal offenses, including murder. The accused had been standing up, but when he heard this, he suddenly sat down, put his head in his hands, and said, "Oh God." He added after a moment or so, "I feel so trapped."

Legat, London advised 6-20-68 that although the material was furnished on a confidential basis, it could be forwarded to the Department if the Department is properly cautioned.

been advised that no arrangements have been made by the FBI, and it has been determined that the statement in the report actually is based upon information received by Scotland Yard directly from the RCMP.

(2) Copies of documents used by Scotland Yard to support the above report.

These documents include copy of the birth certificate in the name of RAMON GEORGE SNEYD and copies of the two passports obtained by the subject.

- (3) Certificate of Vaccination.
- (4) Copy of registration at New Earls Court Hotel, London, showing registration of RAMON G. SNEYD on 5/28/68.
- (5) Statement of IAN COLVIN, columnist, The Daily Telegraph, London.

Scotland Yard advised that Major ALISTAIR WICKS, headquarters in Lisbon, is believed to be engaged in obtaining weapons for revolutionary elements in South Africa. The Yard has made arrangements to interview WICKS on a confidential basis in London and the results will be promptly furnished. The Yard has been advised that the subject was never in direct contact with WICKS, and COLVIN advised the Yard that he had never furnished RAY the address of WICKS or any address in Belgium where contact might be made with mercenary elements.

- (6) A page of notes, apparently in RAY's handwriting, which was on his person when arrested. "FLE 4342" is the telephone number of the London Daily Telegraph.
- $\sqrt{}$ (7) Statement of ANNA ELIZABETH THOMAS.

It is noted that RAY allegedly tore up a number of papers while staying at the Pax Hotel. Scotland Yard advised that specific and intensive investigation failed to corroborate this and an exhaustive search failed to locate any torn papers that may have come from RAY. Scotland Yard representatives who have interviewed Mrs. THOMAS do not consider her to be a reliable witness. No air flight bag such as she described has been found. RAY is only known to have had one piece of luggage, which is a large

zipper fabric bag designed to carry two or three suits and a large number of accessories. In a search for other luggage Scotland Yard has checked every luggage room and every locker of every transportation station in London.

- (8) Statement of JANET ELIZABETH NASSAU.
- (9) Memorandum of Kennedy Travel Bureau for Mr. R. Sneyd giving details of his flight from Toronto to London and copy of his ticket envelope. These were in the subject's luggage.
- (10) Currency exchange voucher of Lloyds Bank Limited.

This document shows that on 5/30/68 RAMON SNEYD exchanged 15 South African rand for £7-13-10 in British currency. This would be approximately \$17.50 in American money. The voucher does not identify the branch of the bank involved, and these branches are most numerous in London. The Yard has attempted to identify the branch at which this transaction occurred without success.

(11) A 4-page document captioned "Silencers."

This is a detailed discussion of the theory and specifications of silencers for firearms, which was found in subject's luggage.

(12) Classified advertisements found in RAY's wallet at the time of his arrest.

This is a torn piece of a London newspaper containing several classified ads, including one for cheap flights to South Africa by International Air. Scotland Yard has conducted investigation at International Air and has determined that there is no record of subject's having contacted that firm, nor are personnel of the firm familiar with subject.

Scotland Yard is continuing extensive investigation to develop subject's activities between 5/17 and 5/28/68. They also are sending an officer to every institution in London which has either banking facilities or safe deposit boxes to determine if the subject opened a bank account or rented a safe deposit box while he was here.

The complete manifest for the flight taken by the subject from Toronto to London has been obtained. Efforts are being made to obtain from Lisbon the manifest forthe flight from Lisbon to London and Scotland Yard has access to the microfilm manifest of subject's flight from London to Lisbon. The three manifests will be cross-checked in a search for common passengers.

Written apparently by RAY on a South Africa Air Line schedule found in his luggage are the words "Cinco tres cinco zero quatra una," This is Portuguese for the number 535041. Legat, Paris, has instituted inquiries to determine if this is a Lisbon telephone number and, if so, to identify the subscriber and determine if the subscriber has any connection with the subject.

Scotland Yard is interviewing flight crews on the flights taken by RAY from Toronto to London and from London to Lisbon. This has been substantially completed with negative results, and will be concluded as soon as personnel on overseas runs are available for interview. Legat, Paris, has previously arranged for interview of the flight crew on RAY's flight from Lisbon to London.

Scotland Yard's investigation to date has not developed any indication of RAY's having had any associate or significant contact in London.

Exhaustive checks have been made of immigration and airline records. No record has been found to indicate RAY left England between 5/17/68 and 6/868.

The statement in the first paragraph of this airtel regarding reports received on an unofficial and confidential basis refers only to items numbered 1, 5, 7 and 8.

A former car dealer from Se Louis, Missouri, told a Congressional hearing here today that he was offered, but refused, \$50,000 to kill Dr Marstin Luther King, the civil rights leader

tin Luther King, the civit rights leader.

Mr Russell Byers, who was giving evidence to the assassinations committee of the House of Representatives, said the offer was made by two Missouri business acquaintances several months before Dr King was shot in Memphis, Tennessee, in 1968. He was told the money would be provided by a "secret southern organization" and understood the offer to be a "dead serious" one.

He named the acquaintances

He named the acquaintances as Mr John Kauffmani, whom he described as a stolen car dealer and drug manufacturer, and Mr John Sutherland, a patent lawyer. Both men are now dead but their wives have told committee investigators they know nathing about the

told committee investigators they know nothing about the alleged plot to assassinate the civil rights leader.

Under cross-examination today, Mr Byers said he had told no one of the alleged offer until after the death of Dr King and the subsequent Dr King and the subsequent conviction of James Earl Ray, the suspected assassin. Years later he mentioned it to two of his lawyers who advised him to

keep quiet about it.

Mr Byers's story came to light earlier this year when the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FMI) was going through its files on the assassination of Dr King. The bureau found a letter from an FBI informant in St Louis who wrote about the offer in 1973. But the information was never apppently followed up until very recently by the Congressional commit-

The committee is particularly interested in the alleged offer because a brotchr-in-law of Mr Byers, Mr John Spica, was serving a murder sentence in a Missouri prison at the same time as James Earl Ray. The infere encis that Mr Ray might have known there was a price on Dr King's head.

During his testimony today, however, Mr Byers categorically insisted he had never mentioed the offer to his bro-

tehr-in-law.

Mr Byers was opening the final three days of public hear-ings into the death of Dr King, which are concentrating on an investigation of the various conspiracy allegations which have arisen over the years. He was brought to Washing-

ton under heavy guard and tes-tified on the understanding, that he would be immune from prosecution. Earlier this year he was arrested on charges of a St Louis museum. taking part in the burglary of Another witness in a similar.

position is expected to testify before the committee on Fri-day. He is Mr John Ray, a brother of the convicted killer who was arrested on assault and burglary charges earlier, this week. The committee will be looking at allegations that members of Mr Ray's family also took part in the shooting of Dr King. .
